Foundations To Receive Grant

The Division of Foundation Studies at Glenville State College has been awarded a basic skills grant totaling \$16,759. The 1981-82 grant, funded under pro-visions of P.L. 94-482 is directed toward the improvement of basic skills, diagnostic procedures, and development of remediation activities for vocational and technical students.

Throughout the project period, faculty in the Divi-sion of Foundation Studies will be involved in the revision and development of in-house screening methods used in diagnosing students' basic skills deficiencies. In addition, the micro-computer learning system current-ly in use for basic skills instruction will be expanded. Computer-assisted instruction in the Division of Foundation Studies became first available for student use in the spring of 1981.

Ford To Explore Athletic Training

Bill Ford has been appointed to explore the possibilities of establishing an athletic training program at GSC. This program is being developed to help meet the mandate requiring an athletic trainer in all West Virginia junior and senior high schools by 1985. A native of McKees-

port, PA, Ford received an undergraduate education degree in health and physical education from Indiana University of Pennsylvania and a master's degree in physical education from East Illinois University. He

has previously worked in the summer training program at Westchester State College, Westchester, PA. The program is funded un-der Title III Federal Grant.

The West Virginia Association of College Teachers will hold its fall meetings October 23 and 24 at Jackson's Mills 4-H Camp.

Beginning on Friday in Jackson's Lodge, there will be a presentation by Barbara A. Smith of Alderson-Broaddus College entitled "The Islanders of Appalachia."

This will be followed by a series of speeches by Ellen Pryor of West Virginia Northern Community College on "Chinese Style and Social Controls in the

Peoples Republic." Following a break, Dr. Chris Orr of Glenville State College will have a presentation called "History Lessons'' or "Brechtian Ćinema is Like Boring Sex." After

this, a film screening of "Sisyphus was a Good Old Boy' and a brief reading of the same story will be done by Dr. Barbara W. Tedford of Glenville State College. The first day of meetings will close with an informal poetry reading.

On Saturday, October 24, at 9 a.m., Lilian Wilson of the University of Charleston will speak on "Growth Through Literature." Fol-lowing her, Virginia E. Leonard of West Liberty College will present the "Sprint of Pleace." "Spirit of Place."

Following a short break, Jean Watson-Rosenbaum of Marshall University will present a "Movement of What Ifs." Closing out the oral presentations is Lee Erick-son of Marshall University

on Browning's "Confused Multitudinousness in Dramatic Romances and Lyrics.'

Following the oral pres-entations, a business meeting will conclude the twoday seminar.

Eaton Gives Summary Of Dissertation

Dr. James Eaton, assistant professor of economics at GSC, presented a sum-mary of his doctoral dissertation at the annual meeting of the Economic History Association recently held in St. Louis, Missouri. His dissertation, "The

Wyoming Stock Growers Association: An Applica-tion of Davis' and North's Theory of Institutional Change", was selected as one of the top three dissertations in American economic history completed during the previous academic year.

Eaton completed his doctorate at the University of Missouri at Columbia and served as an instructor at Arkansas State University. He has been a member of the Glenville State College faculty for six years.

Fall Enrollment Announced

Dean of Records and Admissions, Mack Samples, released the following preliminary information concerning fall enrollment.

The total for full-time students is 1,259. Parttime students are numbered at 739. Of the 1,998 students enrolled, 873 are men and 1,125 are women.

Mr. Samples stated that there were actually more men on campus than wo-

men. This was due to the fact that many women are enrolled at one of the following extension locations: Parkersburg, Lewis County, Clay County, Braxton County, Calhoun County, Summersville, and Craig-town, serving Webster and Nicholas counties.

This is the largest overall total in the history of Glenville State College.

The disease is called apathy. One of the most distressing signs of apathy was the Student Congress Forum. where all students were urged to attend and talk over many of the problems they felt were plaguing the campus.

Less than 50 students showed up for the Forum. That includes the members of Student Congress who were there to help with the set-up. No one can say that they did not know of the Froum. Posters were placed all over campus, letters were placed in all students mailboxes and it was published in the Mercury for two weeks. The problems discussed by the students that did attend are the problems that are always topics around campus. The main activity of most students on campus seems to be to sit in a dorm room or in the Student Union and b____ about the problems, but given the chance to voice them to those in charge is another matter.

But there are more signs of apathy. Take for instance the fraternities and sororities on campus. How many activities do they hold? And when float building time or rush party time comes around, how many people do the work? Usually just two or three, while everyone takes the credit for it.

The campus at GSC needs to come alive, to make their own fun weekends. One professor stresses to many of his English classes that they need to 'cut the apron strings' and get involved. Student Congress can help, by sponsoring more activities on the weekends. But remember, it takes action. That is something that we all must not be afraid of giving. Action, by reading an editorial and responding, not by anger, but by helpful! suggestions.





The Glenville State College Lady Pioneers volleyball team played in two matches last triangular week. On Wednesday, October 14, the team travelled to Alderson-Broaddus. In the squad's first match. they fell to A-B by identical scores of 15-13, 15-13. Individual scoring for this match was as follows: Gina Bailes - 7, Pam Minigh - 5, Laura Dabney - 4, Leah Marlowe - 3, and Poncho Richards - 2. In the team's second match of the evening, Salem won by scores of 15-1, 15-2. Scoring was as follows: Poncho Richards - 2 and Pam Minigh - 1.

