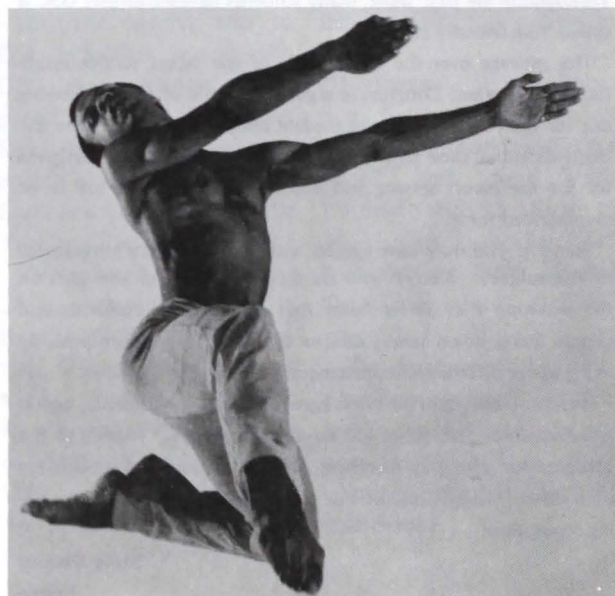

### Former Student Donates Webster Co. Scrapbook

Dr. Berlin B. Chapman, a 1922 Glenville State College graduate, has donated to the Robert F. Kidd Library a scrapbook containing correspondence from the Webster Springs 1941 high school reunion. This book is prime research material for the history of Webster Springs and its former high school, now consolidated with other schools to form Webster County High School.

Dr. Chapman has published books well-known in central West Virginia such as THE CHAPMAN FAMILY and EDUCATION IN CENTRAL WEST VIRGINIA 1910-1975. Over the years, Dr. Chapman has given many books dealing with the history of central West Virginia to the college library collection.

A retired history professor from Oklahoma State University, Dr. Chapman is presently residing in Orlando, FL.

### Ailey Repertory To Perform

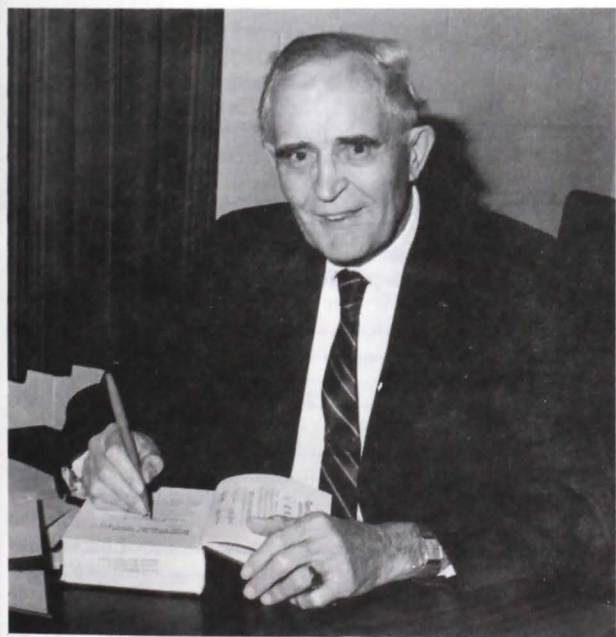
The Alvin Ailey Repertory Ensemble, one of the most exciting components of the American Dance Center, will appear in an 8 p.m. performance on Thursday, November 3, in the Glenville State College auditorium. GSC students will be admitted free with a valid ID. Sponsored by the college's Cultural Affairs Committee and the West Virginia Arts and Humanities Council, this superb company has made numerous cross-country tours to critical acclaim, performing in many prestigious dance series and major colleges and universities.

Under the artistic direction of Sylvia Waters, a former Ailey dancer, the group has studied and performed works from the standard Ailey repertoire, as well as original works by choreographers such as Mil-

ton Myers, Christine Lawson, Gus Solomon and Dianne McIntyre. In addition, the ensemble has attempted to maintain the historical perspective of dance with the inclusion of such dance classics as "Game" by Donald McKayle and "The Road of Phoebe Snow" by Talley Beatty.

