#### **Test Dates** For NTE Announced

er preparation programs and advanced degree candidates in specific fields may take the National Teacher Examinations on any of three different test dates in 1981-82. Educational Testing Service that administers this testing program, announced that the tests will be given November 14, 1981, Feb-ruary 20, 1982, and April 17, 1982, at test centers throughout the United States.

Results of the National Teacher Examinations are considered by many large school districts as one of several factors in the selection of new teachers and used by several states for the credentialling of teachers or licensing of advanced candidates. West Virginia has a licensing program for candidates holding a bach-

Students completing teach- elor's degree. All West Virginia colleges require all seniors preparing to teach to take the examination. On each full day of

testing, registrants may take the Common Examinations, which measure their professional preparation and general educational background, and/or an Area Examination that measures their mastery of the subject they expect to teach.

Prospective registrants should contact the school districts in which they seek employment, state agencies in which they seek certification or licensing, their colleges, or the appropriate educational association for advice about which examinations to take and when to take them.

The NTE Bulletin of Information contains a list of test centers and general

information about the examinations, as well as a registration form. Copies may be obtained from Kermit L. Kinder, Counselor, Glenville State College, Glenville, WV 26351, or directly from National Teacher Exam-inations, Box 911, Educational Testing Service, Prince-ton, New Jersey 08541.





## **Gilchrist Legislative Fellow**

Becky Gilchrist, a social studies and business education senior at Glenville State College, was one of five students from West Virginia colleges to participate in the Judith A. Herndon Legislative Fellows Program for the 1981 Legislative Session. Established as a pilot program in May 1980, the Fellows Program is an internship sponsored by the West Virginia Legislature to instruct fulltime students in the theory and operations of the legislature and its multidimensional aspects and roles.

Becky's first assignment was with the Department of Corrections where she observed the innerworkings of prisons. There she was able to do some eye-opening research with criminal records and backgrounds which enabled her to write a paper on capital punishment. Becky

## Legislative Program Offered

Dr. Joe Darnall has announced applications may be made by students interested in participating in the Frasure-Singleton Student Legislative Program. The program provides an opportunity for students to observe one week in the West Virginia Legislature during the 1982 regular session.

According to Darnall, students work on a oneto-one basis with legislators and observe committee meetings, floor sessions and hearings. Legislators are available to answer questions, explain strategy, and discuss procedures. The scheduled activities include discussion sessions with members of the executive and judical branches of state government as well as lobbyists and the press.

The program is open to full-time sophomores, juniors, and seniors who have completed one course in political science. Housing, two meals and transportation while in Charleston are provided by the program. All other expenses must be absorbed by the participants.

The summer break for senior English major Dolly Woodell could be the summer that she'll remember as her major break. Dolly attended writer's workshops in Kentucky and West Virginia where she developed her skills as a writer, and had some of her work accepted for publication.

According to Dolly the workshops attracted beginning professionals and amateurs from many genres of literary composition. She stated that participants were divided into groups with a professional assigned to evaluate their writing, and to assist them in marketing their material.

At Cedar Lakes, W. Va., Dolly attended lectures on the writing and marketing of children's books by Dick Harkins, editor of Weekly Review. She also attended lectures on religious writing by Professor Jack Welch, Department of Appalachian Studies, West Virginia University.

Mrs. Woodell gave readings on her children's book Little Old Woman With A Wart On Her Nose and her poems, "Rebirth" and "Marred Beauty." Her poem "Rebirth" was accepted by the <u>National Poetry Review</u> in <u>Pegasus</u>. Dolly added that her children's book is scheduled for distribution in the United States, Japan, Argentina and Czechoslovakia.

In addition to lectures on children's book and religious writing, Dolly attended other lectures at Cedar Lakes and the Hindman Settlement School in Hindman, Kentucky. Other lecturer's were: Novelist, Harriet Arnow, Wilma Dykeman, Richard Day and James Still: Poets: Jim Wayne Miller, Richard Hague and George Ella Lyons; Short Story: Barbara Smith, Shirley Williams and Jane Mayhall.

Dolly completed a poem "A Woman, Tied" with the assistance of lecturer and poet Jim Wayne Miller, while attending the workshop.

Mrs. Woodell expressed her gratitude to James Rogers, Glenville State College, Art Department, for his vivid illustrations in her children's book, and to Chairperson Virginia West, GSC Language Dept. and the GSC Alumni Association for making the workshops a reality.



## **College Policy Changes Published For Review**

The Committee on Academic Affairs, which governs policies of the campus, have made several changes recently which will affect your academic life. All of these policies appear in the new 1981-83 catalog, but the policies are being printed here in an effort to ensure that everyone is made aware of the changes. Take time to read the policies because sooner or later you will need to know about them.

### CHALLENGE EXAMINATION POLICY

1. All students who challenge a course will be required to pay a \$5.00 per semester hour administrative fee. Students who are enrolled as full-time students when they challenge the course will not be assessed an additional fee. S udents who are enrolled in less than twelve (12) hours at the time they challenge the course will be assessed the current cost per credit hour in addition to the administrative fee.

