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# Ladies Rally To Defeat Fairmont

The GSC Lady Pioneers and the Fairmont Lady Falcons met in a battle of West Virginia Conference powers last Thursday at Glenville, and the result was an intense, well-played game.

From the outset, both teams shot well despite good defensive pressure. In the first half, the lead changed hands several times before the Fairmont gals claimed a 38-37 lead at intermission.

The Lady Falcons jumped to a seven-point lead, their biggest, at the start of the second half. Eventually, GSC fought back to within one point. Finally, with 4:43 to go, buckets by Pam Minigh and Kim Maynard gave Glenville a 67-64 lead, one it would never lose. Fairmont hit a basket, then a two-pointer by Maria Lothes and two buckets by Minigh put GSC in command, 73-66, en route to a final score of 82-74.

Although he received big performances from Pam Minigh (26 points, nine rebounds and five assists),

Bunny Taylor (20 points, 13 assists, nine rebounds and six steals), and Kim Maynard (19 points and 16 rebounds), Coach Tim Carney felt the big reason for the fine win was the defensive play of Maria Lothes and Laura Dabney on Fairmont star Vicki Huffman.

Huffman, who scored 28 points, was shut down most of the second half by Lothes and Dabney after she had a big first half. Carney stated, "Maria and Laura took away her right side and made her go left, which she doesn't like to do."

Also for GSC, which outrebounded Fairmont, 49-34, Sonja Bailey had seven points, Tina Burkhamer and Lothes four each, and Dabney two.

The Lady Pioneers went to 10-2 overall and 8-0 in the WVC with the come-from-behind win. On Tuesday, they were to have played West Virginia State. Next Monday, the ladies play at Alderson-Broaddus.

## Ludwig Scores 36 As GSC Triumphs

Paced by senior Scott Ludwig, the GSC Pioneers claimed their first victory in the West Virginia Conference this season by whipping Alderson-Broaddus, 92-80, at home Monday.

Ludwig, one of the team's captains, poured in 36 points to lead GSC to its convincing victory. During the course of the game, Ludwig hit the 1,000-point

plateau. He also kept up his remarkable foul shooting.

Also for Glenville, Clay Young scored 23 points and Kenny Taylor 22 points.

GSC moved to 3-13 overall and 1-11 in the WVC.

## Pioneers Lose Two Games

In action last week, the GSC Pioneer male cagers lost both of their outings to West Virginia Conference opponents. GSC was defeated by West Virginia Wesleyan and Concord as its record fell to 2-13 overall and 0-11 in the conference.

Wesleyan 102, GSC 75

The host Bobcats gained a 41-33 lead at halftime and gradually increased it to finish with a 102-75 victory.

Wesleyan outshot GSC (59.4 percent to 50 percent) and outrebounded the Pioneers (38-34).

For Glenville, Scott Ludwig scored 16 points. Clay Young added 14 points and seven rebounds, Rich Moore 11 points and three steals, Roger Kirkpatrick ten points, seven rebounds and five assists, Kenneth Taylor ten points and seven rebounds, Trent King eight points, Randy Anderson four points and four assists, and Steve Morris two points.

Concord 73, GSC 65  
The Concord Mountain Lions remained in control throughout the game at Glenville, although the Pioneers pulled to within two points twice in the second half. GSC could get no closer, and Concord emerged with a 73-65 triumph.

Concord shot a fine 63.8 percent from the floor, as compared to 51.9 percent for Glenville. The Pioneers kept up their fine team foul shooting, hitting 75 percent from the line.

Clay Young led the Pioneer scoring attack with 18 points. Also, Rich Moore hit 16 points and handed out six assists, and Scott Ludwig, one of the nation's top foul shooters, had 16 markers. Kenneth Taylor scored eight points, Roger Kirkpatrick three, and Randy Anderson and Steve Linville two each.

GSC will play West Liberty at home on Friday and Alderson-Broaddus at Phillipi on Monday in hopes of gaining its first conference win.

## WVC To Hold Contest

In conjunction with the WVIAC women's basketball tournament at Buckhannon from Feb. 22-26, conference officials are sponsoring a spirit stick competition between the participating schools. This contest is being held in an effort to generate more enthusiasm and student participation.

The spirit stick (to be painted in the winning school's colors) will be awarded to the school which displays the most spirit and enthusiasm throughout the tourney. The winner will be permitted to carry and display the spirit stick

for one year.

Along with the spirit stick competition, the conference is sponsoring a banner competition. Each school will be permitted to hang a maximum of three banners. The banners will be judged during the first day of the tournament, and plaques will be awarded to the top three banners at the awards ceremony on the last day of the tourney.

Before leaving President Simmons expressed his appreciation to the faculty, staff, and students for helping in a time of crisis.

After President Simmons and Mr. Gainer left, Anetta asked for a reading of the minutes and roll call. Old business was discussed first. Spirit caps will be sold at the home ballgame. Pep bands, the satellite, and the bus-line were also discussed. The Student Congress voted to have the television in the student union on between 11:00 and 1:00. A new representative to Student Congress was elected, Tina Hunt, by the Congress. Elections were discussed. April 6 was decided to be the date of the initiation banquet for the new elected members. Miss GSC will attend the next Student Congress meeting.
