# Science Class Planned

The Science 321 Class (Science for Elementary Teachers) will present two series of science activities: one series for a group of elementary students currently enrolled in grades 3-4 and another series for students currently enrolled in grades 5-6. Each series will consist of six meetings to be held during February and March.

All students will meet from 6:15 to 8:45 p.m. in the Science Hall on the following Tuesdays: Feb. 24, March 3, 30, 37, 24, and 31. The 3rd and 4th grade students will assemble in Room 107; their topic is "Rock Formations." The major thrust will be to relate rocks and rock strata to geologic formations

particularly as evidenced in West Virginia. All sessions will be activity based. The 5th and 6th grade students will report to Room 200; their activity-based sessions will pertain to environmental conditions and the effects that these conditions have on animal behavior.

Every interested student in grades 3-4 or 5-6 is invited to apply for participation in these programs. However, only the first fifteen names submitted for each of the two series of activities will be accepted. There is no charge for participation. Currently from Morgantown, Jeff was on loan to GSC as an artist in residence. Jeff has done much interesting work as a stagehand, carpenter, electrician, and designer for such famous companies as Holiday on Ice, Pittsburgh Ballet Theatre, Wagon Wheel Playhouse in Indiana, and the Actor's Guild in Parkersburg where he worked with Ed and Linda McKown. Jeff said that "Man of La Mancha" must make show number 201 that he has worked with. He has also done technical work for touring rock groups such as Michael Stanley Band, Jethro Tull, and Molly Hatchet. The stage in the GSC theatre has been metamorphosed to a prison of sixteenth century Spain since February 1st when he arrived. # Mancha Presented la

One of Broadway's longest-running musicals, "Man of La Mancha" will be presented at Glenville State College. A sixteenth century Spanish based musical suggested by the life and works of Miguel de Cervantes y Saavedra, "Man of La Mancha" led all other productions in prize awards at the end of the first Broadway season.

The action begins with Cervantes and his servant entering a prison in Seville, where Cervantes is to await trial by the Inquisition for an offense against the Church. The thieves and trollops who surround him try to take away his possessions, including the manuscript of "Don Quixote," but Cervantes persuades a kangaroo court set up by his fellow prisoners to permit him to offer as his defense a dramatization of his manuscript. During the first musical number, Cervantes puts on make-up to resemble Don Ouixote. His servant becomes Sancho Panza, and the other prisoners assume supporting roles.

At the start of the story of the eccentric knight whose aim is to restore chivalry, Quixote and Panza come to a roadside inn, which Quixote tells Panza is a castle. There he meets Aldonza, a servant girl and strumpet. When he insists upon calling her Dulcinea, the ideal lady of quality whom he would worship, the confused Aldonza cannot understand why Quixote does not see her as she really is.

After scenes where Quixote's niece and housekeeper asks the padre for help in dealing with Quixote's madness, the padre realizes that they are less interested in Quixote's welfare than in stopping him from causing further embarrassment.

At the inn, Quixote, waiting to be dubbed a knight, sees a barber wearing his shaving basin as a helmet and snatches it from the barber. He defends Aldonza against the attack of the muleteers and the innkeeper then knights the Quivote

The doctor and padre then devise a new plan in an attempt to restore Quixote's sanity. Disguised as the Knight of Mirrors, the doctor challenges Quixote and forces himto look into the mirror of reality where he sees himself as an old, demented man. The doctor then takes Quixote back, defeated and dying. He collapses and dies trying to get out of bed to put on his armour for another quest. Quixote's death has changed Aldonza, for she now calls herself Dulcinea as though she has become the ideal woman of Ouixote's dream.

Cervantes is back in the dungeon with the prisoners who have returned his manuscript and now he leaves to face his Inquisitors.

Glenville's production is directed by Linda McKown, head of theatre. Edward McKown is musical director, and the set for the musical was designed and constructed by Jeffrey McMahon of Morgantown.

# Lady-Pioneers Fall in 'Battle of the Best'

The Glenville State College Lady Pioneer basketball team played two games last week, one at home and one on the road. Both games were against conference foes. The Lady Pioneers won over Fairmont, but they lost to the league-leading University of Charleston for their first loss against a conference team this season. GSC had a touch time of it when

they travelled to Fairmont for a game on Feb. 12. The Glenville gals soundly defeated the Fairmont women, 95-57, earlier in the year. but the game was much closer this time around. Fairmont, led by the scoring of Vicki Huffman, held a slim 35-34 lead at halftime. Glenville, however, used a 46-40 advantage in the second twenty minutes of play to record a well-deserved 80-75 victory, improving its record to 15-1. The Lady Pioneers, who were outshot 50 percent to 42.8 percent from the field, were paced by sophomore Pam Minigh's 25 points and 11 rebounds. Junior Pam Linger supported GSC's win with 15 markers and seven caroms. Freshman Bunny Taylor added 14 points and seven rebounds, and senior Mary Zangari put in 13 points. Also helping in Glenville's win were freshman Sonja Bailey with seven points and five steals, sophomore Judy Niday with four points and two rebounds, and senior Kim Bickel with two points and seven rebounds.

