## College Nearing 110th Birthday

Glenville State College's birthday will be quietly celebrated Friday, February 19. Glenville State will be 110 years old, since she was made a State Normal School on February 19, 1872. For 110 years, the college has provided instruction and practice for public school teachers in the science of education and the art of teaching.

The 110th birthday will not be the significant celebration for Glenville. Glenville will start celebrating her 111th birthday by making available a whiskey decanter on May 8 to all the ABCC Stores. Only 6,000 decanters will be produced and available at under \$30.

The decanter is in the shape of the bell tower, and on the back of the decanter the college seal is depicted with the inscription, "This limited edition decanter commemorates and celebrates the 111th anniversary of Glenville State College. A leading educational institution for over a century - making significant contributions to state, our country, and our world."

Originator of the idea,

Dr. David Gillespie ('65), President of the Alumni Association, thought the celebration would generate more pride among the students and alumni.

In 1972, the 100th anniversary, the College celebrated her existence by making a time capsule and placing it under the bench in front of the Administration Building. Included in the time capsule of 1972 were short messages from the president of Glenville State College, the governor of WV, the mayor of Glenville, the Chancellor of the WV Board of Regents, the president of Student Congress, and the president of the Faculty-Administrative Organization. A complete roster of the student body, faculty, and staff as of September, 1971, copies of *The Glenville Mercury*, *Confrontation*, *Glenville Democrat*, *Alumni Bulletin*, programs of the Centennial Celebration, freshman handbook, and residence hall regulations were included. Along with these, a statement of the purpose of the college, schedules of athletic and cultural events for 1971-72,

and *The History of Athletics of GSC*, compiled by Dr. Robert Dollgener, were added.

Other articles placed in the time capsule were a map of Glenville, a schedule of classes for 1971-72, FAO constitution, Student Congress constitution, a history of GSC, the list of all former college presidents and principals, and a list of all campus social and honor organizations.

A copy of the original deed, a list of the "Alumni of the Year" recipients, and "Faculty Wives Handbook," a copy of the weekly menu from the cafeteria, Folk Festival Programs, a list of 100 outstanding alumni, a copy of the Alma Mater and school song were also on the list of items included.

Also, pictures of queens and activities during the year of 1971-72 were included.

"The 111th anniversary is graphically significant because it suggests Glenville is the first," said Dr. Gillespie. "It also promotes school spirit and enthusiasm, hopefully throughout the year of 1982-83."

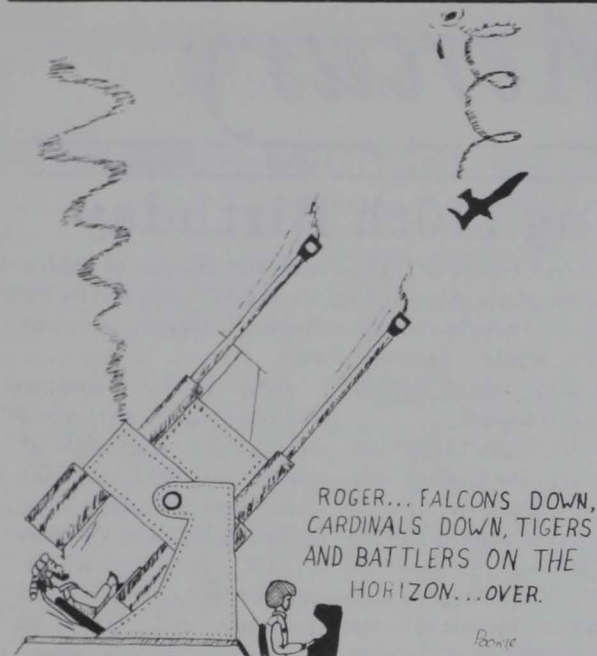

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# King Reviews Band

It was a lovely way to spend a cold, snowy evening -- listening to music from the past - or present - being played by the Big Band -- The Tommy Dorsey Orchestra w/Buddy Morrow.

Those who lived through the Big Band Era found a chance to reminisce; those who have not lived long enough to experience it found the sound delightful!

The expertise of the instrumentalists, plus the showmanship of the director and band, provided exciting entertainment. The presentation was composed of old songs, new songs, popular songs, classical songs, vocals, instrumentals and a taste of various types of music--from "Boogie Woogie" to "Chorus Line," "Night Train," "Copacabana," "In the Mood," "Swanee River," "Once in Awhile," "New York, New York," and "Chicago."

