## Pre-Registration Scheduled

Students may pre-register for the Spring 1981 Semester during the two week period beginning December 1 and ending December 12, 1980.

Those desiring to pre-register should complete a registration form, have it signed by their advisor, and bring it to the window of the Registrar's Office. During this two week period, the window at the Registrar's Office will be open for pre-registration between 10:00 a.m. and 12:00 noon daily.

Regular registration will be conducted on Tuesday, January 13, 1981, between 8:30 a.m. and 3:00 p.m. Those who do not register during the pre-registration period will register at this time. Those registering on January 13 should complete a registration form, have it signed by their advisor, and bring it to the basement of the Administration

Building.

Those students who have pre-registered and who are not receiving financial aid may pay their fees during regular cashier hours at the Business Office prior to January 8, 1981. Those pre-registered students who will be receiving financial aid will be given the opportunity to pay their fees on January 12, 1981 in the Little Theater (Room 208A). Financial Aid checks will be distributed in the same room.

Those who have not pre-registered, and all stragglers, may pay their fees on January 13 as a part of regular registration.

Anyone paying after January 13 will be assessed a \$10 late fee.

New veterans should contact Mrs. Pat Stump in the Dean's Office in order to be certified for benefits.

## Stage Production

### Scheduled Nov. 17

The Chamber Repertory Theatre, Boston's continuously touring professional theatre company, will be performing its original stage production "Seeking Dr. Jekyll" based on the novel by Robert Louis Stevenson at 8:00, Nov. 17 in the auditorium, sponsored by the Ohnimgohow Players. There is no charge.

CRT's appearance at GSC marks the return engagement of the company to this area. Last season they performed Mark Twain's Short Stories.

The play, as performed by a cast of six actors, involves many elements of the classic murder mystery, the psychological thriller, and the chilling horror story. The story is set in the fog shrouded streets of Victorian London, replete with its paradoxes: Great wealth and great poverty; great beauty and horrible decay; social order and criminal depravity. Against this background, characters who represent both sides of those paradoxes recreate the tale of the enlightened Dr. Jekyll and the diabolical Mr. Hyde and how they affect the lives of the innocent friends and bystanders who must confront them. It is a play which entertains, frightens, amuses and teaches something of the self.

The evening is a Cultural Affairs Committee event.

They have defeated the biggest opponent they could face. They have proven to this small college community that they are dead serious about their sport and this community has given them what they really will be able to use—their respect and support.

Less than three years ago, cross country was no more than a club in the eyes of the students at GSC. But before the tournament last weekend, people everywhere were talking about it. After all, the Pioneer runners were 15-0 in the conference and were the center of talk among the West Virginia colleges. I can assure you, no one will ever compare GSC cross country to a club today!

Glenville State won't go to Kansas as a team to participate, but they will be represented. Freshman Larry Taylor of St. Marys was the individual conference champion in the tourney and will go to the nationals to compete and to let everyone know that Glenville will be back next year.

Taylor finished the five-mile race in 28 minutes and 15 seconds. He finished in front of the second place runner by 47 seconds. He was named as the "conference's outstanding runner" and named to the all-conference team for his achievement.

Billy Belcher finished eighth in the race. He was less than 20 seconds from being named on the all-conference team. P.K. Coon was number eleven for the Pioneers. He finished with a time of 29:51.

Yes, Glenville finished in a tie for second place. Yes, they will be represented at the nationals. But one thing looks even better than all of this. There are no seniors on the squad and watch out West Liberty 'cause we will be back!

## Concord Wins Title With 55-14 Victory over Glenville State

Glenville State College's football team travelled to Athens, West Virginia, last Saturday to take on the nationally ranked Concord Mountain Lions. Concord showed the Pioneers why they are ranked number four in the NAIA by trouncing GSC 55-14.

The victory gave the Mountain Lions the West Virginia Conference championship. Their only threat, Shepherd, tied with Fairmont State last week to clinch the championship for Concord.

In all, six Concord players scored in the contest. Starting quarterback Dave Renner threw two touchdown passes and reserve signal-caller Mark Shannon also connected for two touchdowns.

Concord scored the first six touchdowns, building up to a 41-0 lead at halftime. Glenville came back in the third quarter with two touchdown passes from Eddie Huffman to Steve "Reno" Gandee, one for 20 yards and the other a 11 yard strike. The third period has been the big period this season as the Pioneers have scored twice as many points in this quarter than any of the other three.

