Kelly Speaks On Nuclear Weapons

On January 30, at 8 p.m., the students and faculty of Glenville were able to hear a speaker, Mike Kelly, discuss a worldwide matter concerning the freeze and reduction of nuclear weapons. Kelly used a flip thart and explanations as to chart and explanations as to how much damage nuclear warheads can do.

The fact was brought up that even a "limited" nuclear war would result in death and destruction on a scale without precedent in human existence. Under-ground shelters offer no protection from the blast; fallout would contaminate the globe for generations.

The point declaring Russia as a superior armed force was pondered and rejected. The US has fewer land-based missiles than Russia, but we have more bombers, more missile submarines and more total warheads. Unlike bombers and land-based missiles, our missile submarines are invulnerable to Soviet attack. According to the 1982 Pentagon Annual Report, "The US and Soviet Union are roughly equal in strategic nuclear power." A

conclusion that acknow-ledges the fact that an attack by one country upon the other will result in the annihilation of both countries . . . not to tion all of civilization. not to men-

The President seems to want to push US nuclear power further to try and catch the Russians. It is believed, though, that we are the ones pushing Russia to try and equal our power. A freeze seems to be the only real answer, but it must be in effect soon before more countries become dangerous with nuclear power.

Mike Kelly is a lawyer for the Supreme Court of West Virginia. He is also on the West Virginia Freeze Campaign Committee. This organization has 13 Campaign Communes organization has 13 chapters in this state and they recently had a rally in The freeze campaign committee is interested in ending the arms race with Russia and the first step is to get the WV Legislature to pass a resolution to stop the production of Nuclear Weapons. 

Kim Maynard added 15 Ludwig Tops 1,000

Scott Ludwig, a senior co-captain of the Glenville State College Pioneers cage squad, recently reached a plateau that most college players can only dream of. That plateau was the 1,000point scoring mark in a career.

Ludwig gained admittance into the coveted 1,000-point scoring club by tallying 36 points against Alderson-Broaddus on Jan. 24. The 36 points was a career-high for Ludwig and gave him 1,019 points in about two and a half years in a Pioneer uniform. More importantly, his outburst, which included a record 18 of 19 from the foul line, led GSC to its first conference win of the season.

In his sophomore season, Ludwig scored 292 points as a sixth man. Last year, his junior season, he tallied 436 points as a starter. So far this season, the sharpshooting guard has put in 305 points in 16 games, and he has at least 11 more games to add to his high point total.

During the last two seasons, Ludwig has gained national recognition for his shooting accuracy. In his junior season, the 6'2" Ludwig led the NAIA in field goal accuracy at one point in the season. So far this season, he has stayed near the top of foul shooting percentage in the widespread NAIA.

Ludwig, from Ripley High School, is the first Pioneer to enter the record books with 1,000 points since Don Bullett did it two years ago.

He averaged 195.0. Ron Carpenter was at 178.8, Anthony Cochran 178.0, Earl Belle 177.9, Jeff Stanley 174.8 and Wes Johnson 134.0. Johnson 134.0.

The two wins allowed GSC to finish with a 7-5 record and second place in the Southern Intercollegiate Bowling Conference.

Cagers Split With Foes

A 1-1 record in games last week moved the GSC Pioneers' season slate to 3-14 overall (1-12 in the West Virginia Conference). GSC beat Alderson-Broaddus Monday but lost to West Liberty Friday.

GSC 92, A-B 80

The Pioneers built a 48-37 lead at intermission and held on for a 92-80 victory, their first WVC win.

Scott Ludwig's 36- point, 14-rebound, 5-assist game led Glenville to its victory. Clay Young added 23 points and four steals, and Kenny Taylor put in 22 markers and had eight rebounds.

Also, Randy Anderson had six points and five assists, Rich Moore scored three, and Roger Kirkpatrick tallied two.

West Liberty 65, GSC 62

Against the Hilltoppers, GSC led throughout the first half, which ended with GSC up, 36-34. Liberty outpointed the Pioneers, 24-22, in the second half to tie the score at 58-58 and send it into overtime.

West Liberty scored first in the overtime period and held the upper hand the rest of the way to post a

65-62 win. For the Pioneers, Clay Young finished with 21 points and eight rebounds, both team highs. Scott Ludwig added 14 points, Kenny Taylor had eight points and eight rebounds, and Randy Anderson, Rich Moore, Roger Kirkpatrick and Steve Morris scored eight, five, four and two points, respectively.

On Monday, GSC was to have played at A-B. Then, on Wed., Feb. 2, the Pioneers will play UC. On, Fri., Feb. 4 and Sat., Feb. 5, Glenville will play Blue-field and West Virginia Tech, respectively: All of these games are away contests.

For an appreciator of fine arts in West Virginia, Charleston is, pardon the expression, "almost heaven." I mean, Charleston was the home of Newton Cole! I knew that Glenville, in all its splendor and beauty, was not near anything. I was going to go stir crazy

As time went by, I was exposed to various artists on the GSC stage. 
