Frankly, I'm surprised that they have nerve enough to try it again this semester. Last semester, the letter led the reader to believe that the Panhellenic Council made no profit from the packages. Supposedly, all the items together cost around \$3.00. Certificates were given that gave \$2.00 off on merchandise purchased in the bookstore, but these were given only after several people complained about the contents of the bags and were not mentioned in the letters to the parents.

This is what was found in last semester's \$5.00 CARE package: one apple (some received oranges), two cookies, one flat pepperoni roll, one small bag of potato chips, one pack of bubble gum, one pencil and one felt-tipped pen in a brown paper lunch bag. All of these things could have been bought in quantity for less than their retail value and at least the pepperoni rolls and cookies were provided by campus food services.

Will I receive a CARE package this semester? No, because my parents and I were very distressed with the last one, and our confidence in them will probably never be restored.

Speleologist Course Completed

The members of the Glenville State College cave biology course traveled to the historic Sinks of Gandy in Randolph County on Saturday, April 25th. The Sinks of Gandy Creek is one of the oldest known caves in the region. Gandy Creek flows along a subterranean channel for about 3000 feet through a spur on the south side of Yokum Knob one-half mile west of Osceola. The south entrance is in a low ledge of limestone in the north end of a large depressed meadow.

After exploring the Sinks of Gandy, the caving team hiked to Stillhouse Cave located nearby. Stillhouse Cave is famous in Randolph County history for its utilization as a moonshine factory. The moonshining activities here were found and destroyed in 1881. Stillhouse, also known as Hermits Cave due to a 6 year residence by a New York man, contains large rooms readily applicable to the white lightning trade

The Glenville cavers discovered the entrance to Stillhouse Cave at the base of a local trash dump. The cavern has a variety of interesting formations and passageways.

Caver Martha Rose Hickman was the team leader in the study of bats. Jeff Sperry, Rick Ray, and Peggy Beckelheimer are to be commended for their efforts in establishing the GSC base camp on Spruce Knob Friday night.

This field activity was the last in a series of cave explorations for the cave biology students. Other excursions this semester have allowed the cavers the opportunity to explore a variety of West Virginia caverns including the Bowden Cave system, Smokehole Caverns, Seneca Caverns, and Stratosphere Balloon Cave.

In addition to the planned field activities, the cave biologists have used micro-computers in their cave studies. The Apple II micro-computer system has been available to each student throughout the semester and has assisted the student in preparation for periodic quizzes and examinations.

Jim Meads, Cave Biology instructor, would like to thank all those who have assisted in making this semester's speleology course successful.

Pioneers Place Third In GSC Track Meet

The third annual Glenville State College men's track Invitational was held last weekend, with five teams participating. The teams which competed in the Pioneer Invitational were Rio Grande (Ohio), West Virginia State, West Virginia Weslevan, Salem, and the host Pioneer thinclads.

Wesleyan emerged victorious in the meet, for which the scoring was 6-4-3-2-1. The Bobcats edged State 79% to 79, to claim the team trophy. GSC nabbed third place with 491/2 points, compared to 49 for Rio Grande. Salem brought up the rear with 21 points.

GSC's sprint corps didn't have as good a day as they are accustomed to having. The Pioneers' top sprinter, Virgil Davis, pulled up lame in his 100 meter heat and in his leg of the 4 x 100 meter relay, thus taking away valuable points. Misfortune also hit Eddie Huffman, GSC's top 400 meter performer. He won the 400 meter dash in 50.2 seconds. In an event in which he is probably stronger, the 400 intermediate hurdles. he fell while in the lead and couldn't finish. In the 100, Scott Pottmever was GSC's lone scorer by tying for fifth place in 11:35. Also, the 4 x 400 meter relay team of Huffman, Pottmeyer, Greg Anderson and Ray Loughry recorded a second place finish in 3:32.

Twenty-nine of Glenville's total pointr came in the middle distance and distance events. From 800 meters up, GSC captured three of four

individual wins and three more places. Mark Price took second place in the 800 meters in 2:03, Larry Taylor won both the 1500 meters (4:16) and the 5000 meters (14:48), and Steve Keenan won the 10,000 meters in 33:53. P.K. Coon captured second place in the 10,000 meters in 34:03 and third in the 1500 with a time of 4:34. Steve Roberts got fifth in the 5000 meters in 16:20. Also, Craig Bock got sixth in the 10,000 with a 38:38.

In the hurdle events, John Irwin, who also threw the javelin, claimed two fifth places. He ran the 100 meter high hurdles in 16.1 and the 400 intermediates in 1:01.7.

GSC mustered only five points in the field events. Craig Worl's throw of 36.7 meters in the discus earned him third place, and Davis, placing fourth in the triple jump, recorded a jump of 37' 8".

Coach Jerry Milliken remarked, "I would like to express my appreciation to the people who gave so track teams at GSC will be commuch of their time and effort to help make this track meet a success. Congratulations on a job well done. Thanks for the support!"
