Room Requirements Ou

reservations at Glenville State College for the academic year 1981-1982 is as follows:

Students currently enrolled are given until December 19, 1980 to guarantee themselves a space in the residence halls for next fall semester beginning August 20, 1981. Room assignments are made in order of receipt of application. (Please note that this reservation fee is for next fall and no additional \$25.00 deposit is needed for the second semester of this academic year!) Summer session, however, does require an addi-\$25.00 room deposit.

A twenty-five (\$25.00) dollar reservation fee must accompany the formal application for room reservation. These requests for space during the month of November and December will be made at the separate residence hall offices. The fee will be deposited by the resdience hall director with the Business Office and receipts returned to students making application

After January 12, 1981 reservations are open to new students and space shall be allocated in the order of receipt of request in the Office of Student Affairs.

If it becomes necessary for you to cancel your reservation, please notify the BUSINESS MANAGER, GLENVILLE STATE COLLEGE. Such cancellation or failure to enroll for the period for which the reservation is made will result in forfeiture of the entire reservation fee to the college. However, the fee of \$25.00 will be refunded about three weeks after the end of the college year to those students who complete their housing contract, less any charges for damage to the room, loss of room key, and any other indebtedness having been incurred or owed Glenville State College.

Spikers Place Fifth in Tourney

On Nov. 14 and 15 the GSC Women's volleyball squad ended its season by competing in the West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Association tournament held at Wheeling, Six teams-Wheeling, West Liberty, Marshall, Alderson-Broaddus, Fairmont and Glenville-participated in the tournament. The Lady Pioneers placed fifth in the six-team field.

GSC was pitted against A-B in their first match. A-B captured the first game by a 15-6 score. Glenville came back to win the next contest 15-12 to gain a split of the match, since only two games were played in each match. Donita Cox led GSC's scoring in the first game with three points. Linda Collins, Shelly Tharp and Leza Groves added one apiece. In the win over A-B, Collins was the big scorer, collecting ten points. Cox added two, and Jackie Makle, Della Seaman and Tharp each scored one.

The Lady Pioneers' next opponent was a strong West Liberty squad. WL posted victories of 15-0 and 15-4 over the GSC team. In the 15-4 game, four Glenville players, Tharp, Makle, Seaman and Groves, scored one point apiece.

Fairmont State College was GSC's third opponent in the WVIAA tournament. The Fairmont women swept the Lady Pioneer spikers. The scores were 15-8 and 15-3. Cox scored three points, Collins and Seaman two each, and Makle one for the GSC team in the initial game. Tharp scored two and Makle one for Glenville in the second game.

The fourth opponent for GSC, and the eventual tournament champions, were the Marshall University women. Marshall made short work of Glenville, outpointing them 15-1 in both games. Seaman scored the point in the first game, and Makle tallied the lone point of the second MU contest.

The tourney host, Wheeling College, provided the Lady Pioneers' next opposition. GSC was again swept in both games, by scores of 15-5 and 15-6. For GSC in the first game, Collins scored three, and Tharp and Cox tallied one each. Tharp, with three points, led the second game scoring. Collins added two and Seaman one.

Glenville's final opponent in the tourney was Fairmont, a team which had already beaten them once. The winner of the match would take fifth place, while the loser had to settle for sixth. The Lady Pioneers were not to be denied in this match. They salvaged fifth place by defeating Fairmont by margins of 15-7 and 15-4. Tharp's six points paced the first GSC triumph over Fairmont. Seaman chipped in four, Collins three, and Cox and Makle one each. Seven points by Cox led in the second contest. Tharp, Makle and Seaman had two apiece, and Collins and Groves one each.

Senior captain Linda Collins had a good tournament for GSC. Collins, the only four-year regular that Lady Pioneer coach Kay Chico has ever had, was her team's leading scorer over the course of the two-day tourney with 22 points. Shelly Tharp, in her first extensive action of the season, and Donita Cox both supported the team with 17 points. Della Seaman added twelve, Jackie Makle eight, and Leza Groves three. Becky Gilchrist, the team's only other senior besides Collins, played in hier last match, although she didn't score.

Collins, the team's leading scorer during the season, said, "Our team, which had a lot of talent, played a lot of hard teams, and we knew we could play with these teams. A lot of spirit was shown at the tournament, and we played well. It was a good experience. You could see the improvement on the part of each of the players, during the tourney."

Taylor Runs in Nationals

Although he is just a freshman, Larry Taylor has already made his mark on the West Virginia Conference cross country scene. Several weeks ago, at the WVC meet at Clendenin, Taylor ran away from about 60 other starters to post a convincing 28:15 victory over the five-mile Sandy Brae course, beating his nearest competition by 47 seconds. For his fine achievement, the GSC runner was awarded All-Conference honors as "Runner of the Year." He also advanced to NAIA national Competition at Salina, Kansas.

While in Kansas, Larry represen-

ted GSC well. Running against the finest small college runners in the nation, Taylor placed 126th overall in a field of nearly 400 runners. His time for the relatively flat five-mile Salina course was 26:17, as compared to the winning time of a little under 25 minutes. Taylor's average time per mile was 5:15.

For Taylor, who was the first WVC finisher at the nationals, running at the NAIA meet capped a great season for him. Hopefully, Larry, as well as the whole GSC team, will be able to qualify next year. Congratulations, Larry!

Pioneers End Season 1–8–1

Glenville State's Pioneer football team ended its 1980 season on a losing note last Saturday with a 10-0 loss to West Virginia Tech.

Tech led 3-0 at halftime with a field goal in the second quarter. They scored their touchdown in the fourth period.

Rain hampered the day as neither team could get their offenses going on the wet field. Glenville totaled 341 net yards, while Tech was one stripe back at 340 yards. Tech outdid the Pioneers in first downs by a 19-15 count. GSC lost two fumbles and Tech lost five.

David Boggess, out last week due to an injury, was Glenville's leading ground-gainer with 122 yards on 29 carries. Boggess ended the season with 555 yards on 135 carries for a 4.1 average. Brad Batten ran for 72 yards on 17 carries in the game. He finished the season with 581 yards on 145 carries, good for a 4.0 average. Fullback Grady Lamb totalled 50 yards against Tech. He ran for 480 yards on 124 carries for a 3.9 average.

Quarterback Eddie Huffman completed 6 of 18 passes against Tech. Steve Williams caught three of these passes for 64 yards. Huffman ended the season with 605 yards passing. He completed 48 passes in 150 attempts and had 13 intercepted. His main receiver was Steve Gandee with 14 catches for 266 yards.

Steve Williams, who led the conference in punting up to press time, punted for a 32.0 average in the game. He finished the season with a 36.8 average.

Defensively against Tech, the Pioneers were led by Lewis Hill and Terry Gandee who each had six tackles and two assists. Hill also had a fumble recovery and a quarterback sack. Gandee intercepted a pass for the Pioneers. Chuckie Taylor, Scott Taylor, John Adkins, and Danny Amick all had fumble recoveries also while Amick also intercepted a pass.

The loss ended Glenville's season and gave them a final 1-8-1 record.
