There is a matter that needs to be aired publicly to the students of Glenville State College. The waitresses here in Glenville do not make minumum wage. The difference between what we are paid and minumum wage is usually made up by tips. This is the way it's set up whether one agrees with the practice or not. Our gripe is that college students generally <u>do not tip</u> and it is discouraging and aggravating. Most of us like our job and feel we do a good job but do not understand why students can spend four to eight dollars on a meal and then leave nothing for the waitress. We take you order, serve the meal in its entirety, and then clean up your mess. Do we not deserve some thing for our effort?

The whole matter wouldn't deserve this much concern except that there are a lot of you here and it makes a difference whether you tip or not. Please consider. The waitresses in Glenville

At the end of each semester we as students are asked to evaluate our instructors, and I feel that as a student, I must speak out against the way the evaluation is taken.

We are handed a computer card with three ways to apply: "Yes, No, and Does Not Apply." Now let me ask you, is that any way to evalaute an instructor that may or may not be doing their job? My answer to that is no. I feel that some of the instructors here at Glenville State really do not get the true evaluation by this matter. Some instructors are better than the credit they recieve indicates, and others are really not doing the job. Therefore, they are being evaluated along with the good. This system, in my opinon, is one-sided. Let us as students who spend our time and money speak out more clearly on how we feel about our instructors, and not have an already-made answer sheet given to us. There are students that have dropped some classes and even changed their majors because the instructors didn't take time to explain to their class more clearly. In this case, how do we evaluate? "Yes, No, and Does Not Apply?"

Considering the fact that Glenville State College is an academic institution with a small collection of educators with Ph. D., M.A. and M.S. degrees in various fields, it seems quite disturbing that the school cannot create a better system for evaluating the faculty. As a concerned student, the present forms are very frustrating and seem to have very little real evaluative capabilities.

When my criticism of the system was voiced, some of our faculty said something to the effect, the students aren't capable of evaluating teaching methods and teachers. Other statements said that students "didn't care and that the evaluations were personality contests". While I recognize that some of these things are true, I firmly believe that the average student is concerned and will not let personality totally affect their evaluation.

The basic problem is that a situation now exists when the faculty evaluates itself. True they are the educated, but we the student must learn from them. Therefore, regardless of how many degrees, regardless of accumulated 'knowledge, the student and the student only knows how effective the teacher is in transmitting what they know to the student. Whether we can recognize different teaching philosphies is beside the point. We do however know whether we have been motivated to learn

and indeed if we have learned from the instructor. We pay for an education, our tax money supports the school, so as a result we the student must be heard. I am glad the Mercury has printed an editorial that addresses

this issue and I hope that it will be pursued further. I hope that other students will voice their opinion and show that they are concerned. A Concerned Student

WVU Hands GSC Women First Loss

A close win over WV Tech and a resounding loss to West Virginia University in action last week moved the GSC Lady Pioneer's basketball team to 4-1 on the season. The games were the last before the Christmas break for GSC.

After falling behind by 14 points at halftime, GSC rallied in the second twenty minutes of play to record its fourth consecutive win. The 71-69 win wasn't decided until the final seconds when Sonja Bailey scored to give GSC the win over Tech, who was undefeated going into the game.

Bailey and Bunny Taylor, both sophomore guards, led GSC's balanced scoring with 14 points each. Senior Pam Linger, who was the WVC player of the week, and junior Pam Minigh followed with 12 points apiece. Also, freshmen Kim Maynard and Janice Hensley added six points each, freshman Maria Lothes had four, and freshman Robin Phipps had three. The WVU Mountaineers

for Glenville in the game on Saturday, which was played as a preliminary to the WVU - Ohio State men's game

WVU held a 52-28 advantage at halftime, then outpointed the Pioneer women by a 49-21 margin in the second half, for a final score of 101-49. Cathy Parsons netted 35 points for WVU.

For GSC, who dropped to 4-1 with the loss, Pam Minigh was the only doublefigure scorer with ten points. Kim Maynard added nine, Judy Niday eight, Bunny Taylor six, Pam Linger five, Janice Hensley three, and Sonja Bailey

Robin Phipps, Paula Bush, and Laura Dabney, two apiece.

GSC could manage only 28.6 percent (20 for 70) from the floor, while WVU was 41 for 89 (46.2 percent).

Coach Tim Carney remarked on his team's performance, "We've been playing pretty good ball, but we were just stunned up there. We didn't have a good game."

Harriers Complete Season The GSC Pioneer Cross was 279th place in 29:14,

The GSC Pioneer Cross Country team, under the direction of Dr. Jim Hilgenberg, recently concluded its season by competing in the NAIA National Meet at Kenosha, Wisconsin.

