School of Medicine. He completed internship and residency programs at Wal-ter Reed Army Medical Center in Washington, DC.

Dr. Shock has developed the Ultrasonic Cataract Removal Device Phacofragmentor, for which he has been awarded three patents. Shock was also instrumental in the production of a specialized cryo probe, Phacocryolysis, used in the procedure for softening nuclear sclerotic cataracts: and the Infusion-Aspiration Needle Modification, a procedure for the removal of peripheral cortical cataratous material. 

Keenan Praises "Witches

The director, cast and crews of GSC Theatre's last production of the school year attempted to bring to life the last three witches left on Earth and succeeded very well.

First of all, I feel all the crews should be strongly commended on all their hard work which helped to make the show the success it was. The set, costume, props, lighting, and sound were excellent. The set was one of the most complete I have ever seen at GSC and its bizarre, "aged" purple coloring (EVERYTHING was purple!) definitely added to the general atmosphere of the show. Brilliant, eye-catching costumes, special sound and lighting effects, and believable props further added to the tone of the show. The crew for house management should also be praised for its work with the children attending the shows.

The cast of the show includes Tammi Igo as Winona, the Unwicked Witch; Mark Norman as Lucky Luke; Kent Woofter as Wobble, the great-great-grandmother witch; Gary Ross as Gobble, the grandmother witch; and Mark Kozlowski as Sad Simon, Lucky Luke's grandfather.

The part of Winona is everyone's preconceived childhood notion of sweetness and innocence and the Clay County sophomore played Winona to her most wholesome. Ms. Igo gave the children in the audience a heroine to cheer for, which was one of the main points of the entire show.

Just as Winona became the children's heroine, Norman, as Lucky Luke, became the hero of the piece. Norman portrayed Luke with the typical chivalry expected as he pushed his way into Winona's life and cheekily saved the day.

If a "star" of the show had to be chosen, I would say the Kent Woofter's Wobble emerged as the victor. Woofter's portrayal of the evil elder witch gave the children many chills and at the end of the show, he was able to handle the transition from evil to good smoothly. He attempted to get the children involved in the show and did so with seemingly little effort.

Ms. Davidson and Ross, as Hobble and Gobble, teamed up to cause many laughs among the audience. Both have their own distinct styles and the children loved them.

Kozlowski portrayed an old man searching for his lost tune. While he was not as exuberant upon finding his lost tune at the end of the show as one might expect, he did a fine job as the broken-hearted grandfather.

Special laurels go to the director, Linda McKown, and stage manager, Jupe Morton, for all their dedication and hard work.

Orr Receives to Make Film Grant

A grant has been awarded to Dr. Christopher Orr for the production of a narrative film depicting nineteenth century Appalachian Culture.

"A Fragment of Stained Glass" written about a serf of medieval England by D.H. Lawrence is the material that filmmaker Chris Orr decided to base his film on. The setting is changed to West Virginia in the 1900's. Also, the script for the 30minute docu-drama was funded for \$11,489 by the Humanities Foundation of West Virginia.

The main story concerns a young hired hand who, after a dispute with a landowner, burns down the landowner's stables and barn. Depending upon one's interpretation,

Orr said, the hired hand either burns to death or escapes, taking a young woman with him.

The main story is introduced and concluded with scenes of an old man telling a ghost story about the hired hand to a young child some 50 years later.

Of particular interest to Orr is the way the ghost story was used as a method of social control in early West Virginia history.

There will be history consultant throughout the project helping to maintian the air of authenticity. Those involved are: Ruel Foster, Professor of English at WVU, James Gay Jones, W. Va. scholar and author of regional folklore, Frederick Armstrong of W. Va.

Department of Culture and History, and William Wood, Professor of Anthropology at Ohio University.

The first part of the docu-drama will be shot on location at Glenville. Chris Orr will be looking

for actors to portray the parts needed. Fran Davis is to be the female lead.

The Pioneers won game No. 2 by a 9-1 Tally. Mike Pszczolkowski pitched the win. Bill Del Prince was 3-4, and Randy Edge and Mark Martin both hit homers.

Playing their third twinbill in three days, the Pioneers dropped two games to Davis and Elkins, one of the top teams in the

WVC. The scores were 17-7 and 16-2.

The Pioneers, coached by Gary Nottingham, finished their regular season last week with a 5-4 record, the first winning season ever at GSC.


Women Place 4th

Track Team Places Third

The GSC Pioneer Men's Track Team competed in Virginia the West Conference Track and Field Championships this past weekend, and the Pioneers nearly pulled off second place in the team scoring.

West Virginia State won the meet with 215 points, while West Virginia Wesleyan edged out GSC, 110-103, for the second position. West Liberty was fourth with 73 points, and Fairmont was fifth with 43 points.

GSC captured only one first place finish in the meet, compared to seven the week before in the Pioneer Invitational. The first place came in the 4x100-Meter relay. Scott Pottmeyer, Don Bullett, Ken Minifield, and Virgil Davis teamed up for a time of 43.1 to win the event.

The two top scorers for Coach Jerry Milliken's squad were Larry Taylor and Minifield. Taylor, a sophomore, tallied 24 points by placing second in each of the three distance races; the 1500, 5000 and 10,000-Meters. Minifield, a freshman, scored 221/2 points in a variety of events. He was a member of the winning 400-Meter relay

Also for the GSC women, Laura Dabney gained second in the Long Jump and sixth in the discus. Janice Hensley was fourth in the 1500. Karen Terry was fourth in the javelin, Donita Cox was fifth in both the

team, placed second in the 100-Meters, third in the 200-Meters, fourth in the Long Jump, and fifth in the Javelin.

Other scorers for GSC were: Scott Pottmeyer, third in the 400, fifth in both the 100 and 200, and a member of both the 400 and 1600-Meter relay teams; Virgil Davis, third in the 100, fourth in the triple jump, and a member of the 400-Meter relay team; Mark Price, third in the 800, fourth in the 400, and a member of the 1600 Meter relay team; Gary Brissey, third in the 400 Intermediate Hurdles, fifth in the 110 High Hurdles, and fifth in the Triple Jump; Don Bullett, sixth in the 400, and a member of both relay teams; and Rick Haughtmember of the 1600 relay team.

Coach Milliken was pleased with his team's performance. He said, "Our guys ran well. We were close to placing second. Overall, it was an outstanding effort to cap a good season." Also, Milliken remarked, "I would like to thank all the people who make the meet a success in organizational terms."
