# Nicholson Receives Honor

Barbara Nicholson has been invited for membership in the most prestig-ious organization for indiv uals whose concern is the power of the written and spoken word. The International Platform Association, founded by Daniel Webster and Josiah Holbrook in the early 1800's is the oldest international association in the United States.

The International Platform Association's membership includes fourteen United States presidents beginning with Theodore Roosevelt, great speakers and writers, the nation's leaders in business, politics and professions--such as Art Linkletter, Jack Anderson, Hal Holbrook and Henry Kissinger. Membership is limited to persons recom-



mended for membership whose application is approved by the Membership Committee and the Board of Governors.

A 1973 graduate of Glenville State College, Nicholson also holds a master's degree in speech communication from West Virginia University. She is a three year member of the Glenville State College faculty where she teaches speech communication and coaches forensics. Previously, the Weston, WV native taught and coached forensics at Gilmer County High School where she coached the team to the 1979 national forensics tournament.

At the college level, Nicholson will be coaching the GSC Forensics Team to an unprecedented fourth consecutive national forensics tournament. She has been responsible for hosting the WVSCA Novice Forensics Tournament for the past three years and the West Virginia High School State Speech Tournament in 1981 and 1982.

Nicholson is a member of the West Virginia Speech Communication Association, National Speech Communication Association, Eastern Communication Association and the International Communication Association. She was named to Who's Who in American Colleges and Universities in 1973 and to Outstanding Women of the Year in 1975.

Glenville State College librarians took an active role at the annual con-ference of the West Vir-ginia Library Association held November 12-14 at The Greenbrier, White Sul-phur Springer

phur Springs. Dr. David M. Gillespie, director of the Robert F. Kidd Library at GSC, was presented with the 1981 Outstanding Service Award. This award is annually pre-sented to a member of the WVLA who has significantly contributed to the association and to librianship in West Virginia.

An immediate past presi-dent of WVLA, Gillespie graduated from Glenville State College in 1964, obtained a master's in library science in 1968 from Indiana University, and most recently completed a doctorate in 1980 in li-brary science from Florida State University. Addition-ally, Gillespie has served in various capacities in the WVLA.

Gillespie is very active in the Glenville community, including the Presbyterian Church, WV Folk Festival, Church, WV Folk Festival, and as former town mayor and municipal judge. He is married to Yvonne Row Gillespie and they have one daughter, Erica.

#### Is Guest Lecturer

Dr. William Brunk, from the Space Science and Application Office of NASA in Washington D.C. was a guest lecturer at GSC on Nov. 18-19.

The Harlow Shapley Visiting Lectureship Program of the American Astronomical Society arranged

his visit. On Nov. 18 at 3:00 pm Dr. Brunk addressed a full room of students in 207 of the Science Hall. During a slide show Dr. Brunk dis-cussed the missions of Voy-ager I and II to Saturn and Jupiter. The slides also showed how infrared wave-lengthe ware used to study lengths were used to study the rings around Saturn, Jupiter and Uranus and the details of the planets. The different satellites of these planets were discussed in regard to material make up, temperature and location.

During the question and answer period Dr. Brunk discussed the following top-

ics: 1. The possiblity of Halley's Comet hitting the

earth in 1986. 2. The "Jupiter Effect" and Dr. Brunk assured his audience that the much publicized doomsday effect of the planet's expected alignment in March, 1982 was a matter of misinformation. **Pioneers Split In Wesleyan Tourney** 

The GSC Pioneer men's basketball team opened its season on Nov. 20-21 by competing in the West Virginia Wesleyan Bobcat Booster Tournament. The Pioneers came away with a split in the tourney, winning one game and losing one.

In the first contest on Friday night, GSC defeated the host Wesleyan Bobcats by a 64-55 margin. Steady play by the Pioneer cagers brought about the victory as Jesse Lilly's team outscored Wesleyan 30-26 in the first half and 34-29 in the second twenty minutes of action.

Junior Scott Ludwig was Glenville's leading scorer on the evening. He was a perfect six for six in both field goals and free throws for a total of 18 points. He also had five rebounds and two steals. Senior Don Bullett, a pre-season All-WVC selection, added 16 points to the Pioneer cause. Also, Junior Jerome Hampton notched 14 points, junior Randy Anderson had ten points and seven assists, and sophomore Clay Young had six points and eight rebounds.

As a team, GSC shot a fine 57.1 percent from the floor and 64 percent from the foul line. Wesleyan outrebounded GSC by a 32-29 count.

In the championship game between the Pioneers and Alderson-Broaddus the next night, the Battlers fought back from a 15 point deficit in the first half to register a 96-90 triumph, dropping GSC's record to 1-1.

