### **Drivers Risk** Fine Of §10

A piece of legislation passed on March 12, 1983 as House Bill 1546 authorized the West Virginia Board of Regents "to construct, maintain and operate automobile parking facili-ties or areas upon, any pre-mises owned or leased at any college or university"; and, to issue a citation to the offender of regulations to appear (in case of Glen-ville State College) before the Director of Fiscal Aff-fairs or his designated official at the Business Office in the Administration Building within five (5) days excluding Saturdays, Sundays, and holidays; and, upon no contest pay a civil penalty of ten dollars (\$10.00).

If the student, faculty or staff member does not appear within the five days, or upon a pleading of not guil-ty, he/she will be referred to the judge of the municipal court (for the city of Glenville) who will issue a summons for a hearing. If the guilt to the offense is upheld, the person is subject to court costs of \$15.00 plus a fine of not less than ten dollars nor more than twenty dollars for each offense.

Commuters, residents, and staff will have to regisresidents, ter their automobiles and park between the yellow lines in a legal parking place to aviod a citation and fine. Residence hall students must remember to park only in the R-Zoned areas near their residence hall illustrated on the parking maps issued to each student and staff member upon registration. Commuters must avoid "Faculty Only" areas.

#### Disko Represents U.S. In Summer Delegation

Dr. Mildred Disko, Associate Professor of mathematics, was one of a 59-member delegation to represent the United States in a bilateral exchange program to the Peoples Republic of China this summer. They were hosted by the Chinese As-sociation for Science and Technology.

The delegation met with faculty and administrators from comprehensive universities, research institutes and teachers colleges located in Beijing, Shanghai, Wuxi, Suzhou, and Guangzhou (Canton). The journey was concluded with a two-day visit to Hong Kong.

Dr. Disko found the Chinese people friendly; the scenery, lakes, gardens, and parks pleasing; and the food and accommodations enjoyable. Surprising was the density of bicycle traffic and the relative absence of private automobiles. The streets seemingly were filled with a steady procession of people at all hours. Early morning always brought a din generated by people of all ages exercising in the street, people greeting one another on the way to work, and others just talking and laughing.

The three-week exchange was sponsored by the People-to-People Citizen Ambassador Program of Spokane, Washington, which was founded by President Eisenhower in 1956 "to foster goodwill and understanding Americans and citizens of other countries."

#### MONTROSE AWARDS

Each year during Home-coming festivities, the Montrose Award is given to a deserving senior from the previous year's class who has excelled in academics as well as athletics. This year. the Montrose Award will again be awarded as will the Clarissa Williams Athletic Award, a new award which will honor the outstanding female athlete of the previous vear.

Nominees awards must meet certain requirements. These requirements are as follows: 1) the athlete must have a 3.00 cumulative grade point average; 2) the athlete must be of good moral character as determined by the Athletic Committee; 3) the athlete must attain at least an All-Conference in the sport; 4) if a member of the Athletic Committee was also a coach of the sport in which a nominee participated - the member/coach will abstain from voting.

and will go by the book. Volleyball, both men's and women's will be the first Whoever is on a sport. volleyball team must remain on that team if they wish to play basketball and/or softball. This is so that at the end of the year total points may be tallied and the overall winner given an award.

Twelve people are allowed on each team; only six on the court at a time. Some form of matching uniforms must be worn. The winner will be decided by the best of two out of three games.

The length of the game will be eight minutes of actual playing time or the first to score 15 points. In either case, the winner must be leading by two points.

The season will follow a round robin schedule with a point system of ten points plus the number of participants for a victory, five points plus number of participants for a loss, and a deduction of 25 points for a forfeiture of a game. point system is devised to hopefully increase participation.

### **Enrollment Hopes** Are Encouraging

Although official col-lege enrollment figures will not be officially known until next known until next month, Glenville State College is predicting that Fall 1983 enrol-lment will remain steady or increase

slightly.
Mack Samples, Dean of Admissions and Recof Admissions and Records, speculates that the overall enrollment will increase slightly over last year's 1785 figure. "The freshman class is larger than last year," said Samples. "We

said Samples. "We tested more freshmen this summer than last this summer than last summer, indicating an increase in the freshman class of about 30 students. But this still isn't as big as the freshman class two years ago when enrollment peaked at 2000."

Samples attributes a

Samples attributes a stable to slightly-increasing enrollment the recruiting efforts of the admissions counselors and the faculty. Says Samples:
"It's a fact that there are fewer high school students out there, and we're really lucky to be getting as many as we have."

President William K. Simmons sees the academic reputation of Glenville as a factor in enrollment trends. "We are an attractive academic institution where quality educa-tion can be obtained at a reasonable price. Coupled with an active recruiting pro-gram, strong academic programs are what attract students to Glenville," said Simmons. Additionally, Simmons cites the changing economic climate as a reason for a stable enrollment.

"The economy has an enrolldefinitely effect on enroll-ment," said Simmons. "As the employment picture changes and jobs are not as readily available, students realize that college college education could assist them in finding employment. There is a need for higher education, and that need is growing more acute every day.


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
