have made everything real enjoyable!"

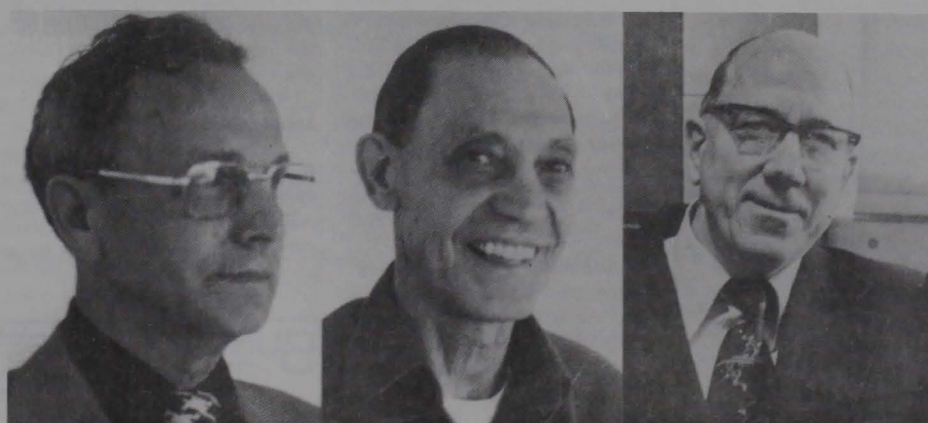
The third retiring member, Taylor, is a 15-year employee of GSC. His position is Building Service Worker II.

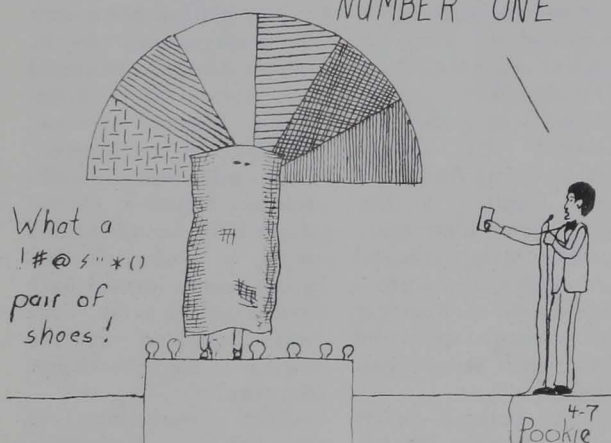

Support Local Blood Drive

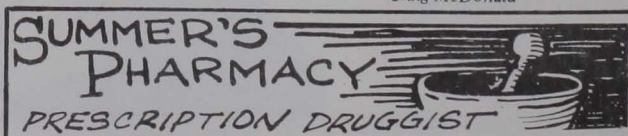
Dear Blood Donor:

Cleve Benedict voted this week NOT to control toxic chemical air pollutants. Can you believe that! Hardly a few weeks have gone by since we were slapped in the face with results of the W. Va. Dept. of Health's Cancer study in North Charleston, right next to FMC & Union Carbide's chemical plants. Those people knew it all along and now it's confirmed: they experience cancer rates DOUBLE the normal. Many North Charleston residents would like to move out, to protect their children and their own health, but they are trapped. Who wants to buy a home where the cancer rates are doubled?

In the Kanawha Valley and the upper Ohio Valley, West Virginians are subjected to millions of pounds per year of these toxic air pollutants, but only four of the hundreds of chemical emissions are currently controlled by the laws. It's time we did something about what is probably W. Va.'s worst air pollution problems. W. Va.'s own Air Pollution Director Carl Beard calls it "atrocious." I say it's time to give Benedict the boot. Write to Senators Byrd & Randolph whose positions are also not satisfactory on this issue.

W. Va. has a higher than average population of senior citizens, whose health is hurt more by air pollution than the young ones. Without your health, you've got nothing.

229 Permits Allotted

Beginning fall semester 1982, a limited number of R-Zoned parking permits will be sold to students residing in Residence Halls. Approximately 184 R-Zoned spaces are available on campus and approximately 45 R-Zoned spaces exist at Eberle Hall on Mineral Road. This will result in a beginning maximum of 229 permits available to resident students. Commuter student permits will not be limited.

These 229 permits will be available to Sophomores, Juniors, and Seniors on a first come - first serve basis on - August 23, 1982 from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. in the Office of Student Affairs. To register a student must present his class schedule slip, vehicle registration card and \$5.00 fee. On Tuesday, August 24, 1982 freshmen may follow the same procedure for registration until the permits are gone.

After the 229 permits are sold, a waiting list will be taken to determine who will have priority as spaces may come available.

This procedure was suggested by the Student Congress and endorsed and approved by the Building and Grounds Committee and the College Council.

Voting Reviewed

Although they vary in detail, the present basic voting requirements are the same in every state. The following is the basic requirements for National, State and Local Elections, although they may vary from state to state:

CITIZENSHIP QUALIFICATIONS - Must be a United States Citizen, and in some states must be a Naturalized Citizen.

AGE REQUIREMENTS - Passage of the 1970 voting rights act, lowered the voting age to eighteen all across the United States.

RESIDENCE REQUIREMENTS - Residence requirements for voting are considered essential so that voters may become familiar with new political conditions and time may be allowed for proper registration of voters in order to prevent gross election frauds. Every state now insists on a period of residence, which varies from six months to two years in the state, thirty days to one year in the county or town, and ten days to four months in the election precinct.

PROBLEMS - There has been little popular response to suggestions that the Constitution of the United States be amended so as to require a uniform national voting requirement. The lack of a uniform national requirement has caused problems for citizens who find themselves having to move from one state to another.

