## Financial Aid Programs Undergo Changes

Congress has approved a measure to change the treatment of Veterans Benefits in determining Pell Grant Eligibility, according to Rick Simon, Glenville State College Financial Aid Administrator. Veterans interested in applying for a Pell Grant or review of their current application should contact the financial aid office.

Also, just to remind the students at Glenville State College who have financial aid here is the Satisfactory Progress Policy that is enacted for the financial aid recipients by the Academic Affairs Committee.

Students receiving aid under any Title IV program (campus based federal aid, Pell Grants, GSL's) must meet the following standards of academic progress in order to continue their eligibility.

1. Full-time students must complete (anything except "W," "WP," "WF," or "FIW") at least 12

semester hours each semester. These hours may include foundation studies and repeats provided that the repeats are in accordance with BOR Repeat Policy. Failure to complete 12 hours for any given semester will result in a warning letter from the Financial Aid Office. Failure to complete 12 hours following the semester of the warning will result in total loss of aid. Students may re-establish their eligibility by completing 9 hours in one semester without aid.

2. Part-time students must register for at least 6 hours in order to qualify for Title IV aid. Students who register for 6-8 hours must complete 6 hours or they will receive a warning letter from the Financial Aid Office. Failure to complete 6 hours during the semester following the warning will result in a total loss of aid. Students who register for 9-11 hours and who fail to

complete 9 of the hours for which they are registered will receive a warning letter from the Financial Aid Office. Failure to complete at least 9 hours during the following semester will result in a total loss of aid. Students may re-establish their eligibility by completing 9 hours in one semester without aid.

3. Full-time students receiving Title IV aid must also complete their programs within the time frames established below:  
4-year program - 10 Sems.  
2-year program - 6 Sems.

4. The President of the College will establish a Financial Aid Appeals Committee consisting of the Dean of Records and Admissions, Financial Aid Officer, one faculty member, and one student. This committee will hear appeals on any of the above provisions. The decisions of the committee will be final. Jackie Mullens

the following procedure should be followed:

1. Present a valid Glenville State College I.D. Card.

2. One ticket per I.D. will be issued.

3. The validated I.D. and ticket must be presented on the evening of the concert for admission.

4. Additional tickets for non-students, staff and faculty available at \$5 each. Any leftover tickets will be on sale in the Public Relations Office, 102 Pioneer Center (9 a.m. - 3 p.m.). There are only 350 student, staff and faculty tickets and 150 general admission tickets available.

## Camping Expeditions

Is your weekend boring and without excitement and adventure? Well, you can solve your problem and earn a one hour credit at the same time by attending one of Glenville State College's Weekend Recreation Adventure Series. Recreation Backpacking and Basic Rock Climbing were scheduled but were canceled due to lack of interest.

Here is something that will catch your interest and fill up some of that boring and unexciting time you have, Recreation Caving. The trip was scheduled for an entire weekend but it has been cut down to one day and the cost has also lowered from \$25 to \$15. The cave that will be visited will be in the Germany

First off, since there's a home football game this weekend, we'll discuss the gridders of Coach Frank Vincent. The Pioneers, although still playing their hearts out, are in the midst of a two-game losing streak. They continue to display good ability but have lost two close games recently.

This weekend's game with Mercyhurst is crucial in GSC's bid for a winning season, so let's get out to Pioneer Stadium Saturday and support them with some 'Pioneer Pride.'

A team which you don't get a chance to see very often, except in their training runs around campus, the GSC cross country team is right on schedule for the Nov. 5 conference meet. The Pioneer harriers, led by potential All-American Larry Taylor, continue to improve and are currently 12-3 against WVC foes.

Last, but not least, is the Lady Pioneer volleyball squad. Although they haven't seen a lot of action yet, reports indicate that the ladies are improved from 1981. We'll get our first look at them on Oct. 13 when they host a triangular match in the gym.

## Runners Place Fourth In Meet

GSC's men's cross country team placed fourth out of 12 teams at the West Virginia State College Invitational this past Friday at Coonskin Park.

Shippensburg, Pa. captured the team title with 42 points. California State, Pa. was second with 43 points, Fairmont State College was third with 98, and GSC was fourth with 104. The Pioneers were only six points behind Fairmont, as compared to 30 points the last two meets.

Junior All-WVC performer Larry Taylor continued his impressive individual running, placing third overall with a time of 29:59 on the rugged, five-mile course. He was 41 seconds off the winning pace.

The team's only freshman, Ed Iseli, turned in a strong performance. He placed tenth overall in 31:48. GSC's next three scoring runners were bunched closely place-wise.

Senior Billy Belcher finished 25th in 32:48, junior Steve Keenan was 32nd in 34:03, and senior Pat Godfrey was 34th in 34:43.

Steve Roberts and Mark Price were GSC's two non-scoring participants in the meet. Roberts, a junior, was 50th in 37:17, and Price, running in his first cross country meet, placed 59th in 38:05.

