Choir Presents Annual Concert

The popular annual Christmas Concert of the Glenville State College Choir will be presented at 8:00 on Sunday night, December 12, in the auditorium at the College. The public is cordially invited.

The program will include four chorales from Bach's 'Christmas Oratorio,' a Benedictus by Schubert, Handel's famous 'Hallelujah Chorus' from Messiah, and a chorus from the 'Childhood of Christ' by Berlioz. Twentieth-century works by Willan and Sowerby and the 'Festival Te Deum' by Benjamin Britten are also part of the program.

The Camerata Singers, a group of twelve will present a group of Christmas pieces from the sixteenth century including three by Praetorium. The singers will be accompanied by the Recorder Quartet in an old German carol, "While by Our Sleeping Flocks." The quartet will also present two early works for recorders.

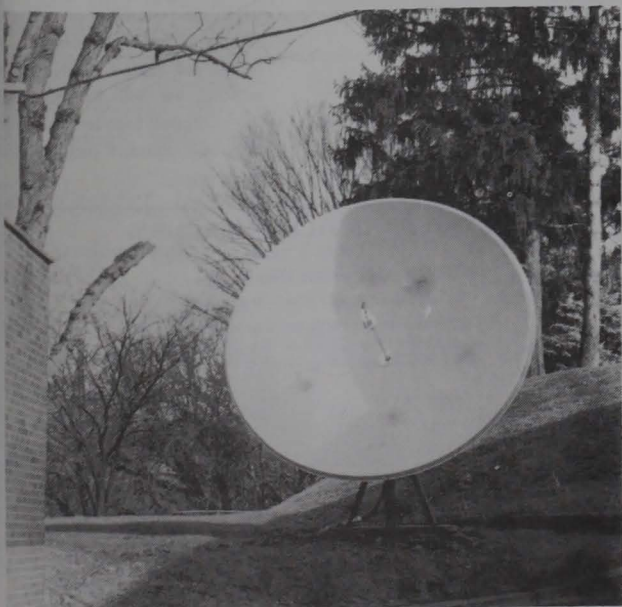

Christmas-A Time of Traditions

"Chestita Koleda, Joyeux Noel, Feliz Navidad and Froehliche Weihnachten!" What? Has the editor gone mad? No! I was just wishing you a Merry Christmas in four different foreign languages. The Christmas spirit is truly a feeling of happiness. This joyous occasion is celebrated by Christians around the world. Every country which celebrates the Christmas Holiday also possesses its own traditions which are unique to its ancestry.

In the country of Puerto Rico, Christmas is celebrated with Christmas Trees and the traditional Santa Claus. However, on January 6, Three Kings Day, children place boxes full of grass under their beds or on roof tops. This grass is supposed to be fed to the camels which are ridden by kings. The kings in turn reward the children for feeding their hungry animals.

On Noche Buena (Christmas Eve) in Venezuela all children meet in their parents' homes and then travel together to the Misa del Gallo (Midnight Mass). Mothers prepare traditional foods consisting of Hallaca (corn meal, with pork and chicken stuffing all wrapped in plantain leaves), or the dulce de lechoza (a dessert of green papaya and brown sugar). The Nativity scene is found in every home.

Italy begins the Christmas celebration eight days before Christmas and continues through the Twelfth Night or the Feast of the Epiphany. Children go from place to place during the Holiday season reciting Christmas selections and expecting coins in return so they may buy Christmas delicacies. Gifts are brought to the children by the Christ-Child. It is believed, however, that Befana, a benevolent witch, on January 6, comes down the chimney and fills children's shoes full of goodies; or, if they were bad, Befana fills the shoes with charcoal.

In the country of Lithuania, the Christmas Eve dinner table is covered by straw for the memory of the blessed night in Bethlehem. In Germany, Evergreen trees are decorated with lavish lights and adorn the streets. The Advent Wreath holds a special meaning to the German people.

Although the Christmas season is celebrated differently around the world, the religious meaning is unified. All Christians of the world celebrate the birth of the Son of God, Jesus Christ, on Christmas day. With this thought, I would like to wish you a Nadolig Llaven (Merry Christmas).

Pioneer Men Hoopsters Lose To Three Opponents

GSC's men's cage squad dropped three decisions during action last week and in the process saw its record fall to 1-4. West Virginia State, Wheeling and West Liberty, all West Virginia Conference foes, handed GSC its losses.

West Virginia State 65, GSC 63.

The Pioneers led for most of the game, but the Yellow Jackets rallied in the game's late stages for the 65-63 win.

Scott Ludwig's 16 points and ten rebounds paced GSC. Kenny Taylor added 16 points, and Clay Young put in ten. Deon Lanier scored seven, Randy Anderson and Rich Moore six each, and Steve Linville two.

