#### Runners Compete In Marshall Meet

men's cross country team opened its season last weekend by participating in the 11th annual Marshall University Invitational. The Pioneers, with only five runners competing, placed eighth of nine teams, most of which were NCAA schools.

The Pioneer runners scored 210 points, 38 points ahead of West Virginia State College, the only other WVC school at the meet. Ohio University won the meet with 30 points.

Junior Larry Taylor led GSC with a 19th place finish. His time for the 5-mile course was 26:30 unofficially. Senior captain Billy Belcher captain Billy Belcher was next for GSC. He placed 41st in 28:50. The Pioneers' other senior member, Pat Goursey, placed 45th in 29:30. Pat Godfrey,

Chris Keister, a junior, was 46th in 29:45 in his first race in nearly two years. GSC's fifth runner was junior Steve Roberts, who finished in 36:15 for 59th place.

Dr. James Hilgenberg, coach, the team's the team's coach, commented, "In this meet, we were up against bigger schools, which is the best way to improve. Everyone ran pretty well." He also remarked, "We had two of our top runners missing, and most of the others were recovering from a long race the previous weekend or still working themselves into shape."

GSC will host its own meet this Saturday, Sept. 18, beginning at 10:30 a.m. Volunteer help as well as vocal support is needed to insure the meet's success.