The vocalist, Leif Peterson, was a delightful cross between Frank Sinatra and Terry Bradshaw, who lent much to the Big Band atmosphere. The capacity crowd thrilled to the loud sound, expertly conducted by Buddy Morrow, expert trombonist. Trumpet, saxophone, trombone, piano, bass and drum soloists were also quality musicians. The audience cheered spontaneously, giving a rousing standing ovation at the finale. Buddy Morrow knows the secret of a good performance: leave them begging for more --and even after two hours, they begged for more!

After experiencing a similar performance (Glenn Miller Orchestra), my only comment is that quality-wise they are comparable, but the Glenn Miller presentation was showier and they did play "Stardust!" (A personal favorite!)

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# Pioneers' Victory Over Fairmont Is

It was a long time coming, but the GSC Pioneers' exciting upset of the Fairmont Falcons last week was well worth it.

For the first time since the 1977 WVC Basketball Tournament, the Pioneer Roundballers gained a victory over perennial power Fairmont State.

GSC was victorious over the Falcons by a 72-65 margin in the contest played at the Glenville gym on Thursday night. A packed house of very vocal spectators supported GSC the entire way.

The first half of the game was close all the way as first one team then the other would score. Finally, with the score tied at 19-19, the Pioneer men found a little extra and played their way to a slim, 26-23 lead at half.

GSC kept the pressure up in the second half and secured bigger leads, but the Falcons used a brief rally to pull within 39-37 at the

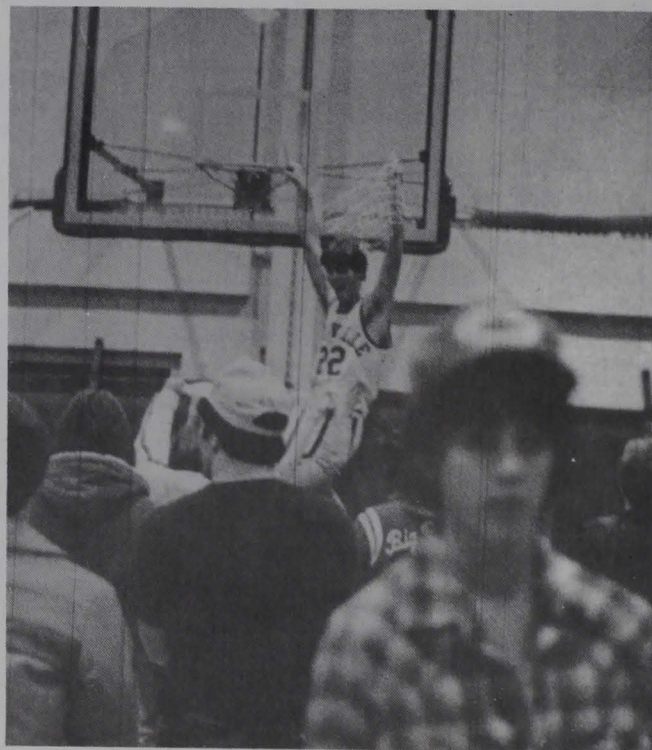
11:19 mark.

The rest of the half was mainly Glenville, though, as the Pioneers simply outplayed Fairmont and made it look easy, building up double-figure leads before Fairmont cut it down to 72-65 at the final buzzer.

In the Pioneers' first meeting of the season with Fairmont, the Falcons won by a 70-58 count. Also, last year in the WVC tourney, Fairmont barely escaped with a 54-48 win in overtime.

Don Bullett's 18 points paced GSC's excellent team effort. Scott Ludwig added 17 points and four steals, and Mike Forbes, in a strong performance off the bench, had 11 points and five assists.

Chris Richardson chipped in nine points and six rebounds, Clay Young seven points and a game-high 15 rebounds, Rich Moore six points, and Randy Anderson four points.