The Mountain Lions outdid the Pioneers in the rushing department by a 247-89 margin. They also outpassed GSC 271 yards to 122. Concord amassed 518 total yards and held Glenville to only 211. Glenville lost four fumbles and Concord lost three in the contest. The Mountain Lions also won the first down battle 23. Glenville had 17 chain movers.

Freshman Scott Pottmeyer, playing for the injured David Boggess, was GSC's leading rusher for the day

with 60 yards on 18 carries. Boggess has the Pioneer's best average on the season with 4.1 yards a carry. Quarterback Eddie Huffman completed nine passes for 122 yards. Jim Bingiel grabbed three of these passes, Gandee and Pottmeyer caught two each, and Jeff Matheney and Brad Batten snared one each.

Defensively the Pioneers were led by Mark Shafer with nine tackles and five assists. Tim Townsend tackled six runners and assisted in seven tackles. Chuckie Taylor had seven tackles and three assists. Happy Joe Parsons, Bernie Bertus, and Steve Gandee all had fumble recoveries for the Pioneers. Parsons also had a quarterback sack.

The loss dropped the Pioneers to 1-7-1. Concord is now 9-0. This is the fourth time in five years that the Mountain Lions have won the conference title. If the Mountain Lions defeated Bluefield in the last game of the season they will have won an NAIA playoff berth.

With basketball season just around the corner - the GSC cheerleaders are getting prepared. The 1979-80 WVAC Champion squad has the fever already, and can't wait until the first shot is put up.

The female cheerleaders are (head) Melissa Simpson, Angel Goddard, Jeannie Harris, Mary Grose, Beth Carpenter, and Kris Meadows. The bulk and strength of the unit - the male cheerleaders 1980-81 are: Reno (Steve) Gandee, Victor G. Whitt, Scott Taylor, Chuckie Taylor, Mike Holley, and Mike Simpson.

## Larry Taylor Wins Crown

"I am, of course, deeply disappointed by our performance in the District 28 Meet. As a team, we failed to achieve our season-long objective of qualifying for the NAIA National Cross Country Meet." Those were some of the remarks Dr. James F. Hilgenberg, Jr., coach of the Glenville State College cross country team, made concerning the harriers' showing in the West Virginia Conference Meet.

In the meet, Glenville, considered by many as the favorite, tied with Davis and Elkins for second place. West Liberty advanced to the nationals by winning the conference crown for the seventh consecutive season. The Hilltoppers had a team total of 41 points, compared to 78 for GSC and D&E. The second place finish marked the third straight year the Pioneers have been runner-up.

Although GSC failed to capture the team title, the individual champion belonged to GSC in the form of Larry Taylor, a freshman from St. Marys. Taylor destroyed the field of 50 finishers with a time of 28:15 over the five-mile course. His nearest competition was 47 seconds, or over 300 yards, behind him when he crossed the finish line. For his outstanding performance, Taylor was designated to the All-Conference team as "Runner of the Year" and

## Basketball Team Set to Play Opener With Tech Thursday

The time has come again to put your cleats and shoulder pads back into the closet and drag your high-topped Nikes and your deflated basketball out because it's roundball season.

The Glenville State College basketball team has been working out for the past few weeks and are preparing for their home opener with West Virginia Tech this Thursday night in the Glenville State gymnasium.

The main men behind the success of the GSC roundball team will be head Coach Jesse Lilly and his assistant, Gary Nottingham. Coach Lilly is one of the most respected conference mentors, and one of his brightest moments at GSC came last season when he won his 200th game. Coach Nottingham, once a GSC starter under Lilly, begins his first year of coaching at Glenville. He was also an assistant coach in football under Frank Vincent.

The Pioneers return eight players from last year's team. Along with a new group of freshmen and transfers, GSC will be out to improve their 14-15 record of the 1979-80 season.

Leading the way for the Pioneers this year will be a pair of juniors. Don Bullett (6-5, 195) and Paul Wills (6-3, 185) will probably be the starting forwards for the 1980-81 campaign. They were selected to serve as co-captains of the squad.