GSC, now 12-3 in the West Virginia Conference, will not compete again until Wednesday, Oct. 13. On that date, the Pioneers will run against West Virginia Tech in a dual meet at Oak Hill. Then, on Oct. 16, GSC will compete with Marshall and Morehead in a triangular meet at Huntington. Finally, on Tuesday, Oct. 26, GSC will run in a triangular meet with West Virginia Tech and West Virginia State at Oak Hill.

## Women Spikers Begin Season

The Lady Pioneer volleyball team competed at Salem on Sept. 27 and Concord on Oct. 1-2. Coach Chico said, "With each match, we gain more valuable experience. These first two matches were good for the girls, especially the Concord outing. In it, we got to play against better teams than usual."

Salem College was GSC's opponent in a dual match at Salem on Sept. 27. The Pioneer lady netters fell by scores of 10-15, 12-15, 15-13, and 6-15.

Pam Minigh had 11 serving points to pace Glenville. Laura Dabney scored ten, Gina Bailes and Wendy Healy had seven each, and Jewell Rankin and Leah Marlowe both scored four.

Glenville participated in the Concord Invitational on Oct. 1-2. The women finished third of four teams in their pool.

In the first match, Concord bested GSC, 8-15 and 10-15. Then, Coastal Carolina beat the Lady Pioneers, 16-14, 11-15, 8-15. The GSC netters decisioned Milligan, Tenn., 15-8 and 15-12 in the third and final match.

Jewell Rankin's 20 points were tops for Glenville during the tournament. Leah Marlowe added 18, Wendy Healy 13, Gina Bailes 12, Laura Dabney 11, and Pam Minigh nine.

This Friday, Oct. 8, GSC will compete in a triangular match with Shepherd and Dundalk. The ladies' first home match, with Salem and A-B, will be on Wednesday, Oct. 13.

# GSC Loses Second Game

A fourth-quarter touchdown led the West Liberty Hilltoppers to a narrow, 10-7 triumph over the Glenville State College Pioneers in the 'Toppers' Homecoming game Saturday.

The loss was the second in a row for Coach Frank Vincent's Big Blue. Their slate is now 2-2-1, 1-2-1 in the West Virginia Conference.

GSC drew first blood in the contest, when Byron Brooks bulled over from the one-yard line in the first quarter. Jim Weidemoyer supplied the extra point to make it 7-0, GSC. The Pioneers could not muster another score, while West Liberty tallied a field goal in the third quarter and a touchdown in the fourth frame to pull out a 10-7 win.

Mistakes hurt GSC throughout the game. The Pioneers lost four fumbles and had a penalty which nullified an 85-yard gain by Brooks late in the game.

Brooks was held to 79 yards on 24 carries by West

Liberty. So far in 1982, he had gained 701 yards. Joe Mullan picked up 23 yards, and Dale West had 15 yards on three carries.

Quarterback Jeff Metheny hit nine of 17 passes for 94 yards and no interceptions. Steve Williams caught four for 31 yards, and Mullan snared three for 31 yards.

Rod Abrams and Gary Howe both had four tackles and six assists to lead the Glenville defense. Abrams also had a fumble recovery.

David Darst recorded four tackles, five assists and a quarterback sack, and Scott Taylor had three tackles and six assists.

Coach Vincent, putting the WL game behind him and looking ahead to the Mercyhurst game Saturday afternoon, remarked, "We have to kick up our heels and play this weekend. Mercyhurst runs a wish-bone offense, which will require defensive adjustment on our part. Also, they use a 6-1 defense, which will require offensive adjustment on our part."

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# 111 Startling Facts About GSC

1. In spring of 1872 thirty-two residents of Gilmer met in the little red brick courthouse in Glenville for the purpose of establishing a branch normal school.
2. The first president of this association was Harrison Cain, a blacksmith, farmer, and clerk of county court.
3. Fifty-six residents of the surrounding area each donated anywhere from \$5 to \$100 for the construction of the college.
4. T. Marcellus Marshall was appointed first Assistant Principal.
5. In the summer of 1872 a Normal School Association was formed to provide land and building for the school.
6. Three thousand dollars were subscribed by the committee for the buildings of the school.
7. On January 14, 1873, the Glenville State Normal School was formally opened by the reading of scripture and prayer.
8. The enrollment for the first year was 120.
9. Mr. Louis Bennett, who had been appointed principal, took charge on the first Monday in April, 1873.
10. In 1875-76 daily sessions were to include at least six hours of classwork.
11. As late as 1908 there was a rule stating that students should not be on the streets after 7 o'clock weekday evenings.
12. For the school year 1875-76 the enrollment was 71.
13. In 1918 the Glenville Board of Education opened the Glenville Public Schools to students from the Normal school for practice teaching.
14. May 1, 1930, marked the date when the State Board of Education authorized the school to award the Bachelor of Arts of Degree.

15. On March 4, 1931, the State Legislature changed the college's name to Glenville State Teachers College.
16. In 1881 the enrollment was only 23.
17. Four courses were offered in 1905-06, Normal, Classical, Modern Language, and Science.
18. Up to the year of 1912, 48 courses were required in the Normal Course.
19. The Normal Course covered six years, but could be completed in four years.
20. Sixty-four courses were required by the state to receive a diploma in 1916.
