I.D. Procedure Described

Students at Glenville who are 19 - years - old and over and do not have a current issued operator's license but need identification to drink and students who have an issued license but are from out - of - state need to be aware of the following rules: First, these students need to report to the Office of Student Services in the Administration Building to get an application card, or they can be obtained by writing: 1800 Washington Street, East Charleston, WV 25317 or by calling 1-800-642-9066. The next step for non-licensed West Virginia students and out-of-state students is to pay a \$10 fee, check or money order to the Department of Motor Vehicles for the WV Non-Operators Identification card. Next, students should mail their applications, \$10 check or money order, and proof of birth

to: WV Dept. of Motor Vehicles State Office Bldg. Charleston, WV 25305. When the blue photo card is returned from the WV Department of Motor Vehicles students will need to take it to the State Police Headquarters, located on Rt. 5 in the town of Sand Fork on the second and fourth Wednesday's of each month from 10 a.m. - 12 noon and 1 p.m. - 6 p.m. for their photo and final document.

Students Opt Against College

It's been three weeks, and most of you are still here. Other colleges are in session, too, and most of them have maintained their level of enrollment. Of the incoming freshman in these schools, there are several reasons for attending college, but the important thing is that these freshman are giving it a chance. A good percentage will even obtain their degrees eventually.

But what about the graduated high school seniors that didn't make it in to the college ranks this fall? A recent survey of 700 West Virginia high school seniors (560 responses were applicable) indicated that 287 people, or 51 percent, were not going to school in the fall. The next question is - Why not?

The two major reasons for not attending college were 1) the desire to become a wage earner, and 2) not interested in college. Thirty-four percent wanted to work for a living, while 31.6 percent weren't interested in college. Other reasons were: planning to enroll later - 26.3%; enrolling in vocational school - 21.1%; inadequate funds - 19.3%; entering military service - 15.8%; getting married - 15.8%; desire to stay in home area - 15.4%; low grades - 10.5%; needed at home - 9.5%; see no need for college - 6.3%.

Obviously, these people have valid reasons for not attending college. And, in the long run, some of them may come out ahead, because a college degree is becoming less valuable as time goes on.