John Irwin (6-5, 185), the only senior on the team, will be the center in the opening game this Thursday. The guards will be junior Mike Forbes (6-1, 165) and soph-

omore Randy Anderson (5-6, 128). Both Forbes and Anderson have pinpoint accuracy from outside. Another sophomore, Mike Morrison (6-4, 190), would best be classified as the sixth man. "He's our first line sub," Coach Lilly stated. "He'd be the first man to go into the game."

Rounding out the Cagers for GSC will be Stan Cleavenger (6-6, 180), Bill Lilly (5-8, 140), Mike Cummings (6-2, 180), Scott Ludwig (6-1, 180), and Jeff Thomas (6-0, 175). Lilly is a junior while Cleavenger, Cummings, Ludwig, and Thomas are all sophomores.

Five freshmen have also made the team. They are Rick Smith (6-0, 155), Brian Pearis (6-0, 155), Perry Jackson (6-5, 185), Mark Bargeski (6-1, 145), and Jeff Brewster, (6-1, 185).

When asked to comment on his views of the upcoming season, Lilly stated, "We may have problems in our overall rebounding game. That's only because we don't have a lot of size. We have good quickness and our shooting is not below average."

Lilly went on to say that "Fairmont, Wheeling, and Salem are going to have the good teams this year. Fairmont will be the team to beat again this year. They won the conference crown last season. I know we can play with anyone in the league!"

So, there you have it. We have the coaches, we have the players. All we need is a lot of Pioneer spirit, so let's all get out Thursday night to cheer the Glenville State Pioneers on to victory against Tech!

advanced to national competition at Salina, Kansas, on Nov. 15. Coach Hilgenberg exclaimed, "Larry ran a magnificent, beautiful, strong race. For a first-year runner to win conference "Runner of the year" honors is a tribute to Larry's talent and dedication!"

GSC's other finishers were as follows: sophomore Billy Belcher-8th in 29:42, junior captain P.K. Coon-11th in 29:51, sophomore Asenso Kuffuor-28th in 31:56, freshman Steve Roberts-30th in 32:06, sophomore Chris Keister-32nd in 32:15, and freshman Steve Keenan-49th in 35:52.

Coach Hilgenberg concluded his remarks by discussing the future of the Pioneer harriers, who finished their season with a fine conference record of 21-11. He stated, "I don't know about next year. The way our season ended has, I believe, led myself and the runners to question whether we in fact want to pursue the championship through another season. This season has exacted a physical and an emotional toll on all of us.

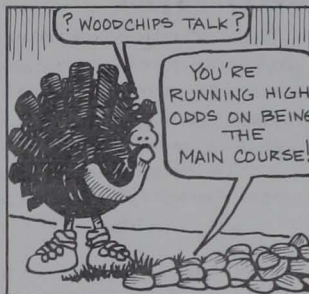

in interior design.

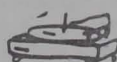

A native West Virginian, Jenio has his bachelor and master's degrees from Eastern Michigan University and his doctorate from Southern Illinois University.



