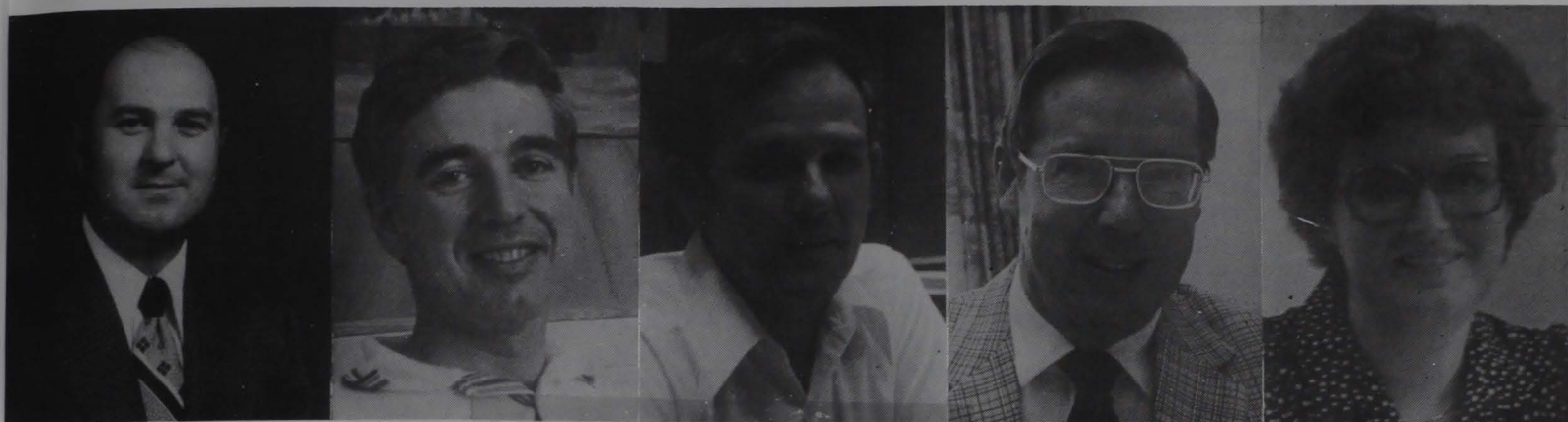

New Members Appointed To Board

Six new members have been appointed to the Glenville State College Board of Advisors for the 1982-83 year. They are Anita Harold Ashley of Spencer, WV; Mrs. Mary Singleton of Clarksburg, WV; Dr. Harry B. Heflin of Morgantown, WV; Annetta Haddox of Auburn, WV; Mrs. Beatrice Brown of Burnsville, WV; and Ms. Virginia West, Troy, WV.

In an organizational meeting held July 8th, Philip A. Reale of Glenville was elected chairman and Dr. Kenton E. Harris of Parkersburg was elected as vice-chairman.

The Board unanimously endorsed the interdisciplinary studies program which is planned for implementation for the Spring 1983 semester. "This program allows the student flexibility in concentrating in his/her areas of interest," said Dr. William Simmons, President of Glenville State College. "The interdisciplinary program is tailored for the student by the student and a

committee of faculty who will advise the student. This also offers an alternative to teacher education and adds additional flexibility," he continued. Students who graduate in the interdisciplinary studies program will receive the bachelor of arts degree.

The Board was also introduced to the Board of Regents Policy Bulletin No. 44 which deals with admission standards for college and universities in West Virginia. Set for implementation for the Fall 1983 semester, students will be expected to meet certain criteria before being admitted. Students will be required to have a 2.0 grade point average, a composite score of 14 on the ACT, or to have successfully completed the GED. If a student does not meet one of these requirements, the student may be admitted provisionally and his/her progress will be assessed each semester.

This is the second year for the Board of Advisors at Glenville State College. (con't. on p. 4)

Welcome, Freshmen! The first week of the fall semester is going to be a hectic one for all incoming freshmen and returning students of Glenville State College. Today, August 22, the Residence Halls are opening at 9:00 p.m.

At 1:30 p.m. to 2:15 p.m. there will be a parents' and students' convocation in the auditorium of the Administration Building. President William K. Simmons and other administrative officers will provide a general orientation for incoming students and their parents. Immediately following the convocation, refreshments will be served at the President's Reception in the Ballroom of the Pioneer Center.

At 6:30 p.m. Sunday night Residual Freshman Testing will be held in the gymnasium of the Physical Education Building, for all students who had not attended freshman orientation in the summer. 8:00 p.m. to 9:00 p.m. an ice-cream social is to be held on the walkway of the amphitheater for all freshmen, faculty and staff. On Monday, August 23, all students will have their identification card photograph taken in the Ballroom from 8:00 a.m. to 4 p.m. This should be done prior to completing the registration process. Upperclassmen who have already pre-registered may pay their fees in the Little Theater (Room 208) of the Administration Building, beginning at 8:00 a.m. Financial Aid checks may be picked up at this time also.

