## 83 Veterans Enrolled

Latest figures indicate that Glenville State College has eighty-three veterans and nine veterans' dependents presently enrolled.

Forty-eight veterans are on the main campus at Glenville and the remaining thirty-five are attending the GSC extension campus, Parkersburg Community College.

The person who coined the phrase "no news is good news" must have been accustomed to receiving bad news. There is no bad news for veterans this week. Most of the

pending legislation pertaining to military is for active duty personnel and their families.

Recently you may have read that the reason for our military being in "a poor state of affairs" is due to their low pay. Consider this: a proposal under review by the Office of Management and Budget to exclude military pay from federal taxation - up to \$20,000.

Another interesting item for active duty personnel is the proposed

## Frozen Assets Affect College

Due to the coal miner's strike, West Virginians and state agencies alike are having to cut spending by two percent. The revenue generated by the coal industry helps to provide monies for all state-owned agencies, and it is estimated that the state will lose as much as 16 million dollars every month that the coal strike lasts. Other effects include the stoppage of all hiring, purchasing and repairs to any state agencies.

Governor John D. Rockefeller IV invoked the provisions of West Virginia 5A-2-23, April 2, and all state institutions were to report back to the Commissioner of Finance and Administration on the measures they are taking to slash budgets. Glenville State College was forced to cut approximately \$55,170 from the remainder of this year's budget.

President Simmons characterized the situation as "like a yoyo," and stressed the fact that this could be changed at any time. Summer school for the first semester throughout the state has been cancelled. However, GSC is planning to have a second term of summer school beginning in July.

As of now, all out-of-state trips are cancelled and only those in-state trips that are essential are being taken. No state-owned vehicles are in use, and no new purchases or no repairs are being ordered. "Nothing devastating to GSC," commented Simmons, who also stated that the college was "almost afraid to make a commitment" during these times.

The coal miners, who have been on strike for almost two weeks, have turned down an offer of \$112 a day. Until the coal strike is over, all monies in the state budget are frozen.

## Second Annual GSC Week Is Scheduled April 20-25

"A bigger and better Glenville State College Week and Field Day" is being planned by Student Congress and the Office of Student Affairs. The event will kick off the week that GSC students return from spring break and last till Saturday, April 25. On Saturday, GSC will hold its second "Field Day." However, due to conflicting schedules, "Field Day" will be held at the Gilmer County Recreation Center playground.

The week begins on Monday when an old-fashioned popcorn machine will be on campus to provide students with fresh popcorn. On Tuesday, the Department of Natural Resources will have a wildlife exhibit from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. At 5 p.m. on the Verona Mapel lawn, all faculty, staff and students are invited to attend a picnic which includes: fried chicken, barbequed spare ribs, pork and beans, potato salad, potato chips, rolls, and ice cream. During the picnic, a music festival and contest will be held in the amphitheater. Anyone wishing to enter the music contest should contact Dean John Vaughn in the Office of Student Affairs. There will be a \$50 first prize award.

Again on Wednesday, the Department of Natural Resources will be on campus with the wildlife exhibit from 10 a.m. to 4 p.m. Artists and craftsmen from all over West Virginia will be on campus Thursday and Friday to display their wares. Also on Thursday, the internationally known "Red Clay Ramblers" will be holding a concert, and the "Fiddle Puppets" will be holding a clogging workshop. Activities on Friday will be similar to Thursday, with the addition of a donut eating contest at 12 noon in the amphitheater. The Forestry Club will have a demonstration on the Verona Mapel lawn. Tom Wheeler will be on hand Friday night to host a DJ dance in the ballroom from 8:30 to 11:30. Refreshments will be

served, so be sure to bring your college ID.

On Saturday, the second annual "Field Day" will be held at the Gilmer County Recreation Center. The games begin at 10 a.m. and will last till 5 p.m. Throughout the day hot dogs, hamburgers, coke and sprite will be distributed to students, faculty and staff. Ribbons will be given to all participants who place in any event. After the "Field Day" activities, a very informal banquet will be held in the college cafeteria. The banquet will include Steamship round roast, baked ham, french fries, green beans, salad bar and Boston cream pie. "Saturday Night at the Races," a game run similarly to the "Las Vegas Casino," will be held from 8:30 to 11 in the ballroom. Students, faculty and staff will be able to place "bets" on horses in video-taped races. Prizes will be awarded to the winners.