The Lady Pioneers' last home game of the season proved to be a spoiler. The top two teams in the conference were showcased in this contest. The University of Charleston women were number one in the most recent WVC rankings, while GSC held down the second spot. Both squads were unbeaten in conference play heading into the game.

Glenville, backed by vocal support from a very large crowd, took the game's first lead on a jumper by Bunny Taylor at the 19:17 mark. GSC also held leads of 3-2, 5-4 and 7-4 before UC reeled off five straight points, including three fast break layups, to take a 14-7 lead. The Lady Pioneers fought back to within 14-12 and stayed just about even with the much taller UC squad the rest of the first half, which ended with the visitors ahead by a 29-25 margin.

GSC fought an uphil battle almost the entire second half. After an exchange of two-pointers put the score at 31-27, UC used its strength inside to tally 12 unanswered points and 20 of the next 26 for a commanding 51-33 bulge with 11:50 left to play. The Lady Pioneers, behind Mary Zangari and Pam Linger, mounted a rally which brought them within ten points at 56-46 with 8:15 to play, but UC halted the rally with six straight points. Glenville could get no closer than 11 points the rest of the way and when the buzzer sounded found themselves on the short end of a 74-58 count.

GSC, which fell to 15-2 overall and 14-1 in the conference, had a very poor shooting night. The girls hit on only 21 of 90 shots from the field for 23.3 percent. UC was 36 of 78 for 46.2 percent. UC also had a decisive edge in rebounds, 72-56.

Pam Linger, working hard for every shot, led GSC with 21 points. She also had 13 rebounds and three steals. Bunny Taylor added 15 points and a team-high 15 rebounds. The team's two seniors, Mary Zangari and Kim Bickel, played in their last home game. Zangari put in nine points and six rebounds, and Bickel was credited with five points and six rebounds. Pam Minigh added eight points and ten caroms.

A Feb. 23 contest at West Virginia Wesleyan is the Lady Pioneer's final regular season outing. Then, on Feb. 26-28, the all-important WVIAA tourney will be held at Charleston to determine the district 28 winner. Glenville and UC are among the teams that will participate. We at GSC wish Coach Tim Carney and his team the best of luck in the tournament.

# Bowling Team Wins Championship

The Glenville State College Bowling team continued their scorching success on the lanes as they swept the Region IV Association of College Union-International Bowling competition (ACU-I) which was held last weekend in College Park, Maryland.

GSC had a total pinfall of 8,059 to defeat second place finisher West Virginia University who toppled 7,997. Duquesne University took third with 7,995.

High rolle: for Glenville was Dave Frasier with a 186 average and a 201 high game for nine games. Greg Martin had a 186 average for eight games and a 263 high game. Keith Hite had a 178 average with 212 high game in nine games. Jerry Kurjian bowled 177 average-wise and a 190 high game in nine games. Dave Lamm bowled nine games and averaged 171 with a high of 192. Jeff Stanley bowled one game for 146.

This victory automatically qualifies Glenville State to compete in one of twelve sectional roll-off tournaments to qualify for the nationals.

On Saturday, the GSC bowlers travel to Bristol, Tennessee, to compete against the University of Tennessee for the Mid-South Bowling Conference Championship title.

# Lilly Wins Game Number 250 As GSC Drops Davis & Elkins

Jesse Lilly received a double gift from his team Monday night at Elkins. Glenville State handed Lilly his 250th victory as the Pioneer mentor and at the same time won a big upset over Davis and Elkins College, the third ranked team in the West Virginia Conference, by a score of 74-65.

Don Bullett had his biggest night of the season as he scorched the nets for 40 points. His previous high was 35 points against St. Vincent College in January. Teammate Randy Anderson was the only other Pioneer in double figures with 10 points. Rounding out the scoring was Scott Ludwig (9), Paul Wills (7), John Irwin (6), and Mike Forbes (2).

D & E attempted to foul the Pioneers to get the ball back, but GSC foiled that strategy by hitting 11 of their last 12 free throws.

Glenville shot 28 of 54 for 51.8% from the floor and the senators shot 26 of 46, good for 56.4% Both teams juffed down 24 rebounts on the night with Bullet and Wills sharing the top spot for GSC with nine each.

The win gave Glenville a 9-9 record in the conference, and 13-11 overall.

### GSC-FAIRMONT

Earlier, on Thursday, the G-men travelled to Fairmont to take on the top ranked Falcons Fairmont showed Glenville what it's like to be number one as they bombarded the Pioneers 65-57.

GSC was once again paced by Bullet who scored a game-high 28 tallies Irwin and Ludwig added eight each, while Forbes chucked in nine. Anderson and Wills finished the scoring off with two points each.

Glenville shot 40.0% (36 of 65) from the floor, as Fairmont shot 58.7% (26 of 46). Fairmont edged Glenville in rebounds by a 32-30 margin.
