Concerning The Fire Drills In Pickens Hall Dormitory

In regard to the fire drill that took place on Monday, January 19, and the incidents that followed, we would like to express our unhappiness about the way the situation was handled. We feel it was unfair and unreasonable to subject mostly innocent students to that kind of torment. To force the students to remain outside in the cold for that period of time without just cause was foolish on the house director's part. The incidents that took place during the fire drill were solely the responsibility of the house director. The students were mad about having to stand out in the cold but tempers flared when the house director ordered the doors to be locked. It was at this time that many students began pounding at the door and throwing things at it. With all of this pressure it was only a matter of time until someone threw the unlucky blow that shattered the glass. But why is one person being unfairly accused when many others participated in abusing the door? And is it possible that the glass could have broken very easily since it wasn't fitted properly? What other reason could there be for not using the door on the two days prior to the incident? With all the circumstances of the situation, we feel it is wrong to accuse only one person and expect her to pay for damages that were caused by many students.

Dr. Palmoneada Brown has been appointed Director of the Glenville State College Center at Parkersburg Community College. An eight-year veteran of Glenville State College, Brown is associate professor of education and has specialized in early childhood education.

Brown has been associated with the Appalachia Educational Laboratory where she developed home-oriented educational pre-school programming and presented the model project at the White House Conference on Children and Youth. As a result, Brown has been featured in many national magazines, journals, newspapers in addition to appearances on national television for her work in early childhood education.

A former early childhood education chairwoman at the University of Houston, Brown is a member of the West Virginia State Department of Education Advisory Council for the Improvement of Reading Achievement, the West Virginia Reading Council and recently appointed to the Advisory Committee for the Two Year Degree Program in Child Development at Parkersburg Community College.

Glenville State College to be Evaluated

Glenville State College is scheduled for an evaluation for continued accreditation during the 1981-82 academic year by North Central Association of Colleges and Schools. Glenville State has elected to schedule the North Central on-site visit during a Fall Evaluation Cycle, specifically October 1981.

One preliminary step to the preparation of a self-study document and the ultimate on-site visit has been the establishment of a Steering Committee with the following members; Dr. John Westfall, alumni member; Gary Gillespie, John Brooks, Owen Stanley, Frank Jenio, Stanley Anderson, faculty members; Joe Hickman and Ronnie Burke, administrative members. Committee members do encourage your suggestions and inputs into the delineation and formulation of the self-study.

The Steering Committee has formally adopted the following:

Basic Philosophy of Self-Study for Continued Accreditation of Glenville State College.

Our self-study process is not intended to be nor should it be construed to be an exercise in self satisfaction, gratification or self pity.

Scholarship Offered

The Pi Chapter of Alpha Delta Kappa, Honorary Society of Women Educators, is offering a scholarship to any student in the amount of \$200 to be used during the year of 1981-82.

The scholarship is available to any student whose legal address is within a fifteen mile radius of Parkersburg, WV. Two letters of recommendation must be sent to the Scholarship Chairperson by the first Thursday of March. A recommendation can be made by either a counselor or a teacher. The requirements of the scholarship are as follows: the student must be enrolled in a program leading to a degree in education, make every effort to be present at the May meeting of the sorority, respond within a year by letter stating how the money was used, and state his or her marital status and if any change is to be made within the next semester.

One application for a scholarship will be taken from each of the following schools: Belpre, Marietta, Parkersburg High, Parkersburg South, Parkersburg Catholic, Williamstown, Parkersburg Community, Glenville, Marietta, Marshall University, Ohio Valley, Ohio University, WV University, Salem, and Fairmont State College.

When setting up these appointments, the organizations should also decide on how many pages they wish to have. Each organization is given one page and each additional page will cost \$25.00.

Office Vacated

The office of President of Student Congress was declared vacant by members of Student Congress Tuesday, Jan. 20, 1981. Earlier in the first semester, impeachment charges of dereliction of duty had been brought against president Kim Bickel. The proceedings failed with a vote of 13 in favor of the motion, 12 opposed, and one abstention. For the impeachment proceedings to be effective, a total of 14 needed to vote in favor of the motion. The new president is Dena Dunlap. Other



A 3.8 average after one semester changed her temporary status to full time.