## Forestry Building Is Decaying

The Forestry Building was built in 1972 and apparently by 1980, it had begun to fall apart. The ceiling of the building was held up by pipes and ties, the garage floor was usually flooded, the roof leaked and there was uneven circulation throughout.

This problem of deterioration had gone as far as the building being in danger of caving in. The staff and the students were hampered by these obstructive problems until funds were appropriated and reconstruction begun. Now with reconstruction in full swing, the rising cost of materials and the state of the building before work was begun, seems to suggest that a newer, more modern facility could have been built for the price of reconstruction.

With the scarcity of funds clamping down all around us, such money-saving ideas should be put in practice so other projects could benefit. Naturally any project with the extent of problems as the Forestry Building should be given first priority and the problem should be dealt with in the best possible manner. For those who try to close out such problems, merely take a trip out to the building and view for yourself the decay and then imagine trying to sit through classes or trying to teach in that same building for a solid day. The answer should be obvious.

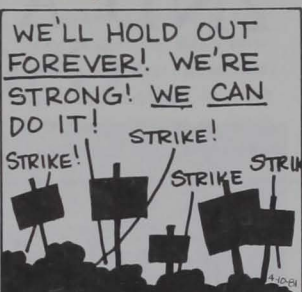
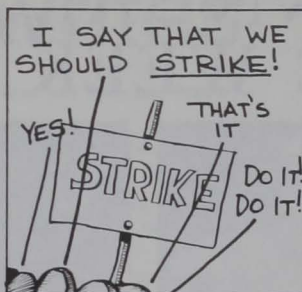

pay increase for the year that could equal an increase of 28 percent from October '80 to October '81.

Veterans and dependents of veterans enrolled at GSC should not take any action on rumors pertaining to education benefits. Take your questions and problems to Mrs. Stump in the Academic Affairs Office.

Mrs. Stump will provide veterans information to the *Mercury* as it becomes available.

3. Continue or remove students on academic probation.

4. Suspend students for academic reasons and readmit students who have been suspended from Glenville State College or other institutions when they become eligible for readmission to the College.

