



Clinic Discusses Emotional Difficulties

According to Dr. James Kyle of Kyle Clinic, 40% of the illnesses seen in a doctors office are not physical but due to emotional difficulties. An example, pain complaints are much worse because of a psychological overlay, which is when the patient interprets pain being very severe. Dr. Kyle described healthiness as a triangle, or a balance between physical, emotional, and mental health. When this triangle is broken many feel that there is a physical problem, when it could be an emotional or mental problem.

Dr. Kyle stated that a less percentage of students need psychological tuning, which is an objective evaluation by one's peers of professionals. However, some students get their psychological tuning while at home and others do not.

At Kyle Clinic, there is a Summit Center for Human Development. This center helps people cope with their problems in living through a full range of education, prevention and treatment services. Students of GSC can use this center if they're having problems of adjusting to changes. According to Dr. Kyle, "Suicide is the second cause of death in the college age groupaccidents are the first." The Center is staffed

The Center is staffed with director, Don Voytish: psychologist, Holly Maynard; count case worker; Mary Exline; and secretary, Lucy Ann West. Records are strictly confindential at the Center. As of May 1, Dr. Kyle will

be the staff physician. Summit Center is located at the lower floor of Kyle Clinic and this service is available by appointment only. Financial fees can be given by calling the Center. Tedford Presents Paper

"Eudora Welty-An Appalachian Writer?" is the title of a paper presented by Dr. Barbara W. Tedford, Associate Professor of English, at the fourteenth annual meeting of the College English Association, held in Asheville, North Carolina, April 14-16.

Dr. Tedford pointed out that, although Welty's native state of Mississippi provides the setting for most of her fiction, it is evident that her mother's home state of West Virginia made a significant impression upon her and found its way into some of her fiction. Welty's grand-

father, Ed Andrews, was a lawyer in the small county seat of Clay Court House before the turn of the century, and her family was prominent in public affairs in Clay and Kanawha Counties.

The conference drew professors of English from colleges and universities across the United States and featured sessions on Thomas Wolfe (whose hometown was Asheville), women writers, Scott and Zelda Fitzgerald, Appalachian dialects, the teaching of writing and literature, and other topics.