Official results are in from the meet, in which GSC earned the right to participate by winning the WV Conference meet. The Pioneers, the District 28 representative, placed 31st out of 36 teams present. The 36 teams were out of a total of over 200 nationwide.

GSC's team was comprised of two seniors, one junior, three sophomores, and one freshman. The team's top finisher was sophomore Larry Taylor, who placed 130th over all with a time of 27:10 on the five-mile course at the University of Wisconsin -Parkside. Last year, Taylor competed in the national meet, also. He placed 126.

The squad's only freshman, Lee Haddox, was GSC's second finisher. He was 185th in 27:44. The Pioneer's final three scoring runners finished within 36 seconds of each other. Billy Belcher, a junior, was 261st with a time of 28:43. Sophomore Steve Keenan

was 279th place in 29:14, and senior captain P. K. Coon was five seconds behind in 284th place. The Pioneers' team total of these five places, excluding individual runners, was 845 points.

Craig Bock, a senior, and Steve Roberts, a sophomore were GSC's two non-scoring runners. Bock was 310th place with a time of 30:56, and Roberts placed 324th in 32:10.

Hilgenberg, who didn't get to make the trip due to injuries sustained in a car wreck, commented, "We finished with an impressive record (27-2) and our squad was by far the most cooperative, cordial, and dedicated group of runners that I have worked with at GSC."

GSC should be as strong or even stronger next season. Two members, Coon, a fouryear veteran who has been the team's leader for four years, and Bock--will not return. Everyone else will, though, and with good recruiting, GSC will be favored to repeat as champions next season. Hilgenberg lists three goals for the team: 1) Another solid recruiting year; 2) a good off-season conditioning program; and 3) more championships.

A meeting will be held on Thursday, Jan. 14, 1982 for all men interested in participating in track, both indoor and outdoor. The time and place of this meeting will be posted in the Health Building at a later date.

All men interested in intramural team swimming should turn rosters in to Gary Nottingham by Friday, January 15. Any fraternity or other organization is urged to participate. Events include: freestyle, backstroke, underwater for distance, butterfly, elementary backstroke, freestyle relay, butterfly relay, and backstroke relay.

Gandee Gets WVC Honor

Steve "Reno" Gandee, a senior split end on the GSC football team, was recently named to the honorable mention team of the All-West Virginia Conference Gridiron Squad. Gandee was the only Pioneer team member to be honored.

Gandee had a good vear for the Pioneers, playing split end and handling the kicking chores. The senior co-captain had a team-high 26 receptions for 432 yards and six touchdowns. He also kicked five out of six extra points and two out of three field goals. His point total was 47 points, almost one-half of GSC's team total. His longest field goal was 47 yards, while his scoring catches were of 30, 29, 28, 22, 19, and 15 yards. **Pioneers Lose Two Gam** The GSC men's basketball squad played only two games last week. The Pioneers played WV Tech on Monday night and Salem College on Saturday night. Both games ended in losses, putting GSC at 3-4 overall

The Tech Golden Bears, behind all-conference guard Sedale Threatt, forged to a 38-28 lead at halftime, then held GSC off by a 38-36 margin in the second half for a final score of 76-64.

Senior Don Bullett and junior Scott Ludwig paced GSC's scoring in the loss. Both canned 22 points. Next was sophomore Clay Young with 12 markers. Also, Jerome Hampton added four, and Mike Forbes and Mike Morrison put in two each.

GSC outshot Tech 48 percent to 43 percent, but was outrebounded 51-37. Clay Young was the Pioneers' top rebounder with 14 boards. Don Bullett added seven rebounds and two blocked shots.

The Pioneers dropped their third WVC game in a

row when they travelled to Salem on Saturday. The tall Salem team, one of the WVC's best, outscored GSC 40-36 in the first half and 35-32 in the second half for a final score of 75-68. GSC was in the contest the whole way, being within three points most of the second half. A technical on a controversial play may have turned the tide just as GSC was ready to close in. though, and Salem tallied three straight baskets near the end for a seven-point margin. For the Pioneers, Scott Ludwig was the top point- producer. He landed 24 markers. Clay Young contributed 14 points and nine rebounds, and Don Bullett had 13 points and a team-high 11 rebounds. Also for Glenville, Rich Moore had eight points and three steals, Randy Anderson had five points and five steals, and Mike Forbes and Jerome Hampton put in two points each.

Team-wise, GSC was outshot (50 percent to 36 percent) and outrebounded (40-27) by Salem.