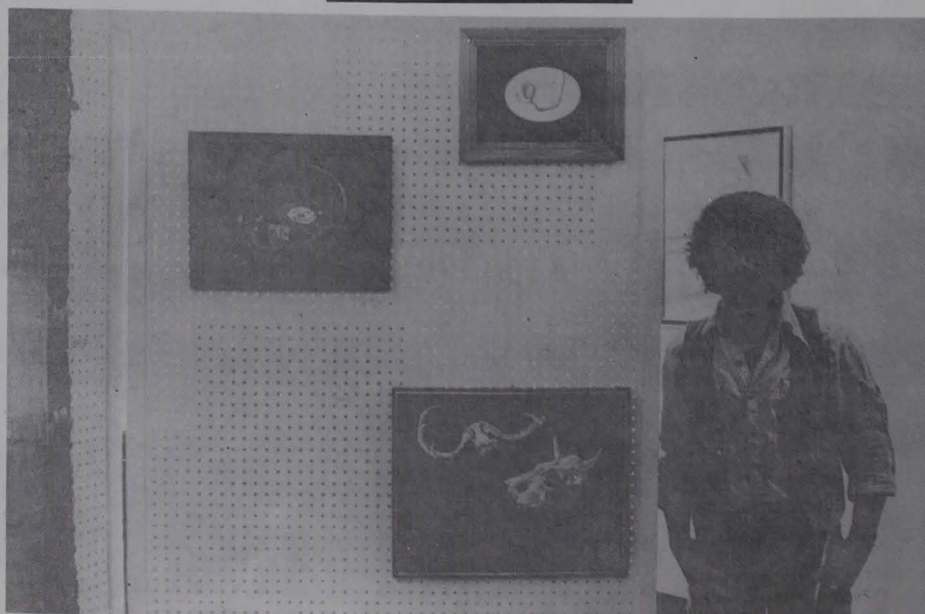

Drama Production Reviewed

The Prince of Darkness reigns again as the students of Glenville State College and the community of Glenville take in the College Theatre season 1980 opener, "Dracula." The play, directed by Mrs. Linda McKown, is loosely based on the 1887 Bram Stoker novel by the same name.

The play concerned strange happenings in a suburb of London in the early 1920's. The sanatorium is run by a Dr. Seward (Louis Kent), who discovers the strange happenings after the death of Lucy's, his daughter, (Jennifer Chisler), close friend. Louis Kent portrays a man driven to any length to save his daughter's soul. Jennifer Chisler, a victim of Dracula, overdramatizes the use of her hands, yet reveals a character who both wants to be released from Dracula, but wants to remain with him.

Dr. Seward, unable to distinguish these happenings, calls in a specialist, Professor Van Helsing (Tim Brown), who is quickly united in action with Lucy's fiancée, Jonathan Harker (Jeff McDowell.) Both of these characters are new to the College Theatre; however perform admirably. After much coaxing, Professor Van Helsing and Harker employ the help of Dr. Seward to rid the London countryside of... Dracula.

The light-footed Count Dracula (Jerry Hough) makes several visits to the Seward home, hypnotizing Lucy and her maid, Miss Wells (Carol Norton,) into his service. Both Dracula and Miss Wells are realistic characters bringing much life into the three-act play.

Although his role was small, when Butterworth (Eddie Harbert) entered the stage, he took full command. He artfully portrays an attendant in the sanatorium who fights a losing battle against Reinfield (Mark Lilly.) Reinfield is a patient in the sanatorium who eats spiders and flies. Needless to say, he is also an accomplice of Count Dracula. Reinfield has many scenes in the play where he begs to be saved from the "evil" of Dracula.

Appeals Policy Listed

Each college and university under the governance of the West Virginia Board of Regents shall provide, through institutional-level procedures, opportunities for students to appeal final grades assigned them. In formulating institutional policies to provide appropriate levels for reviewing student grade appeals, the following shall apply:

(1) The different steps and levels in the process and the procedures for advancing appeals shall be clearly delineated and published in the institutional catalog, student handbook, or other publication which is made available to all students.

(2) In exceptional cases where appeal deliberations determine that a grade has been improperly assigned, provisions shall exist to ensure that the grade will be modified in accordance with the findings of the final campus reviewing authority.

(3) Grade appeals shall end at the institutional level.

(4) No later than January 1, 1981, each college and university shall file with the Board Office grade appeal procedures which accommodate the provisions of this policy. All revisions to the institutional procedures initially filed must likewise be submitted to the Board Office.

The college was formerly called the Glenville Normal School in the twenties and the name of the newspaper was The Tower. Although these changes do not seem important, the stories from these previous Mercurys make for interesting reading. For example, in 1930 the first four-year degree was awarded, Homecomings were started and Ethel Barrymore and Mrs. Eleanor Roosevelt visited the campus. In the 50's, the first sorority (Kappa Phi Kappa) was formed, the first Montrose Award was presented, the Veterans club was formed and in 1952 the Health Building was established.

In 1960, Robert F. Kennedy addressed the student body, lettermen jackets were banned and 'The Four Freshmen,' a nationally known recording group, performed.

In the seventies, the GSC football team had a running back named Jimmy Carter; the bowling team won the '76 WVIAC Tournament and the National Championship; Vincent Bugliosi, a prosecuting attorney spoke on Helter Skelter, lectured on the Charles Manson case and Rosie Grier and Michael Johnson made guest appearances.

Of course, these are only a few highlights of the years past which the Mercury has scooped. Hopefully, the future will bring even more exciting happenings with even better coverage.

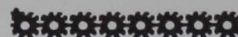