For most of the first half, GSC built up a lead which stretched to 15 points at times. A-B, however, whittled away at the Pioneer lead and pulled to within two points at 49-47 at halftime.

The Battlers outpointed GSC 49-41 in the second half for a final margin of 96-90. Good foul shooting (17 for 20) in the second half was a big key in the A-B victory.

For GSC, both Don Bullett and Scott Ludwig ripped the cords for 27 points. Bullett hit 11 of 18 field goals and five of five foul shots. He also led the team with nine rebounds. Ludwig continued his torrid field goal shooting, connecting on 11 of 15 attempts. After two games, the junior from Ripley has an 80 percent field goal mark.

Also contributing for GSC were Jerome Hampton with 15 points, Clay Young with ten points and eight boards, Randy Anderson with six points, Rich Moore with three points, and Chris Bell with two markers.

A busy week is ahead for the Pioneer team. After an away contest with West (Cont. on p. 4)

#### GSC Women Ready For New Season

A good blend of returning players and newcomers this season might give the GSC Lady Pioneer basketball team something it has fallen short of for the past two years – a West Virginia Conference Championship. Two years ago, GSC's women placed third in the WVC tournament. Last season, they were second to perennial power University of Charleston. This season, who knows?

Coach Tim Carney has eight players returning from last year's runner-up team, which had a 17-4 record overall and a 14-2 WVC mark. Leading the list of returners is sophomore Bunny Taylor. Taylor was an All-Conference selection last year as a freshman when she averaged 18.8 points and 8.3 rebounds a game.

Other starters returning are Pam Linger and Pam Minigh, the team's co-captains. Linger, a senior, averaged 11.8 points and 7.2 rebounds per game last year, while Minigh, a junior, had averages of 15.6 and 8.4, respectively.

The remainder of the returning players for Carney includes Donita Cox, the team's lone senior besides Linger, Junior Judy Niday, and sophomores Sonja Bailey, Jill Burkhammer, and Shelly Tharp.

Newcomers, who will help fill a big role with their size, include Maria Lothes, Robin Phipps, Cathy Starcher, Kim Maynard, Janice Hensley, Laura Dabney, and Paula Bush.

Coach Carney remarked, "Our forte will be our depth. We will be more flexible as a whole." Also, Carney pointed out, "Our freshmen will be looked to for immediate help with their size. Overall, this class is the biggest and probably the best ability-wise I've had since I began coaching here."

GSC will have its work cut out for it if it is to be in the running for the conference championship at the end of the season. Carney stated, "UC will be the team to beat again this season. Fairmont will be a threat, and Concord and Tech will be better."

The Lady Pioneers will open their season on Dec. 1 with an away game at West 'Virginia State. Then, on Dec. 3, GSC will host Fairmont State. Another home game will be held on the following day, Dec. 4, with Shepherd. Carney said concerning the student support at games of the past years, "We feel that we have student support as good as any team in the league. The girls and coaching staff really appreciate it." Next games for women's intramural basketball are: December 7-8-Long Shots vs. Sigmas, The Press vs. Rah Rahs; 8:30 TTT vs. Oreos, DA vs. Woodchucks.

All teams are reminded that outstanding woman nominations are due by December 7.

#### Harriers Compete

GSC's men's Cross Country Team completed a successful season by competing in the NAIA National Cross Country Meet at Kenosha, Wisconsin, on November 21.

Of 36 teams participating from all over the US and parts of Canada, GSC finished 31st. A total of 326 runners finished the fivemile race, out of 340 starters

Group discussion included an explanation of the workings of the faulty fuel cells on the second flight of Columbia, and the effects of federal cutbacks

of NASA tunding. At 9:30 a.m. Thursday. Nov. 19, 1981, Dr. Brunk delivered a third address and slide show. This meeting concerned many of the projects with which Dr. Brunk is involved. Slides of the 88 in. optical and the 120 in. infrared telescopes located on Mauna Kea, Hawaii and the 107 in. optical telescope of the McDonald Observatory in Texas were shown and discussed.

'The 1,000 foot diameter radio telescope, in Arecibo, Puerto Rico, is another of the programs that Dr. Brunk manages.

Other slides showed the make-up of asteroids and comets and the studies being conducted with infrared telescopes.

Dr. Brunk is program Manager of Halley Watch which studies Halley's Comet.

Dr. Brunk represents NASA on committees involving the naming of surface features of the planets and their satellites.

As if his schedule were not full enough, Brunk also received word after he arrived on campus, that he had been appointed Chief of the Astronomy and Atmospheric Branch of NASA. In this capacity, he will oversee all studies of the gases of the solar system.