Ms. Verma graduated summa cum laude with a masters in education from NYSU while teaching in the language department's two schools. She taught the national language India (Hindi) at NYSU and ancient language of India (Sanskrit) at Vassar. Ms. Verma taught at both schools until 1977 when she enrolled in graduate studies again to earn a masters degree in Library Science. She received her second masters degree with a grade point of 3.9 in 1978 and accepted a position with Briar Cliff College in Sioux City, Iowa was too far from Ms. Verma family in New York. After teaching at Briar Cliff for two years, she answered an ad in a national journal for her present position.

Ms. Verma feels that Glenville is a warm and friendly place and isn't too far from New York for an occasional visit with her family. Ms. Verma has a brother who is an engineer with I.B.M. in Poughkeepsie, N.Y., a sister who is married to a physician in N.Y. and another brother in N.Y. who is a psychologist but prefers a career in retailing. Ms. Verma also has two sisters in India who are active in higher education.

Gilchrist To Attend State Legislature

Becky Gilchrist has been selected to participate in the Judith Herndon Legislative Fellows Program sponsored by the West Virginia Legislature. The program was recently re-named in honor of the late Judith Herndon, state legislator from Ohio County in W. Va. Gilchrist is one of five students selected in West Virginia colleges and universities to participate in a 16 week assignment with the Legislature beginning in January.

Gilchrist is a senior at Glenville State College majoring in social studies and business education. She is active in Student Congress, College Republicans, Kappa Delta Pi, Pi Gamma Mu, College Choir and named to the Dean's List.

Becky is the daughter of Carroll and Iris Gilchrist of Mineral Wells, Wood County.

The primary purpose of the program is to instruct participants in the theory and operations of legislative bodies in their multi-dimensional aspects and roles. Through work assignments and complementing academic programs, participants will be exposed to the in-depth operation role and function of the legislature.

The program means more than eight hours each day in an office or classroom. Becky will have floor privileges in the legislative chambers which means she will attend many of the policy making sessions. She will be assigned to either a legislator or a legislative agency performing research and various staff functions. Among other things, she will be introduced to and develop an understanding of the politics of legislation, legislative research, bill drafting, the role and functions of committees, and executive legislative liaison. A specific assignment for Gilchrist will be with the Department of Corrections where she will be required to travel from the state capitol to observe the functions of several correctional institutions.

Most of the participants in past Legislative Fellows Programs have gone on to graduate study and professional careers in government, law, and education. The program is highly competitive and it is an honor when only five of numerous applicants are selected.

Two classes in this course, beginning class and advanced beginner,


are the two most important classes offered. If you are not a real good swimmer and not in good physical condition, enroll now for the Basic Swim Instructor Course.

Glenville's Men Cagers Win Six of Last Nine Games To Even Record at 5-5 in Conference Play

Glenville State College Men's basketball team is off and running with the start of the second half of the 1980-81 season. The Pioneers, currently enjoying a three game winning streak, are 6-3 in their last nine outings. They won the Liberty Baptist College Tournament and placed second in Salem's Joe Manchin Tournament over the Christmas holidays. The Pioneers have raised their season record to 8-9 overall and evened their conference mark at 5-5.

The success of Coaches Lilly and Nottingham and the Pioneers began on December 11, when they defeated Wheeling College by a slim 67-66 margin. Don Bullett continued his hot shooting by blazing in 24 points for the Pioneers. Paul Wills also continued on his scoring rampage with 19 points. John Irwin added 10 points of his own for Glenville.

Two days later, GSC travelled to Salem College to take on the Tigers. Salem spoiled the Pioneers' chance for two in a row with a 76-66 defeat of the locals. Once again the Pioneers were led by Bullett and Wills. Bullett poured in 25 points while Wills was credited with 19 points for the losers.

The Pioneers were idle until January 2 when they took part in the Liberty Baptist Invitational tournament. The G-men faced Philadelphia School of Science and Pharmacy in the opening round. Behind Wills' 22 points, Glenville put it to the Philadelphia school by a 66-51 score. Mike Forbes added 16 points in the contest to aid Glenville and give them the right to play the host Liberty Baptist College team in the final.

The Pioneers won a thriller in the finals with a 56-54 victory over LBC to post the championship. Bullett was GSC's high man with 18 points. Forbes added 12 and Wills connected for 13 points. Wills was chosen as the Most Valuable Player in the tournament.