2. All challenge examinations must be taken before the end of the fourth week of the semester.

3. Each division shall produce a list of courses that may be challenged and file a copy of this list with the Office of Academic Affairs.

4. A student may not challenge a course in which he has previously earned an "F", "WF", "FIW", or "D".

5. All challenge examinations must be read by at least three instructors within the division before credit for the challenged course is awarded.

### STUDENT ACADEMIC GRIEVANCE POLICY

The student grievance procedure involving academic matters, such as grades, shall be as follows:

1. The student must first discuss the grievance informally with the instructors(s) in charge of the course.

2. If, after consultation with the instructor(s), the grievance is not resolved, the student may appeal in writing within five days from the discussion with the Instructor(s) to the Chairman of the Division in which the course is offered.

3. If the grievance is not resolved by the Chairman of the Division involved, the student may appeal to the Dean of Academic Affairs. The appeal must be in writing and filed with the Dean within five days of the decision at the Division level.

4. If the problem is not resolved by the Dean of Academic Affairs, the student may present the matter to a Student Academic Grievance Committee in writing within five days of the decision of the Dean of Academic Affairs. The Studen: Academic Grievance Committe shall consist of six full-time teaching faculty who are randomly selected, and the three student members of the Academic Affairs Committee. The student shall eliminate one member, and the faculty member(s) involved in the review shall eliminate one member from the Student Academic Grievance Committee,

The review by the committee must involve both the student and the instructor(s) concerned. A written or taped recording of the review must be made.

The decision of the Student Academic Grievance Committee shall be final.

5. Within five days after the decision of the Student Academic Grievance Committee, all written and/or taped recordings of the reviews shall be forwarded to the President of the College. The President will examine the recordings to assure that all avenues of the appeal process have been accorded the student.

The six faculty members serving on the Student Academic Grievance Committee will be chosen annually by a random selection process from all faculty members who are teaching nine hours or more during the fall semester of that academic year. The Academic Affairs Committee shall be responsible for carrying out the selection process and organizing the Student Academic Grievance Committee within the first three weeks of the fall semester of each academic year.

The grievance may be withdrawn by the student at any step.

### **CLASS ATTENDANCE**

Regular class attendance is necessary for successful academic work. Students are expected to attend the classes in which they are enrolled. Accordingly it is the policy of Glenville State College that:

1. Absences such as those due to health, death in the family, or similar reasons shall be reported to the instructor in writing within two weeks of the absence, and the instructor shall provide an opportunity to make up the work missed.

2. Institutional absences are to be approved by the Dean of Academic Affairs and honored by each instructor. Institutional absences include those which result from participation in an activity sponsored by the College such as athletics, music, or field trips.

3. Each student is responsible for making up all classroom or laboratory material missed by any absence. It is the student's responsibility to contact the instructor to obtain the makeup work.

4. When the number of hours of unexcused absence exceeds the number of credit hours of the course the instructor is to inform the student in writing that irregular attendance is endangering the student's classwork. A copy of this warning is to be sent to the instructor's Division Chairman, the Dean of Academic Affairs, and the student's adviser.

5. In the event the instructor recommends suspension from class because of irregular attendance, his recommendation is subject to the approval of the Chairman of the Division and the Dean of Academic Affairs. The student is to be notified in writing of the recommended suspension.

6. The student is to be notified in writing by the Dean of Academic Affairs of the action taken. If the student is suspended from class, he may appeal his suspension in accordance with the Academic Due Process policy which is outlined below in this catalog.

7. Any instructor may choose an alternate attendance policy providing that students are informed in writing of the alternate policy within the first two weeks of the course, and a copy of the alternate attendance policy is filed with the Office of Academic Affairs.

### WITHDRAWAL

It is the responsibility of a student desiring to withdraw from College to appear before the Dean of Records and Admissions and announce his intention to withdraw. At that time each student will sign a withdrawal card stating the date of withdrawal and the reason(s) for leaving College. Students who fail to comply with this regulation within 10 school days after leaving the College will be reported as irregularly withdrawn, and all grades on all subjects carried will be recorded as FIW.

### POLICY ON WITHDRAWING FROM CLASSES:

Students may withdraw from a course with a grade of "W" until nine (9) weeks from the first class day of the semester.

After the withdrawal period from classes with a "W" ends, students may withdraw from a class with a "WP" or "WF" only for the following reasons:

- (1) Medical reasons. Must be substantiated by a written statement from a physician stating that continuation in a class or classes is likely to be detrimental to the mental or physical health of the student.
- (2) Circumstances beyond the control of the student.

### **CREDIT** — NO CREDIT GRADES

Certain classes may be offered for which a grade of credit (CR) or a grade of necredit (NC) is given. In such cases all students enrolled in that class will be given grade of either "CR" or "NC". Neither of these grades will be used in the computetion of a grade point average. Approval for a class to be offered on a credit-no credoption must be granted by the Committee on Academic Affairs.
