



Football Squad Loses 23-6, To W. Va. State

West Virginia State College defeated GSC's Pioneer football team by a 23-6 count this past Saturday in college football action. According to GSC coach, Frank Vincent, "Errors cost us the game. We stayed in the game, which was quite an accomplishment in itself, but the mental mistakes killed us."

GSC played right with the 3-0 Yellow Jackets practically the whole contest. In fact, the Pioneers held a 245-244 edge over State in total yardage, and had a 16-11 edge in first downs. It was State's ability to convert its opportunities that proved to be the difference, however.

West Virginia State scored first, in the second quarter, to take a 7-0 lead. GSC retaliated with a beautiful scoring drive of its own to pull within 7-6 in the third period. The drive end

ed with a 10-yard scoring toss from Jeff Matheny to tight end Steve Williams, who caught four passes on the day for 69 yards.

After GSC scored, the

After GSC scored, the Yellow Jackets tallied again in the third period to take a 14-6 lead. Then, they put nine more points on the scoreboard in the final quarter to make the score 23-6.

Offensively, GSC had 245 total yards, 113 on the ground and 132 through the air. Byron Brooks, a freshman from Jeannette, Pa., was the Pioneers' top rusher with 33 yards on nine carries. Jeff Matheny had a pretty good passing day. The sophomore signal-caller completed eight of 19 passes for 132 yards and one touchdown.

The Pioneer defense did a good job of containing the potent State offense most of the time. Junior nose guard Andy Marchal led GSC with seven tackles and two assists. Also, Junior defensive back Bernie Bertus was a defensive leader. He intercepted two opponent's passes and returned them for a total of 49 yards.

Vincent commented, "As a total unit, the team played well. In a few areas, we broke down at times." In concluding his statements about the State contest, he said, "We still have to eliminate our mental mistakes. We want to continue to improve and hope to start winning."

GSC will have its Home-coming contest with West Liberty this weekend. Both teams will be looking for a good outing. Last year, the Pioneers beat the Hill-toppers, 44-20, in their only win of the season.

Game time is 1:30 pm on Saturday, October 3.



The Glenville State College men's cross country. team added another impressive showing to its credit last week by winning the college division of the Oak Hill Invitational. The Pioneers brought home a big team trophy and four individual trophies for their performance at the meet, in which they defeated four conference schools.

In a first for GSC, the Pioneers entered two teams in the competition. Glen-ville "Blue" consisted of six members, while Glen-ville "White" consisted of five members. "Blue" team members were Billy Belcher, Lee Haddox, Steve Keenan, Steve Meckfessel, Steve Roberts, and Larry Taylor. "White" team members were Randy Anderson, Craig Bock, Eddie Maz-zella, Chuck McKnight, and Biddle Williams.

Larry Taylor led the 35 runners over the 5.2 mile course in 26.52. The sophomore All-Conference runner was 23 seconds ahead of his nearest competition. Third overall and second "Blue" team finisher was freshman Lee Haddox. He covered the course in 27:24. Billy Belcher, the team's Junior Captain, finished fifth overall and third for GSC "Blue" with a time of 28:16. Right behind him was sophomore Steve Keenan, who was sixth overall and fourth, for GSC, in 28:24. The Pioneers' fifth scoring "Blue" team member was sophomore Steve Roberts. He was 15th overall with a time of 30:57. The sixth man of the "Blue" squad was freshman Steve Meckfessel, who turned in

a time of 32:24, good for 20th place.

Glenville's "White" team was paced by junior Randy Anderson. The basketball standout, running in only his second cross country meet, placed 13th overall with a time of 30:32. Senior Craig Bock was second for GSC's "White" team. He was 16th place overall in 31:03. Freshmen Chuck McKnight and Biddle Williams came in 22nd and 23rd, respectively, for Glenville "White". McKnight's time was 32:34, while Williams was a second behind. Finally, Eddie Mazzella, a freshman running in his first meet, placed 33rd with a time of 38:02.

Julian Sulgit, from Chicago, Illinois, was educated in Chicago Catholic Parochial Schools. He attended Loyola University and trained in Urban Mission Work in Chicago and Tulsa. He studied for the priesthood in the Tulsa Diocese. He received his Master of Divinity at United Theological Seminary in Dayton, Ohic in June 1981.

In 1974, the couple returned to Charleston and worked for the Department of Welfare. In 1974 they began the process of or-dination through the United Methodist Conference. Julian was named Deacon in 1976 while Patricia was in 1974 and Julian was named Elder in 1977 and Patricia in 1978. They later became associated with the Urban Mission Progress in the Charleston District. Julian served as Outreach Ministeries pastor of a church, director of food-co op projects, and managed programming. On Thursday, October 1, from 5-8 p.m. in the amphicountry singer theatre. Mike Williams will appear at Glenville State.


Since Williams has played in over 250 colleges and 100 nightclubs nationwide, his show promises to be a first class one.
