Gillespie led a workship entitled, "How to Find It Even Though You Didn't Know That You Lost It."

Gillespie stressed the need for local indexing projects and offered suggestions for types of indexing which could be done. He is a past president of the West Virginia Library Association and served during 1979-80.

GSC Blasts Salem, 28-3; **Brooks Gains 234 Yards**

The GSC Pioneer football team, powered by Byron Brooks' running and good team defensive effort, stomped the winless Salem Tigers by a 28-3 margin in West Virginia Conference grid action at Glenville Saturday. The victory in the game, played before a mass of shivering Pioneer mass of shivering Pioneer to 3-3-1 fans, moved GSC (2-2-1 in the WVC) and snapped a three-game losing

Brooks, a sophomore tail-back, piled up 234 yards and three touchdowns in 32 carries to lead GSC's offensive attack. During the game, Brooks reached the magic 1,000-yard rushing plateau for the season. Brooks' 234-yard total, his third 200-yard game of the season, put him at 1,006 yards with three games remaining on the schedule.
Glenville's scores came on

runs of five, two, and 85 yards by Brooks, and on a 24-yard pass from Jeff Metheny to Steve Williams, his second scoring catch of the season. Overall, Metheny was 4-8 for 74 yards and one score after not starting the game. Williams caught three for 46 yards.

GSC gained 393 yards (312 rushing, 81 passing), while Salem had only 217 total yards (126 passing, 91 rushing).

Freshman Jim Weidemoyer was a perfect 4-4 in PATs, making him 10-10 on the season.

While the Pioneer offense was moving the ball pretty effectively under Metheny's direction, the GSC defense was doing a good job of stifling the Salem offensive attack. An inspiring goalline stand in the first period which prevented the Tigers from tying the game, plus constant pressure on the entire Salem backfield throughout the contest, proved instrumental in thwarting any serious

threats.
Terry Kendall and Mark
Hash led GSC's defensive
effort. Kendall totaled seven tackles, six assists, a blocked pass, and a quarter-back sack. Hash had two interceptions, a fumble recovery, and was in on seven tackles.

Also, Rod Abrams was in on ten tackles, Andy Marchal had eight stops, Fred Parsons had quarterback sacks, David Darst had two sacks and a fumble recovery, and Mike Payne nabbed an intercep-

The Pioneers of Coach Frank Vincent have another WVC encounter this week-end. They travel to Buckhannon for a 1:30 p.m. game with West Virginia Wesleyan on Saturday.

On Wednesday, Oct. 13 the Pioneers ran in a dual meet with West Virginia Tech at Oak Hill. Then, on Saturday, Oct. 16 GSC competed in a triangular meet with Morehead State and Marshall University at Huntington.

Glenville trounced Tech by a 16-47 score to raise its WVC mark to 13-3 on the season. The 5-mile race, contested on the course that the WVC Championship will be run on, was run under extremely muddy conditions.

Larry Taylor continued to finish as GSC's top man, running 28:04 to lead the Pioneers to the top four places and seven of the top

Billy Belcher, the team's captain, was second in 30:32. Ed Iseli placed third in 31:22. Fourth with a time of 31:39 was Steve Keenan. Fifth for GSC and sixth overall was Mark Price in 32:26. Pat Godfrey and place.

The Pioneers were up against much stiffer competition on Saturday but fared well despite the fact that Ed Iseli couldn't finish the race due to a case of shin

splints.
GSC scored 53 points, second to Marshall's 21 and

ahead of Morehead's 56. Again, Taylor paced the Pioneers' effort. The St. Marys junior recorded a time of 25:27 for the flat, fast 5-mile course. He was second overall.

Belcher, a senior, held on to GSC's No. 2 spot with a time of 26:58, good enough for tenth overall.

Keenan placed 11th in 27:36, Keister was 13th in 28:07, and Godfrey was 17th in 28:50. Glenville's two non-scoring runners, Mark Price and Steve Roberts, finished in 30:10 and 31:00, respectively.

The Pioneers will not see any action until Oct. 26. when they compete against West Virginia State and West Virginia Tech in a triangular meet, the final one before the WVC meet on Nov. 5.



Church Makes Donation To GSC

Freshman Thoughts

As a freshman I have been through some very different experiences during my first eight weeks as a Glenville State College student.
