Ford Donates Book Collection To Library

E. George Ford, indus-trialist and 1956 graduate of Glenville State College, has donated a collection of books written by Melville Davisson Post to the Robert F. Kidd Library. Aert F. Kidd Library. A-mong those books donated by Ford are THE REV-OLT OF THE BIRDS, THE STRANGE SCHEMES OF RANDOLPH MASON, and a collection of his classic detective UNCLE APNIE classic detective stories, UNCLE ABNER, and MASTER OF MYSTER-IES. Ford donated nine including Post's hy by Charles books, biography by Charles A. Norton, which brings the collection in the library to a total of

ing in popularity with Agatha Christie. He was born and raised at Lost Creek, WV, in Harrison County. He attended West Virginia University to study law and formed with a law partnership with John A. Howard at Wheeling, WV. In 1892, he served as Presi-1892, he served as Presi-dential Elector and Secretary of the Electoral College. He was Chair-man of the Democratic Congressional Committee for West Virginia in 1898 He was also a member of the Board of Regents of the State Normal Schools, the Advisory Committee of the National Economy League, and the War and Treasury Departments during the First World War.

Post's first book, THE STRANGE SCHEMES OF RANDOLPH MASON, was published in 1896. a series of detective stories in which the criminal is often successful against the minions of the law. This theme brought crit-icism to his work but his books became popular nonetheless. Post's pop-ularity continued to grow, and today he has become one of the most famous writers of West Virginia.

Other books donated by Ford are as follows: THE GARDEN IN ASIA, THE CORRECTOR OR DES-TINIES, MONSIEUR JONQUELLE, THE SILENT WITNESS, and WALKER OR THE SEC-RET SERVICE.

Fine Arts Complex Debated

Two weeks ago, a legislative sub-committee on higher education visited the Glenville State College campus for a series of meetings with faculty, staff, and students. In the student meeting with the committee, students were asked to voice concerns which they considered relevant. Shelly Morris, as a representative of the GSC Student Congress, presented to the committee a list of concerns to be discussed. One of the proposals was the building of a fine arts complex. Several students from both the music and drama departments were present to voice their concern over lack of space available to them.

Members of both the music and drama departments have been working in severely limited space over the past to produce recitals, plays, concerts, etc. Problems with storage space, scheduling rehearsal time for the auditorium, and finding a place to build sets have constantly plagued both students and instructors in these departments. The students stated their problems and arranged a tour of the facilities for the legislators.

The legislators seemed sympathetic to the plight of the students and promised to look into the problem and search for a possible conclusion.

According to Linda McKown, Faculty Advisory Committee representative, when the college's budget proposal was sent to Charleston to the Board of Regents, the top request for funds was a \$4.4 million package for a fine arts complex. When the BOR's budget proposals were sent to the Legislature, however, GSC's total allotment of funds was \$237,000definitely not enough to build a new building.

The prospect of a new fine arts complex at GSC is not dead, however, as the Legislature has the final say on the budget for the year. If the Legislature perceives the need pertinent enough, funds can still be allotted for the construction. More information will be printed in next week's MERCURY concerning the present status of the proposals and what may be done by interested persons to further insure the support of the Legislature.




As a whole, the play could be defined as a success. The set projected the artistic flair that I expected and the replacement of the broken bowl was done with very effective lighting.

By 1985, every high school in West Virginia having collision sports must have certification in sports medicine. In light of this fact, in addition to it being football season, this week's article from the Kyle Clinic will deal with the role of the team physician and trainer in health care of the athlete. In a related future article, THE MERCURY will examine the specifics of the new rules concerning sports medicine and the related curriculum to be developed; for now, we will look at specific duties of those with

training in sports medicine. One of the most im most important responsibilities of the sports medicine specialist is to insure that a properly conducted pre-competition complete physical exam is performed with the aid of appropriate health professional personnel. Each athlete should complete a standard, pre-competition medical history prior to re-porting for this examination.

The team physician's and trainer's involvement in the examination can be broken down into five areas: the gathering of pertinent his-tory, the taking of vital signs, a general physical exam, a skeletal and ex-tremity exam, and a lab-oratory toot oratory test.

Also of importance is injury prevention. This goal is obtained through con-ditioning which includes weight training, flexibility testing, and cardiovascular conditioning. Fluid re-placement and taping are also methods of injury prevention.

early 1970's and decided to participate in government at that time. He would suggest to any other person that has an interest in politics to do the same and run for elected office at least once. While, he points out, that seeking and holding office has its costs, he feels the education is well worth it.
