Decrease In Funds Results In Furloughs, Cutbacks

ten percent budget reduc-tion has resulted in a decrease of \$373,000 for the remainder of the fiscal year and a furlough for all employees.

To achieve the reduction, the College cut personal services by \$206,000, services by expense \$140,000, repairs and alterations by \$20,000 and equipment by \$7,000.

Under the guidelines established by the Board of Regents, all nine month employees will be fur-loughed for five work days and all 12 month employees furloughed for seven work days. However, one additional furlough day may be added to make up a \$11,872 deficit in meeting the total \$373,000 amount. Furloughs will not be scheduled prior to March

day of the legislative session. The College will furlough all employees for five days during the last week of the current week of the current semester, May 9 - 13, a week normally used for final examinations. College commencement has been rescheduled from May 15 to May 8, 1983. The additional furlough day for nine month employees will occur

during one day of the spring break. The three additional furlough days for 12 month employees has not yet been determined. Simply stated, a furlough is a day which an individual will not work and not receive pay.

Figures representing the ten percent reduction are as follows: Furlough all 9 month employees for 5 work days - \$33,487; employees for 7 work days -36,224; Eliminate all state general for summer funding for summer school during the remainder of the current fiscal year \$39,000; Personal services (part-time, over-time, extension) - 97,289; Repairs and Alterations - \$20,000; Equipment - \$7,000 and Current Expense (Utilities, postage, telephone) \$140,000, totalling \$373,000.





State Freeze Cuts Deeply

For the fourth year in a row Governor Rockefeller has frozen all state funds, implemented a hiring freeze and a 10% reduction in spending for the remainder of the fiscal year. State Colleges have felt the impact, some worse than others. Glenville, with some foresight, has felt the impact, yet to a lesser degree than most others.

The rumors of an extended Spring break and cancelled spring sports are untrue, according to President Simmons. The truth about GSC is that they are cancelling the first term of summer school, which normally occurs at the close of the fiscal year in June. The Spring semester will be shortened one week, eliminating finals week, and all off-campus courses have been cancelled. Overtime, part-time and emergency funds have been cut out and an Aide at the Summersville Center has been furloughed.

Glenville is being careful not to let these cuts interfere with student class time. Finals will be held on the last day of classes, a practice the college once followed. Instead of finals being two hours, most finals will now be one hour long. Graduation has been changed to May 8.

Luckily for GSC students, the administration here foresaw another "freeze" by the Governor, and budgeted accordingly. Students graduating this May will have full accreditation, and all students will have one extra week to hit the job market. Unluckily for all state employees the picture is much more gloomy; with a deficit for the past three years, it seems our state government would have some foresight to overcome these difficulties and spare everyone the bother of cutbacks and furloughs.





Swimming Courses Offered

Glenville State College Office of Continuing Education will be offering American National Red Cross swimming courses. Instruc-tion will be provided by Dr. John Hymes who has 20 year's experience in teaching Red Cross Swimming. He is certi-Swimming. fied as an Instructor Trainer for the American National Red Cross and is currently the Water Safety Chairman of the Gilmer County Red

Cross Chapter.
The Basic Swimming Instuctor course will be offered to individuals 17 years of age and up who have basic swimming The course will involve mastery of teaching the beginning elements of swimming as well as learning the nine styles of swimming and the basic elements of water safety. The 30-hour course will begin on January 17 through March 1983, from 6:30 to 9:15 p.m. each Monday evening at the

College Pool.

Advanced Lifesaving/ Lifeguarding course will begin during the month of March. Participants must be at least 15 years of age or older and be able to swim 440 yards American Crawl stroke (freestyle) in a time of 11 minutes or less.

This is a National Red Cross Certification course designed to train individuals in lifesaving skills and pre-pare them to hold a lifeguarding position.

The Water Safety Instructor course will be taught beginning January 17 through May 2, 1983, at the College Pool from 6:30 to 9:15 p.m. Participants must be 17 years of age or older, a good swimmer and have a current Advanced Lifesaving Certificate. The 45 hr. course will involve the teaching of the nine styles of swimming, current lifeguarding techniques and the latest developments in

water safety.

Those participants interested in the Advanced Lifesaving/Lifeguarding course will find it beneficial to enroll in the Basic Swimming Instructor course for instructional information and pre-conditioning.

cine Conference will be held here at GSC on February 2 and 3.

The conference, co-sponsored by the Glenville State College Department of Athletics, the West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference, the Kyle Clinic, and the Stonewall Jackson Memorial Hospital, will provide resource material for the development of a quality health care program for the student athlete. Emphasis will be placed on strength training and injury prevention. The role of the coach and the official in injury prevention will also be discussed.

The program coordinator for the conference will be GSC Athletic Trainer Bill Ford. The conference will be divided into four major sessions. The first, starting the morning of Wednesday, February 2, is on strength program considerations. This session will cover the reasons and effects of building a solid strength training program. In the afternoon, there will be a session on returning after injury. In this session, Oliver Luck, former WVU quarterback, will speak giving the athlete's perspective. At 6:30 p.m., a banquet will be held in the Pioneer Center Ballroom. The guest speaker at the banquet will be former Ohio State University Coach, Woody Hayes.

Hayes will speak on the coach's role in injury prevention at the conference banquet at 6:30 p.m., February 2 in the ballroom of Pioneer Center. Hayes served 28 years as head football coach at the Ohio State University. Only

During the morning of Thursday, February 3, the session on neck injury prevention will be given. one will cover everything from pre-season neck strength programs to proper tackling techniques. At noon, there will be a buffet lunch in the Verona Mapel Room with WVU strength coach Dave Hallanger speaking on the Mountaineers strength program. The final session of the conference is Thursday afternoon on developing a successful high school training program.

according to Maria Catlett, sponsor for the team.



Since the beginning of 1983, the GSC Pioneer men's basketball team has dropped five of its six outings. GSC won in the opening round of the Joe Manchin Classic at Salem on Jan. 4 but has since lost five in a row.

Joe Manchin Classic

The Pioneers thumped Pitt-Bradford, a nationally-ranked foe, 98-84, in the tourney's first round. GSC fell behind, 54-42, at half but rallied for the win, in which they hit 26 of 27 foul shots.

Scott Ludwig had 28 points, Clay Young 21, Rich Moore 16, and Randy Anderson and Steve Linville 12 each to lead GSC.

In the championship game, the Pioneers were downed by Salem by a 90-78 margin.