Freshman campus tours are scheduled for August 23 at 9:30 a.m., 11:30 a.m., 5:30 p.m. and 7:00 p.m. At 9:30 the "West Virginia Hootenanny" featuring The Roberts Brothers Band will be playing in the Amphitheater.

Tuesday, August 24, offers students a second chance to have I.D. pictures taken and a chance for freshmen to register and pay fees from 8:00 a.m. to 4:00 p.m. All freshmen must attend the freshman meeting scheduled at 8:30 a.m. in the Auditorium.

A picnic will be held on the walkway along the amphitheater Tuesday evening at 5:00 p.m. for all Glenville State College students.

At 7:00 p.m. freshmen will attend a meeting in the auditorium to elect their class representative for Student Congress. Also at this time, freshmen will meet the 1982 cheerleaders, football team and coaches. Finally, a mixer will be held at 9:00 p.m., Tuesday night in the Ballroom of the Pioneer Center.

Clinic Explains Policy

The Kyle Clinic staff hopes you have enjoyed a nice, healthy summer and are ready to 'tackle' your books once again. We enjoyed serving you last year and look forward to another great year with the college students.

We encourage all students to use our facilities when needed. Each student, freshman and returning student, needs a Health Examination form on file at the clinic. If you do not have one, we encourage all students to get it as soon as possible. We can perform the physical; however, that care is not covered by your student fees. Medical history provides important information which enables us to better care for you.

The clinic office hours are Monday through Friday, 9:00 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. Students will be seen on an appointment basis only. Every effort will be made to see the student on the day that you call. However, overcrowded days may force us to see the student on the following day. Emergencies will be handled at the time of occurrence.

NOTE: No routine appointments will be made for Thursdays. You should make an effort to seek medical attention prior to Wednesday evening for non-emergency problems. Someone will be in the office to answer your calls Monday through Friday.

Student fees cover routine medical expenses. Any optional care such as x-rays, blood tests, emergency care, etc., must be taken care of by you.

Following are guidelines for you to follow in the event you need medical attention:

1. Call the clinic for an appointment. (462-5708)
2. Check in at the medical office window of the Gilmer County Medical Center. Student ID's will be requested at the window. The Center is located one fourth of a mile on Mineral Road. The building is on the left hand side of the road before reaching the football field.
3. Please come at appointed time to avoid a long waiting period.
4. If you cannot keep your appointment, please call to cancel so another student may be seen in your place.

New Faculty and Staff Fill Positions

Seven new faces can be found on the Glenville campus this fall, as Maria Catlett, Dr. Jo Cleek, Gloria Koribanic, John McKinney, Gary Snyder, Dr. Lawrence Stahlberg and Ann Woody begin their duties. Maria has been named Associate Director of the Pioneer Center, and will serve as Joe Drahnak's assistant. Maria is a graduate of WVU with a degree in Sociology and Anthropology. She is currently working on her Master's Degree. She has had experience in working with students while at WVU, where she worked as a Student Supervisor, and Weekend Operations Supervisor. Maria stated that her job entailed "a little bit of everything."

Hailing from Gate City, VA, Dr. Jo Cleek will begin her duties of Teaching and Supervising Student Teaching and Course Work for Early Childhood Education. Dr. Cleek has an EDD degree and a Doctorate in Supervision from East Tennessee State and the University of Tennessee in Child Development. Dr. Cleek will teach Student Teaching, and a section of Education 100.

Teaching all Computer Science classes will be Gloria Koribanic, a graduate of Dusquene University with her Master's in Computer Science. Her undergraduate work was done at the University of Pittsburgh and she is also a graduate of the I.C.M. School of Business. While in graduate school Ms. Koribanic taught as a graduate assistant. Ms. Koribanic has also worked as a teacher in the South Allegheny School system and as a computer programmer.

Planning such changes as new uniforms, 18 new flags, new equipment and a possible trip to neighboring schools, is the new band director John McKinney. Mr. McKinney is a native of West Union, WV and is a graduate of GSC. Mr. McKinney recieved his Master's Degree from WVU and has spent seven years as band director at Calhoun County and two years as percussion director at WVU.

A 1976 graduate of GSC, and a 1979 graduate of Miami of Ohio with a Master's degree is Gary Snyder, who will be teaching Botany/Dendrology, and Insect Disease Control. Gary will receive his Ph.D. in Bi-

ology this fall. His experience includes a teaching fellowship and as an instructor at Miami of Ohio.

Ann graduated with a degree in Elementary Education with a specialization in Language Arts 4-8. Ann is a native of Parkersburg, and will be serving as Admissions Counselor, in the Administration Building. Her duties include correspondence with interested students, campus tours, traveling through the state for high school career days, college days and college fairs.
