

## Cafeteria Changes Face

What has happened to the cafeteria? Why has the serving line been changed and what is a juke box doing in the cafeteria?

These questions may have fogged the minds of many returning dormitory students of GSC who have previously eaten regular meals in the cafeteria. These changes are the beginnings of better and more efficient food service.

Mr. Joe Drahnak, Director of Food Service, has begun a new program to help enhance the meals offered. The program will consist of three items: a meal ticket, a hole punch, and the student. The students will be offered the chance to eat in the cafeteria or the pizza shop. The coupon system will not be used, due to the poor performance of the program in previous years.

The system, being adopted this year, will flow as follows: The students will receive a meal ticket every two weeks, with the days and meals represented. Everytime a student eats either in the cafeteria or the pizza shop, that meal will be deleted from the ticket. This simply means one may opt to dine in the pizza shop or cafeteria, but not both for the same meal.

With this option, Mr. Drahnak will be operating two fast and efficient food service systems. The juke box will offer students selections of the top 100 songs free for their listening pleasure.

With these new improvements the students who eat in the cafeteria will get a square meal at a good price.

## Freshmen Survey Conducted

In October of last school year, freshmen students were surveyed to glean their opinions on various areas of college life. # Gridders Preparing For Season

With the upcoming gridiron campaign at GSC rapidly approaching, Coach Frank Vincent took some time out recently to evaluate the 1982 Pioneer Football Program.

Vincent, entering his third year as head coach of the Pioneers, commented on his 78-member squad, "Overall, we're pleased with our progress. Our players have developed a good attitude and are anxious to play. They've come a long way, but still have a way to go."

A total of 38 returning players and 40 freshman recruits currently compose the squad. Vincent will count on the returnees for leadership, but he will have to use some freshmen early in the season. Vincent said, "Our first three or four games will determine

our success. It all depends on how quickly we adapt, especially the freshmen." He added, "Hopefully, we'll show better things than the past two years."

The team has been practicing for about three weeks in preparation for this Saturday's season opener at Waynesburg, Pa. A scrimmage this past Saturday gave the coaching staff an idea of what to expect for the coming season.

Assistant coaches this year for Vincent, who missed the first week of practice due to surgery, are Mark Reger, Jerry Milliken, Ollie Pottmeyer, and Randy Hunt.