Anderson and Moore had five assists apiece.

Wheeling 84, GSC 72.

The Wheeling Cardinals out-pointed Glenville, 84-72, for their first WVC win in over a year.

The two teams fought to a 35-35 tie at intermission. Wheeling wanted the win more, though, and exerted

itself for an 84-72 win.

Clay Young had 25 points and 12 rebounds to lead GSC's losing effort. Scott Ludwig added 21 points, Randy Anderson and Rich Moore eight each, Steve Linville and Trent King four apiece, and Steve Morris two.

West Liberty 86, GSC 75

The Hilltoppers of West Liberty built up a 23-point margin at half and held on for an 86-75 win over Glenville. The loss was GSC's fourth in a row.

Scott Ludwig's 15 points led five players in double figures for the Pioneers. Also, Trent King and Clay Young put in 13 each, Rich Moore had 12, and Randy Anderson scored 11. Kenny Taylor added six, David Burns two and Steve Linville one.

Two tough opponents, West Virginia Tech and Salem, will play in the Pioneer gym this week. GSC was to play Tech Tuesday night, while the Pioneers will tangle with the Salem Tigers Saturday in a home contest beginning at 7:30 p.m.

Student Congress Makes Plans

Kight Resigns

Garry Kight, coach of the Glenville State College bowling team for the past six years, has resigned that position effective immediately. Joe Drahnak and Maria Catlett have been named to succeed Kight.

Kight, took over from Dr. Robert Dollgener in the fall of 1976 as coach of the squad. The previous spring, Dollgener had coached the GSC bowlers to the NAIA championship, the first national title ever for GSC in athletic competition.

Faced with the tough task of duplicating a national title, Kight performed admirably. He coached the Pioneers to a fifth-place NAIA finish in 1977 and to an eight-place finish in 1978, the last year the national championship format was used.

From 1979 - 81, GSC placed high in ACUI regional competitions and other tourneys, including winning the Mountaineer Classic in 1981.

Jesse Lilly, GSC athletic director remarked, "Garry had done a good job with the bowling team. We appreciate the work he's done over the years."

Kight cited personal reasons for his resignation.

GSC Lady Pioneers Win Two, Lose One

The GSC Lady Pioneers have a record of 2-1 following their first three games of the season last week. The ladies beat West Virginia State on Wednesday and split in a tournament at Radford, Va. on Friday and Saturday.

GSC 75, West Virginia State 68.

Coach Tim Carney's team fought back from a 35-34 halftime deficit to record the 75-68 win over the Yellow Jacket women in the season opener for the Lady Pioneers.

Bunny Taylor popped in 19 points to lead four GSC players in double figures. Sonja Bailey tallied 17, Pam Minigh 14 and Kim Maynard 13. Laura Dabney and Maria Lothes added six each.

Taylor also recorded 12 assists and nine rebounds for GSC. Minigh led the Lady Pioneers in rebounding with 16 boards.

As a team, Glenville outshot State (49 percent to 36 percent) and out-rebounded them (53-52).

Elon 73, GSC 70

In the first round of the Radford University (Va.) tourney last weekend, the Lady Pioneers fell to Elon, N.C., 73-70. GSC had a 41-38 lead at half but couldn't hold on to it and lost its first game of the 1982-83 campaign.

Pam Minigh's 23 points was tops for the Glenville women. The senior forward had ten rebounds, also. Sonja Bailey added 11 points, five assists and four

steals; Bunny Taylor had ten points, seven assists and six steals; Laura Dabney had ten points and six rebounds; Kim Maynard scored four points and had a team-high 12 rebounds; and Robin Phipps, Maria Lothes and Judy Niday scored six, five and one, respectively.

GSC 68, Alderson-Broadbudd 63.

Kim Maynard's 17-point, 12-rebound performance carried the GSC ladies to a 68-63 win over Alderson-Broadbudd in the consolation game of the Radford tournament. Maynard's total stats of 21 points and 24 rebounds earned her All-Tournament status.

Other Lady Pioneers hitting in double figures were Bunny Taylor with 14, Sonja Bailey 13 and Pam Minigh 11. Maria Lothes had eight, Laura Dabney three and Robin Phipps two.

Bailey recorded six steals, Lothes eight rebounds, and Taylor and Minigh five assists each.

GSC has three outings this week in which to improve its record. On Tuesday, the women were to play West Virginia Tech. Then, on Thursday, the opponent will be West Virginia Wesleyan in a 6 p.m. road contest. Finally, on Saturday, Glenville will play at Shepherd at 1 p.m.

Also, the Lady Pioneers will play their final home game before break with Alderson-Broadbudd on Monday, Dec. 13. Game time is 7 p.m.