Among its credits, the Ensemble includes producing five original ballets as its contribution to the very special "Ailey Celebrates Ellington" at the New York State Theatre in Lincoln Center. The Ensemble has also performed as a guest company in the Alvin Ailey American Dance Theatre's New York City Center season.

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# Athlete's Addition

This is a big weekend coming up for Glenville State College athletics. The men's basketball squad hosts its first competitive game Saturday evening. The lady spikers travel to play in the conference championship match at the end of the week. Coach Jim Hilgenberg's runners visit Oak Hill for their conference championship meet. A big game is also scheduled for Coach Frank Vincent's gridmen.

Concord College visits Pioneer Stadium this Saturday. A Pioneer victory would make it the fourth in a row for Glenville. By beating the Mountain Lions, GSC can move up to third place in the West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference standings.

Last week's win set a lot of precedents for Pioneer football in the last couple of years. It was the first time since 1976 that Glenville has beaten Fairmont State College. It was the first time since 1974 that the Pioneers have won three straight games and won more than three games in the entire season.

For the record: the last time Glenville beat Concord was 1974, 52-0. GSC has not won four games in succession since the championship season in 1973. By winning their last two games, the Pioneers can amass the best record since '73. Concord leads the series with GSC, 24-20-1.

## Kendall Earns WVIAC Award

Senior linebacker Terry Kendall of the Glenville State College Pioneers was named WVIAC defensive player of the week for his efforts two Saturdays ago versus West Virginia Wesleyan.

The six foot, 205 pound Spencer native was in on eleven tackles, recovered two fumbles, blocked two kicks, and sacked Wesleyan's quarterback once while the Pioneers' defense shut

down the Bobcats 15-6.

One of Kendall's fumble recoveries came in the third quarter on the Wesleyan two yard line to set up Glenville's final touchdown. His second blocked kick was his deflection of the Bobcat's attempted point after the touchdown.

Kendall also won this award once last year. He leads the Pioneer defensive unit in both tackles and fumble recoveries.

## Harriers Win At Oak Hill

In their second trip to Oak Hill this season, the GSC cross country team, paced by Larry Taylor and Dave Antonik, finished first again over West Virginia State and host West Virginia Tech last Thursday.

Taylor's winning time was 28:36 with Antonik next in line at 29:08. Senior captain, Steve Keenan, was the third Pioneer, finishing fourth with a time of 29:39 as Chris Kiestler finished fifth 35 seconds later. Steve Roberts was the final Pioneer of record by run-

ning the five mile course in 32:32.

Freshman, Shawn Shockey, finished in 33:03, an ailing Steve Meckfessel ran a 35:17, and Lloyd Willis finished with a time of 35:33. Second to Glenville's 21 points was State, 38, and Tech was third with 70 places.

The harriers will be running easy distances and light workouts this week to prepare for the WVIAC championship meet at Oak Hill this Friday.

## Pioneers Pound Fighting Falcons

Byron Brooks ran for two first half touchdowns as the Pioneers built a 21-0 half-time lead and then the always tough Glenville State defense took over as Fairmont State became GSC's third victim in as many weeks, 24-6.

With only three minutes elapsed off the clock Glenville took possession on their own 43 yard line. Nine plays and 57 yards later Brooks went over the goal line on an 18 yard run.

Three minutes later could have been the turning point that set the tone for the game. Pioneer quarterback Jeff Metheny was intercepted on the Glenville's 31 yard line. Fairmont's threat was halted on the 15 and their 32 yard field goal attempt was both wide left and short.

Glenville State took over on their own twenty yard marker and proceeded to drive 80 yards for the score. The thirteen play journey was highlighted by Metheny

passes and hard running by freshman Marty McClure. Metheny finished off the march with a one yard scoring run with twelve and one-half minutes left in the half.

The Pioneers were not done yet as senior Scott Taylor intercepted a Fairmont aerial and returned it to the Falcon 40. Two long Metheny passes and short runs by Brooks, including the four yard touchdown jaunt, gave the Pioneers a 21-0 advantage at intermission.