On Friday, October 16, the Lady Pioneers hosted Concord and Fairmont. In Glenville's first match, Concord defeated the Lady Pioneers by scores of 15-2, 12-15, and 15-7. Sue Bennett, Laura Dabney, and Leah Marlowe led scoring with six points each. Also scoring for Glenville were Pam Minigh with 4 and Gina Bailes and Robin Fairchild with 3 each.

Fairmont defeated Glenville by scores of 15-10 and 15-4. Individual scoring was as follows: Pam Minigh-6, Gina Bailes - 3, Leah Marlowe - 3, Poncho Rich-ards - 1, and Sue Bennett-1.

Pioneer Gridders Lose to Salem

GSC Football Team its second straight loss last Saturday in college gridiron action. Salem outscored the on 16 carries, and Pott-Pioneers, now 1-4 overall in meyer had 84 yards on and 1-3 in the West Virginia Conference, by a 24-18 margin for its first victory.

The first quarter was scoreless, but both teams put points on the board in the second stanza. Salem managed ten points on a 35-yard field goal and a 24-yard pass play. Then, GSC got a score of its own just before halftime. Byron Brooks, a freshman, gained the end zone from 16 yards out for a touchdown to make it 10-6, Salem.

GSC's opponent tallied 14 points in the third period, while the Pioneers only scored six. One of Salem's scores was from Mike Whiing, a running back who gained 146 yards on 22 car-ries. The Pioneer's score came on a 30-yard pass from sophomore quarterback Jeff Metheny to senior split end Steve Gandee.

The Pioneers tallied again in the final quarter, on a 2-yard run by freshman Joe Mullan, but it wasn't enough. They found themselves on the short end of a 24-18 score.

Freshman Byron Brooks and junior Scott Pottmeyer,

Salem College handed the the WVC's leading kick returner, gained the bulk of GSC's rushing yardage. Brooks gained 86 yards 15 rushes. In the passing department, Jeff Metheny was nine for 19 for 122 yards. He threw one touchdown pass and was inter-cepted once. Steve Gandee had four receptions for 82 yards, and Joe Mullan caught four for 33 yards.

Sophomore defensive back Scott Taylor was in on 12 tackles and had a fumble recovery for GSC's

defense. Five Pioneers, juniors Andy Marchal and Terry Gandee, sophomore Chuck Taylor, and freshman Gary Howe and Stan Crenshaw, were in on nine tackles apiece. Also for GSC, freshman Robert Brown had three quarterback sacks, and junior Bernie Bertus had an interception.

GSC will host West Virginia Wesleyan in a night game on Saturday, October 24. Vincent commented, "We need to be more consistent if we want to win. Game time is 7:30 p.m.

Bowling Team To Compete

The GSC Pioneer Bowling Team, coached by Garry Kight, will see its first action of the season this weekend. The bowlers, led by three returners, will compete in the Mountaineer Classic at Morgantown on Saturday, October 24, and Sunday, October 25.

Two seniors will lead GSC into its first match. Keith Hite, from Winston-Salem, North Carolina, and Dave Lamm, from Parkersburg, are the team's two seniors. The other returner is sophomore Ierry Kurjian of Westfield, Ohio.

The other three members

of the top six consist of a sophomore and two fresh-men. Roddie Brown, a sophomore from Webster County, and Dan Braud and John Waldeck, both freshmen from Parkersburg, round out GSC's top six members. Also playing for GSC are freshman Earl Bell of Weston and freshman Barbara Ross of Akron, Ohio.

In addition to the Moun-taineer Classic, the Pioneers will participate in the Weirton Classic on November 7-8 and several other matches.

GSC Runners Blast Tech

Senior captain P.K. Coon emerged as the individual champion to pace the GSC men's cross country team to a perfect score of 15 in the Pioneers' 15-53 trouncing of West Virginia Tech in a dual meet at Oak Hill last Wednesday. Glenville placed eight runners in the top ten, and the Pioneer harriers were without the services of Larry Taylor, Steve Roberts, and Dave Smith.

GSC used the meet to try out some different methods of racing, in order to help them for the upcoming West Virginia Conference meet. The Pioneers ran the first four miles of the 5.2 mile race as a team.

Coon edged freshman Lee Haddox in the battle for first place. Coon re-corded a time of 29:13, while Haddox was a scant second behind him. Finishing third was junior captain, Billy Belcher. He came across the line in 29:31. Sophomore Steve Keenan was fourth in 29:40. Steve

Meckfessel, a freshman, placed fifth in 30:08. His Meckfessel time made the split between GSC's top five runners an excellent 55 seconds.

Senior Craig Bock was sixth for GSC. His time was 30:44, and it gave the Pioneers the top six finishers in the race. Biddle Williams, Chuck McKnight, and Eddie Mazzella, all three freshman, were eight ninth, and 11th, respecteighth, ively.

Dr. Jim Hilgenberg, the team's coach, praised his team's effort. He pointed out, "We had a specific strategy for the race, and we fulfilled it. The guys ran how I wanted them to and it worked perfectly."

The Pioneers, who are now 20-2 in WVC action, have one more meet left before the all-important conference meet. GSC will travel to Marietta on Sat-urday, Oct. 24 for a quadrangular meet with host Marietta College, Muskingum, and Rio Grande.
