Pribble To Attend Regional Meeting

Dr. Mary Jo Pribble, Associate Professor of Chemistry at Glenville State College, is attending the 33rd annual meeting of the Southcastern Regional Meeting of the American Chemical Society in Lexington, Kentucky November 4-6. The session will be held at the Hyatt Regency Hotel and Civic Center.

Dr. Pribble is presenting a paper, Opportunities for Teaching Chemistry for Elderhostel, at the Chemical Education Section of the meeting.

Exhibits by some thirty suppliers of laboratory equipment and textbooks in chemistry will be presented during the meeting.

College Enrollment Survey Shows Increase In 1981

The quality of West Virginia higher education has been reaffirmed by a study recently released by the WV Board of Regents. In the 17 state schools surveyed, a 76% increase in enroll-ment has occurred in just one year. This is particularly noteworthy since enrollment is in an alarming decline nationwide. The extreme ends of the

scale are Marshall University, which experienced only a 0.2% increase.

A little closer to home, GSC experienced a 4.28% increase by raising its enrollment from 1,916 in 1980 to

1,998 in 1981.

The major cause of this is record-sized freshman class for the fall semester. Other West Virginia Colleges and their increases are: Concord, up 8.6%; Fair-mont, a 1.5% increase; Shepherd, a 3.5% excala-tion; and West Liberty, up

4.4% over last year. Another thing which is an influence on this is outof-state students - just look at those at GSC! Once considered to be a cultural famine, West Virginia is rapidly establishing itself as a most scholarly state indeed.



Shepherd Defeats GSC Football Team

The GSC Pioneer football team went down to defeat at the hands of the Shepherd College Rams Saturday by a 35-14 score. GSC put up a good fight for three quarters, however, as they led their nationally-ranked opponent, 14-7, only to be tied, 14-14, with one period of action remaining. Then, Shepherd tallied three times in the final 15 minutes of play to seal the victory.

Shepherd drew first blood in the WVC battle. Lipscomb scored from the 2yard line, and the extra point kick was good, making it 7-0.

Glenville tallied the next two touchdowns, one in the second quarter and one in the third quarter, to claim a 14-7 lead. Both touchdowns were passes from junior quarterback Jeff Metheny to senior split end Steve Gandee. The first scoring strike covered 29 yards, and the second one went 15 yards. Gandee kicked the extra point after both scores to give GSC a 14-7 lead.

The Rams didn't wait long to retaliate. They scored on their next possession to tie the game at 14-all at the end of the third stanza.

The fourth quarter was all Shepherd. The Rams tallied three times, all three being set up by the passing of quarterback Mike Coyle, who was 12 for 19 for 231 yards.

Freshman Byron Brooks pace GSC's rushing with 69 yards on only nine carries. Senior David Boggess, the Pioneers' top rusher in season totals, had 48 yards on seven carries against Shepherd. Junior Scott Pottmeyer chipped in with 43 yards on 16 rushes. Jeff Metheny was 10 for 23 passing - wise for 188 yards, two touch-

downs, and three interceptions. Steve Gandee's two scoring receptions, his his third and fourth of the season, were among his five catches covering 97 yards against Shepherd.

Defensively, sophomore Terry Kendall had six tackles and seven assists to top Pioneer tacklers. He also had an interception. Junior Bernie Bertus, one of the WVC's leaders in interceptions, added four tackles and six assists. Two juniors, Fred Parsons and Steve Ware, were in on nine stops apiece.

GSC faces a very tough Concord team this Saturday, Nov. 7 in its last home game of the season. Game time is 1:30 pm at Pioneer Stadium.

GSC Runners Aiming For WVC Meet

This Friday is the day for the GSC cross country team. The Pioneer harriers will travel to Fairmont to participate in the West Virginia Conference meet, the meet they've been pointing to all season long. The Pioneers are considered by many to be the top team, due largely to their performance against other WVC schools over the course of the season.

The WVC meet serves as the NAIA District 28 qualifer for national competition. The winning team will compete in the national meet at Kenosha, Wisconsin on Nov. 21.

GSC, coached by Dr. Jim Hilgenberg, is 20-2 against WVC competition this year. One loss was an early-season loss to Fairmont, and the other was to Davis and Elkins at a meet when GSC had only three of its top seven runners competing. At the other meets, the Pioneers were at least ten points ahead of their nearest competition.

Sophomore Larry Taylor, last year's WVC "Runner of the Year," will lead Glenville into the WVC meet. Second through seventh positions on the Pioneer squad are freshman Lee Haddox, Junior Billy Belcher, senior P.K. Coon, sophomore Steve Keenan, senior Craig Bock, and sophomore Steve Roberts. A freshman, Biddle Williams, is the alternate.

GSC, 31-17 overall, will face seven WVC teams in the meet, which will begin at 3:00 pm on Friday, Nov. 6. Fairmont, West Virginia State, West Virginia Tech, Wheeling, West Liberty, West Virginia Wesleyan, and Davis and Elkins will be GSC's competition.

Hilgenberg commented, "We've been working hard to achieve our goal of winning the District 28 meet. Now, we'll just have to wait and see what happens on Friday."