Article IV, Section 1 of the Constiution of the State of West Virginia states, that a person must be a Citizen of the United States, have been a resident of the state for a period of one year prior to the election in which they are wanting to vote, have been a resident of the county in which they are wanting to vote for a period of sixty days, have not been convicted of a felony, treason, or bribery, and be of a sound mind. Article 26, of the United States Constitution as ratified on June 30, 1971, provides that the rights of citizens of the United States who are eighteen years of age or older shall not be denied or abridged on account of age.

Why vote? This is a critical political question in a democratically-oriented society. Many young people in our society are asking themselves this question for the first time. The ideas of many young people about voting, or not voting, may influence the outcome of upcoming elections. Their answers to the question - Why vote? - will affect the tenor of the American policy in the years ahead.

New Morality Or Love Is The Question Of Today

Once upon a time two birds who were greatly worried over the extinction of their species began squabbling over who should sit on the one lone egg in the nest. During the squabble the egg got knocked out of the nest, fell to the earth, and broke. The story is analogous to a generation of youth who can cite every ecological concern and at the same time destroy the very fabric of personal happiness and social survival.

I am referring to the generation of youth who were born in the early sixties while the college profs were debating the relative merits of the new morality espoused in Fletcher's book *Situational Ethics*. The young people in college today - many ready to graduate - are the victims of situational ethics and I should like to explain why.

The moral code adopted by today's youth is given to them by way of their music, movies, TV, a considerable amount of their literature, and in some cases teachers and parents. The cultural emphasis centered on freedom of expression which at once eliminates the traditional standards of conduct and modesty. The shattered walls of respect between the sexes is hailed as healthful openness. Love is redefined as a temporal sensory experience rather than a lifetime building commitment.

By sowing to the wind, we are now beginning to reap whirlwinds. In many elementary classrooms one is fortunate to find five children from a stable two-parent home. This is in spite of the human off-spring's developmental needs of nurturance and identification. These children are products of the new morality and they are growing up miserable. As the adults of these children grow older they, too, grow cynical, neurotic, and abusive. It is no wonder, then, that under such depression that 57 young people in this nation try to kill themselves every hour. Many others try to escape by way of drugs. Our young people are living as though there is no tomorrow.

But, yes, Virginia, there is a tomorrow and today is the first day of the rest of our lives. We must by intellectual assent as well as by our feelings know that a flouting of moral law makes mockery of the holiest, noblest, of all human institutions - marriage and the home. Love is not a noun, it is a verb and it is work. Dr. Sal Gordon in a recent UPI article, stated: "Much of the emotional and psychological wreckage from teen-age sex won't strike hardest until later in life and will lead to, among other things, enormous psychological, emotional, and marital problems." He cites the results of youth sexual activity as a national social disaster. Young people cannot play with fire without getting seriously burned. The mating act is a communications act, even for the serial monogamists who claim to have sex for love. To communicate an enduring relationship; i.e., the two have become one, when the slightest whim can destroy the relationship is to behave hypercritically. When separation does come, intense emotional hurt ensues either for one or both partners and often times a sordid distrust of the opposite sex in general. Such experiences make the future establishment of marriage and the home precarious at best. In addition to the social and emotional chaos there are problems such as 1.3 million unwanted pregnancies and a national VD epidemic.

What can young people do? First of all recognize the fallacies of the youth culture and the new morality. Make an intellectual commitment to the future welfare of yourself, your friends, and the society. Redefine love again. Love lasts. Search for enduring values. Do not sell yourself cheaply but keep yourself for the home building roles of husband - wife and parent. If you are a virgin take pride in your status and protect it; if not, make a new beginning. "Come ye out from among them and be ye separate." Thus saith the Lord.

In its only action of the week last week, the GSC Pioneer Baseball Team swept a doubleheader from Rio Grande to raise its record to 4-6.

GSC captured the first game by a 7-5 score. In it, Jeff Shriner knocked a two-run homer in the eighth inning for the margin of victory. The Pioneers used a fielder's choice by Randy Edge to win the second outing by a 1-0 count.

Mark Hash pitched 4 2/3 innings to gain the win in the first game for GSC. Shriner went 2-2 with two RBI's and David

Hall was 3-5 with two RBI's.

Terry Mullens pitched a two-hit shutout for GSC in the nightcap. He struck out three and walked two in his seven-inning stint. Hitting-wise, Brian Dowsey led Glenville with a 2-3 performance.

On Monday, GSC was to make up a twin-bill with Salem, and on Tuesday, the Pioneers were to play UC. Finally, on Thursday, April 8, Alderson-Broadus will tangle with GSC on the Pioneers' home field, if the playing field is ready by that date.

Men Tracksters Place Fifth

Last weekend, the Pioneer Men's Track Team placed fifth of five teams at the Don Frail Relays in Marietta. GSC scored 36 points in the meet.

No GSC participant placed higher than third. Placing third for the Pioneers were as follows: the 4x200 meter and 4x100 meter Relay Team of Scott Pottmeyer, Kenny Minifield, Dave Smith, and Virgil Davis; the Sprint Medley Team of Minifield, Davis, Don Bullett, and Mark Price; and the 4x800 meter Relay Team of Eddie Mazzella, Dexter Beckett,

Fourth place finishes were gained by the following: the Distance Medley relay team of Mazzella, Beckett, Coon, and Craig Bock; the 4x400-meter Relay Team of Price, Bullett, Chuck McKnight, and Rick Haught; and Coon in the 5,000-Meter Run. Bock was fifth in the 5,000. Brissey was seventh in the 400-meter intermediate hurdles.