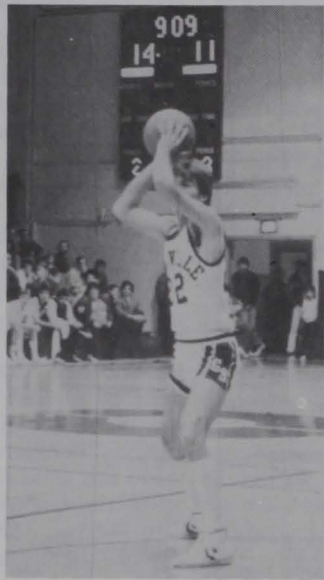

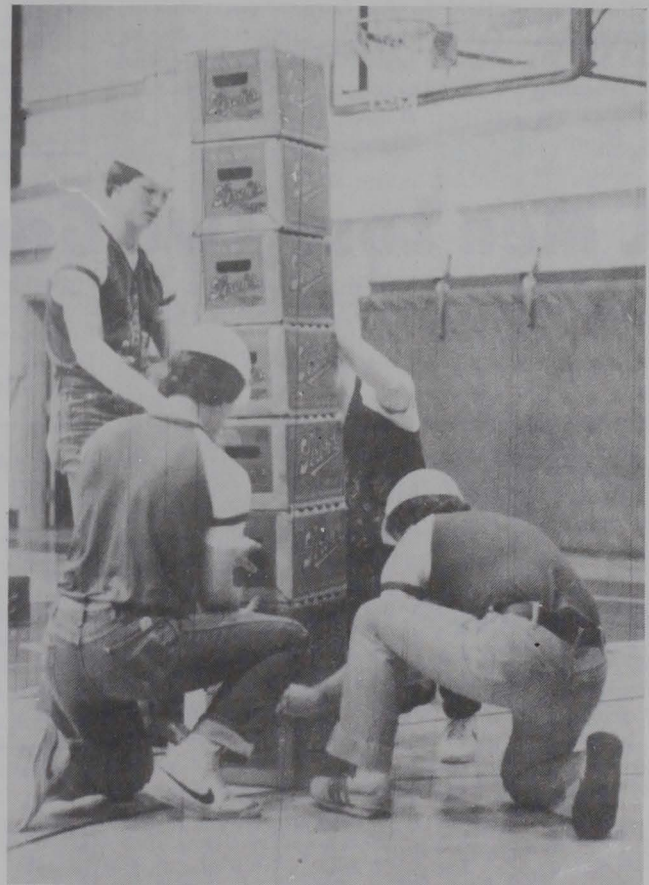

## Ladies Prepare For WVC Tourney

GSC's Lady Pioneers are on the verge of closing out another good season, and hopefully it will end with a Conference Championship.

Today, Coach Tim Carney's women's squad will begin play in the 14-team West Virginia Inter-collegiate Athletic Conference Tournament at Buckhannon. Since a few regular season games remained to be played, final records weren't tabulated by press time; so, official tourney pairings weren't known.

Carney speculated, however, that GSC would probably finish fourth in the standings and most likely have to play Bluefield on Wednesday at either 4:15 p.m. or 7:00 p.m. The tournament will conclude Saturday with both a championship game and a consolation game.

The Lady Pioneers will enter the tournament with a record of 13-6 or 12-7, depending on the outcome of the Fairmont contest on Monday. The only two teams in the tourney field which Glenville hasn't faced this season are Davis and Elkins and Wheeling.

Four players are scoring in double figures for GSC heading into the WVC

Tourney. Junior Pam Minigh is leading with a 12.4 average. Following her are sophomore Bunny Taylor - 11.8; sophomore Sonja Bailey - 10.7, and Senior Pam Linger - 10.5. The other starter, freshman Maria Lothes, has a 7.0 average.

In other statistics, Minigh is pulling down 8.1 rebounds a game, Linger - 6.9, and freshman, Kim Maynard - 6.4. Taylor has recorded a league-leading 103 assists, as well as 56 steals. Bailey has 54 assists and 46 steals.

Carney had these comments concerning the tourney, "We've played well the past two games, and I hope it carries over into the tournament. It will be tough, because there are four or five teams with a good chance of winning it." About his players, he said, "Bunny Taylor has been playing extremely well. Kim Maynard has been playing well, too. Also, getting Robin Phipps back after an injury should help."

As Carney pointed out, student support for the Lady Pioneers has been excellent, and any support at Buckhannon would be appreciated.

## GSC Men Lose Two Games

In addition to their game with Fairmont last week, the GSC men's team had two other close outings last week. These two games resulted in losses, though, as West Liberty edged the Pioneers on Tuesday, and Concord won out over GSC on Saturday.

West Liberty 62, GSC 60

For the second time in a row, a last-second field goal beat GSC. The jump shot by Spencer Johnson with one second remaining put the Pioneers on the short end of the score.