The next week saw Glenville in another tournament, this time the Joe Manchin Invitational at Salem. Glenville defeated St. Vincent College in the opening round by a 70-55 count. Don Bullett amassed an amazing 36 points in the game. Transfer student Scott Ludwig, who became eligible second semester, scored 12 points for the Pioneers. The win pitted them against Salem in the final round and once again the Tigers took it to Glenville by a 88-70 score. Bullett shot for 22 points and Wills added 14 points. Both players were named to the all-tournament team.

On Saturday, January 10, the GSC Cagers played conference-leading Fairmont at the Parkersburg High School fieldhouse. The Falcons proved why they are number one as they defeated Glenville 61-51 in front of a sizeable Parkersburg crowd. Bullett scored 11 points in the game, all of which came in the second half. Wills and Ludwig both scored 10 points in the game.

Glenville hosted Alderson-Broadus the following Monday in the GSC gymnasium. The home squad had a five point lead with two minutes to play but couldn't hold the once beaten AB team as they took it from Glenville by a 84-82 score. Irwin scored a game high 16 points while

Bullett and Anderson added 16 and 14 points respectively. Forbes and Wills both scored 10 points each.

The Pioneers then began their three game winning streak with a victory over Bluefield. Behind Bullett's 33 points and Ludwig's 29, the G-men went on to a 93-83 win over the Big Blues. Wills added 17 points and Anderson chucked in 12 for the winners.

The Glenville cagers then played West Liberty a day later on Saturday. Although West Liberty outbounded GSC by a 2-1 margin, the smaller, quicker Pioneers used a four corner offense to defeat the Hilltoppers 58-52. Leading scorer was once again Bullett with 15 points. Wills added nine while Irwin and Ludwig both scored 8.

Finally the Pioneers hosted West Virginia Wesleyan on Monday night. A three-point play by Ludwig with 15 seconds left gave Glenville a 60-59 lead and the Pioneers held on to defeat the Bobcats. Ludwig was the high man with 19 points. Bullett upped his season's average to 19.7 points per game with 10 points. Wills scored 9 points to bring his average to 13.3 points per game. Mike Morrison and Irwin added seven points each.

Those students who will be graduating in May should have cap and gown orders placed in the Office of Public Relations and Alumni Affairs no later than February 10, 1981. The cost of the commencement attire is \$15.


Class Offered


Students in this class will not only learn to teach people how to swim, but will learn how to swim perfectly themselves. Life Saving and Water Safety is also taught in the course.

Shafer and Brown Named To All-WVIAC First Team

Two Glenville State College football players have been named to the All - WVIAC first team in their respective positions. They are Mark Shafer and Dave Brown.

Jump Rope for Heart creates a unique opportunity to spread WVAHPER'S philosophy, which will be foremost in all press coverage. The event will raise funds to fight the nation's number one (1) killer—heart disease and stroke.

You can help ensure success in this unique public education program with your help and school participation. Team spirit should be encouraged by teachers, who play a vital role in motivating students. Join in the fun and help make WVAHPER public education event a smashing success.

At each participating school, a school coordinator can enlist the aid of other physical education or class-

room teachers to help administer the Jump Rope for Heart. Briefly, the Jump is a three-hour event in which participants will jump as members of six-person teams. Each team member will jump until tiring and then pass the rope to another team member. The sequence is repeated for a maximum of three hours, which can be broken down into one hour time periods.

Each team member secures pledges in advance for each invite their team hopes to jump. Emphasis is on team performance, not on the individual student. Pledges are collected after the JUMP and turned in to the JUMP coordinator, who forwards them to the W.Va. Heart Association office.

Every student who jumps receives a Jump Rope for Heart patch (\$10.00 minimum) from the W. Va. Heart Assoc. The winning team at each school is the team which raises the most contributions (\$200.00 minimum). The members of the winning team will receive T-shirts and the coordinator will receive a warm-up suit.

GSC Lady-Pioneers Remain Unbeaten and Number One in Conference

The Lady Pioneer basketball team finished the first semester undefeated by beating three opponents during the week before finals. The GSC women ran their record to 5-0 with victories over West Virginia State, Bluefield and Concord.