5. Act on petitions to carry more than eighteen semester hours of course work in one semester.

6. Grant permission to attempt to earn credit by examination in certain prescribed areas.

7. Review policies on academic probation and make recommendations to the Faculty-Administrative Organization, and

8. Act on cases of delinquency in class attendance.

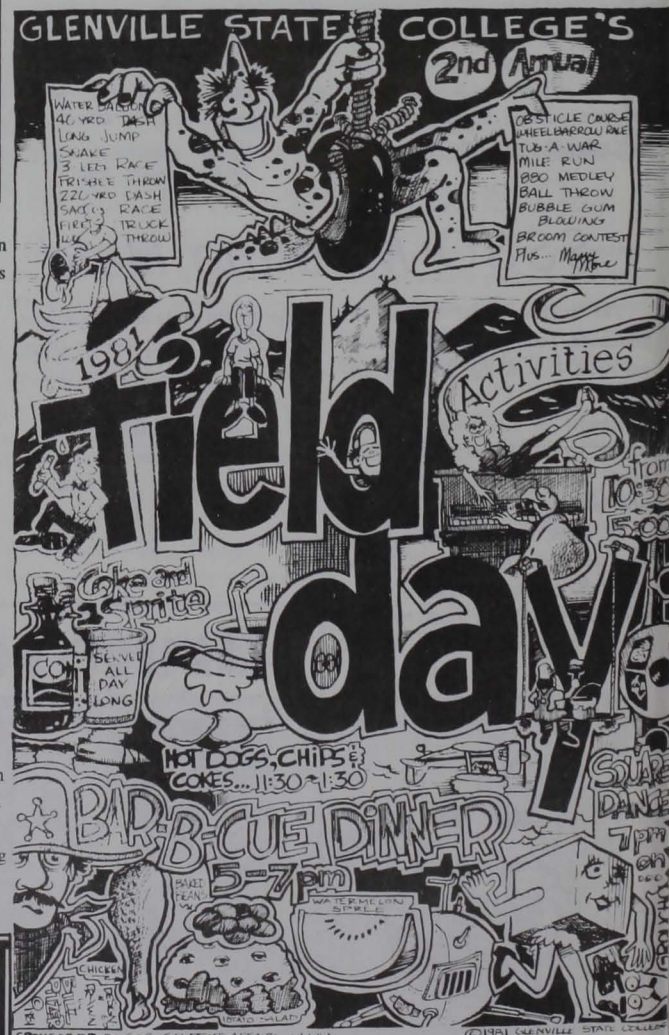

Glenville State College's baseball team batted .500 ball this past week as they won three and lost three games. All six games were conference contests.

On last Tuesday the Pioneers travelled to Buckhannon to take on West Virginia Wesleyan. The Bobcats proved too much for Glenville as they swept the Pioneers 6-4 and 4-0.

In the first game Gerry Myers lost his season debut. Myers went 5 2/3 innings before being replaced by Mike Lilly. Randy Edge slammed two doubles in three at bats to pace GSC.

In the second game, Wesleyan pitcher Bill Atwell threw a two-hit shutout over the Pioneers. Mike Goldsberry lost his first game of the season in the contest. Goldsberry and reliever Terry Mullens only gave up nine hits in the entire game.

On Saturday, the GSC nine hosted Salem College in a doubleheader. The Pioneers took it to the Tigers by defeating them 8-4 and 11-5.

In the opener, freshman sensation Bob Davis once again went the distance to record the complete game. In winning his second victory without a loss, Davis struck out seven and walked only one.

At the plate Myers hit his first home run of the season, a three run shot. Edge smacked a triple to continue his streak. John Henderson

and Myers had three runs batted in each.

In the nightcap, Glenville erupted for 11 runs in the first three innings to grab an 11-5 victory over the Tigers. Myers raised his record to 1-1 with the pitching victory. He pitched 5 1/3 innings and struck out seven to record the win. Mullens came in to chalk up his first save of the season.

Henderson hit his second home of the season and Myers connected for a triple. Myers finished the game with 4 RBI's. Top hitters included Myers (3 for 4), Jay Fiber (2 for 3), Henderson (2 for 4), and Dale Teany (2 for 2).

On Tuesday, the Pioneers played host to the University of Charleston. The G-Men won the opener 13-2 but lost the nightcap 5-1.

## Bullet Is All-WVIAC

Don Bullett has finally established a home at the top of the West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Basketball Association. After three years of hard work, Bullett has been named to this year's All-WVIAC first team.

Bullett, a 6-4 junior at GSC, was one of eight cagers chosen for the award. His 21.9 points per game average this season was topped only by Wesleyan's Roy Humphrey, who averaged 22.6 points per game.

Bullett has grown to be respected by his peers at GSC and his opponents in the West Virginia Conference. His statistics ended any doubt to his abilities on the court. From the first game in which he put on a Pioneer uniform, Bullett has appeared in every game since. The three-year string now stands at 87 straight games in which he has appeared.

He led the team in nine categories during the 1980-81 season, including field goals (285), field goals attempted

(613), free throws (115), free throws attempted (159), steals (54), blocked shots (33), total points (685), game point average (21.9), and high game (40). He alone accounted for one half of the team's total blocked shots. His 613 total points was one third of the team's total for the season.

Bullett also was GSC's high scorer for 22 of the Pioneers' 31 games this season. He led the team in rebounds eight times during the season.

Joining Bullett on the All-WVIAC first team was Most Valuable Player Kevin Beauford of Fairmont, Roy Humphrey of West Virginia Wesleyan, Ronnie Payton of Alderson-Broadus, Joe Lucas of the University of Charleston, Chase Williams of Bluefield, Phil Dailey of Salem, and Sedale Threatt of West Virginia Tech. Only Payton and Lucas are seniors.

No GSC player was named to the second team nor to the honorable mention list.

Also, Irwin competed in the 110 meter high hurdles, placing fourth.