Third quarter action was a constant change of possession until Metheny was intercepted on the Fairmont five yard line. The interception was returned to the Falcon 39 where Fairmont began to move. The drive travelled to the Pioneer two. On a crucial fourth down and goal Robert Flynt broke up the Falcon pass play.

Fairmont finally got on

the scoreboard with eight minutes left in the contest on a three yard run. The two point conversion attempt failed.

Freshman field goal kicker Mark Szklennik finished all the scoring, hitting on a 25 yard field goal attempt. His three pointer completed a 47 yard, nine play drive with three minutes remaining.

Brooks headed the GSC ground game with 97 yards and McClure was next with 51. In the passing department, Metheny hit six of twelve for 66 yards. Two completions went to Jim Bird as Mark Underwood, Greg Lambert, Joe Mullan, and John Trew all caught one each.

Glenville's record now stands at 4-2-1, 4-2 in conference competition. The Pioneers are presently in fourth place in the WVIAC. They play host to third place Concord this Saturday afternoon at 1:30 p.m.

At Alderson-Broaddus College, the lady spikers lost to host A-B, 6-15 and 13-15. In their second match, Glenville took two games from Fairmont State, 15-8 and 15-6, to win the match on Monday, October 25.

A trip to Salem was next for the women to play West Liberty, Salem, and Fairmont. Versus Liberty, the hitters dropped the match, 9-15 and 5-15. About thirty minutes later, host

Salem turned back Glenville, 15-0 and 15-11. The ladies' last match was won, however, 15-4 and 15-3, paced by senior captain Gina Bailes' eight points. Bailes led the squad in scoring last week with a total of 29 points. Valerie Reynolds was next, scoring 23 points, with Myrtle Conley close behind with 19 scores.

This Friday, the spikers will travel to A-B for the conference championship match. They finished the season in sixth place in the WVIAC. The pool they will be in on Friday will consist of A-B, West Virginia Tech, and either West Liberty or Concord College.

Glenville's cagers consist of seven returnees, four starters, and five freshmen—one a walk-on. Of those returning lettermen, four were starters: senior Clay Young, captain; junior Rich Moore, co-captain; and sophomores Steve Linville

and Kenny Taylor. Other returnees are sophomores Trent King, Steve Morris, and Tim Moore.

The incoming freshman corps consists of Matthew Bullet, Rudy Watts, Duane Davis, Chris Graham, and John Wolf. Bullet is a forward and a guard from Martinsburg. Watts played forward and center in the Washington, D.C. area. Davis is a guard from Cleveland and Graham played forward and guard at Sterling, VA. Dear Editor,

I would like to respond to Angela Boram's letter to the editor in last week's MERCURY. As President of Student Congress (and not Student Council as Ms. Boram stated), I was approached by SC members regarding a complaint from many students around campus. The problem, it seemed, was that after night classes, many females (apparently males were not having this same problem) were being harassed by "townies" as they were walking home. I am unaware of the problems of these men who are doing the harassing. I do not know if they are unemployed, hungry, drunk, or have difficulty understanding their sex drives, and personally, I do not feel that this information is relative to our actions of setting up an escort service.

Ms. Boram's accusations that this service is sexist in nature and that Student Congress should aid the people doing the harassing are unfounded and undeserved. We had hoped to establish a service to the students (which, by the way, is our primary purpose), and I believe Ms. Boram's accusations were unfair. Unfortunately, the Student Congress or very few others could solve the problems of the nature that she discussed, nor would we attempt to do so. I believe we do realize our potential. Ms. Boram does not present the GSC male population in a very good light and I think much offense should be taken. The gentlemen who signed up to participate in the escort service are men who are willing to help out.

Also, I do not feel that we were suggesting that females were weak or in need of male protection, and that males are stereotypically strong and protective. Since I know that Ms. Boram is a commuter, and is probably not faced with this problem, she does not realize that if a female wants to "take a walk in the snow by oneself," no one is saying that she can not. This service is strictly on a voluntary basis.

If Ms. Boram has so much compassion for her fellow man, I suggest that she preface remarks such as "Better buy a gun." She should also perhaps avoid walking late at night by "oneself."

Give this escort service a chance, and if problems occur, they may be able to be worked out. We may be doing something worthwhile after all.

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
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