The victory over the West Virginia State women, a 76-66 decision, occurred on Dec. 10 at State's Fleming Hall. The Lady Pioneers claimed a 43-32 halftime margin and held off State to win their third game in as many tries. Pam Linger led the Glenville victory with 22 points and eight rebounds. Pam Minigh, who led GSC's rebounding with 11 caroms, and Judy Niday followed Linger with 16 points each. The other double-figure scorer was Bunny Taylor with 12 points. Also contributing for the Lady Pioneers, who were outshot (41 percent to 38 percent) and outrebounded (56 to 53) but had only four turnovers compared to the opponent's 20, were Kim Bickel with seven points and nine rebounds, Sonja Bailey with two points, and Mary Zangari with one point and three steals.

Another contest on the road, this one at Bluefield, was on the schedule for our women on Dec. 12. The Glenville gals, who had a 14-point lead at halftime, were victorious by a comfortable margin of 20 points at 80-60. GSC shot 41.1 percent from the field and 71.4 percent from the foul line. They also outrebounded their opponent for the first time in four games. Freshman Bunny Taylor led the winners, as she pumped in 30 points for the second time this season. Taylor also collected six rebounds, five steals and two assists. Also for the Lady Pioneers, Pam Minigh had 13 points and a game-high 11 rebounds, Kim Bickel had 12 markers and eight caroms, and Sonja Bailey collected ten points and five rebounds. Other scorers for the Lady Pioneers were Mary Zangari and Shelley Tharp with four each, Pam Linger with three, Judy Niday with two, and Donita Cox and Jill Burkhammer with one apiece.

The final game before break pitted Glenville against Concord at Athens. The GSC women could manage only a 34-33 lead by intermission, but they exerted themselves in the second half to outscore Concord 37-27 for a 71-60 triumph. Senior Mary Zangari paced the victory: 8 points, four assists and three steals. Also, Pam Minigh popped in 14 points and snagged ten rebounds, Bunny

Taylor had ten points and 11 boards, and Kim Bickel had ten markers and six rebounds. Others scoring for the winning GSC team were Pam Linger with seven, Sonja Bailey with six, Judy Niday with four and Jill Burkhammer with two. Defense was a key to this game, as a ball-hawking Glenville squad recorded 15 steals and forced Concord into 39 turnovers.

When the Lady Pioneers came back from break, they had nearly a week to prepare for the first game of the new year. GSC was pitted against West Liberty in a home contest on Jan. 17 in an attempt to move their record to 6-0. The Glenville women did just that as they were victorious in a run-and-gun battle by a 95-87 score. The conference-leading Lady Pioneers

placed six players in double figures, led by Freshman Bunny Taylor's 29 markers. Other twin-figure scorers were Pam Linger with 13, Mary Zangari with 12, Sonja Bailey and Pam Minigh 11 each, and Kim Bickel 10. Also scoring for GSC were Jill Burkhammer with five and Judy Niday with four. Taylor pulled down 11 rebounds and Minigh nine to pace the winners in that department. Despite those two totals, the Glenville women were outrebounded by a whopping 65-41 margin.

GSC was to have played their next home game on Jan. 21 against Wesleyan. Then the next game at home won't be until Feb. 5 when West Virginia State rolls into town.

Glenville's Pam Linger goes up against two defenders to add two points in GSC's 95-87 victory over previously unbeaten West Liberty. Linger scored 13 points in the game.

The Glenville State College Bowling Team competing in the Mid-South Bowling Conference swept through its first four matches, January 17th and 18th in Huntington, W. Va. The Pioneers competing against James Madison University, Eastern Kentucky University, Morehead State University, and Marshall University completely dominated play with the match of the day being on Sunday morning when the Pioneers and the Thundering Herd put on a show all their own. After a slow start in the first game, Glenville took con-

trol scoring an impressive 3123 to 3028 for Marshall in the 3 game event. In the match, Glenville averaged 208.2 per man. For the four matches, the Pioneer bowlers averaged 192.9 per man.

Individually for Glenville, Senior Greg Martin led the way with a 200 average for twelve games, his high game was a 225 and his high series was 543. Martin is from Vienna, W. Va. Close behind was Freshman Dave Frazier of Parkersburg, W. Va. with a 197 average for twelve games. Along with his 197 average, Frazier

shot the high game and series in conference play. Frazier's game of 268 and 717 series were unsurpassed in the two days of competition. Junior Keith Hite of Winston-Salem, N.C. and Junior Dave Lamm of Parkersburg, W. Va. each averaged 188 for twelve games. Hite's high game was 235 along with a 610 series as the high.
