Elderhostel To See Increase

The Elderhostel program that is held at Glenville State Cóllege every year is expected to be the largest in West Virginia this coming summer, says Dr. Irvin Talbott, Director of Resource Development. He says it may be the largest Elderhostel program in the United States. The program is designed for people over 60 from all over the United States who want to take courses in a college atmosphere and get to know college students. A variety of courses are offered including courses in golf and swimming instruction, Appalachian folk culture, computers, poetry, literature, writing, and video taping. College instructors donate their time to teach these

This year, the Elderhostel program will run for 11 weeks instead of the usual eight. Talbott says that this year, they hope to begin a scholarship for students to award to their parents or grandparents. He is very enthusiastic about the program this year and anticipates that it will be the "finest" in the United



GSC Ladies Stomp State, Bop Lady Blues At Home

Two impressive victories, one away and one home, boosted the Glenville State College Lady Pioneers' record to 3-1, 2-0 now in conference competition.

Traveling to Institute to oppose the Lady Jackets of West Virginia State, sophomore Jewell Rankin scored 26 points, 22 in the opening half, and nine rebounds to pace Glenville to a sound 77-57 thrashing of their host a week ago.

GSC led from start to finish in this contest as the Ladies led 46-22 at the half. Following Rankin in scoring was Bunny Taylor with 19, and Kim Maynard and Tina Burkhamer next with ten each.

At home the women fought off Lynne Kelly and her Lady Blue teammates to grab a 72-67 victory over visiting Bluefield as all five starters reached double figures.

The Lady Blues dominated early as they jumped out to a 25-18 advantage with six and a half minutes remaining in the opening half. In the remaining minutes of this period Glenville outscored Bluefield 23-8 to take a 41-33 lead into the locker room at intermision. The second half was hard fought as the visitors drew within three points but the Lady Pioneers would not break, finally winning by five

points.

Maria Lothes and Maynard paced GSC with 13 points apiece as Taylor and Rankin, along with Sonja Bailey, netted 12. Lynne Kelly, the 6'2" workhorse inside, led Bluefield with 35 points. In the losing effort, Bluefield outrebounded the Lady Pioneer squad 51-29. Kelly collected 23 of those rebounds.

The Ladies traveled to West Virginia Tech for a game on Monday with another road trip to Marshall University on Wednesday. This Saturday in an afternoon game, the women play host to Shepherd. Game time is set for 1:30 p.m.

Pioneers Drop Two Versus WVC Teams

In their second week of regular season action Gary Nottingham's male cagers dropped two highly contested matches versus West Virginia Conference foes to move their record to 1-3.

Two three point field goals by Glenville, six of seven free throws by host West Virginia State, and a missed desperation three point attempt by Rich Moore, all occurring in the game's final two minutes spelled doom for GSC as they were nipped 83-80.

Sophomore guard Steve Morris hit on a three point field goal with two minutes remaining, placing the score at 77-77. State proceeded to connect on five free throws to put it 82-77. Another three pointer, this one by Rich Moore, brought the Pioneers within two points as they fouled State on the inbounds pass. One of the two free throws was made and a last second shot by Moore bounced off of the rim as time expired at Institute last Tuesday.

Captains Clay Young and Moore led in scoring with 16 points as five Pioneer hoopsters reached double figures. Kenny Taylor and Rudy Watts, in a relief role off the bench, netted 14 each, and Morris scored 13 points.

The Hilltoppers of West Liberty were the Pioneers next opponent last Saturday as Glenville State hung

tough, only to have the Toppers pull ahead late to win 75-68.

Host Liberty led by eleven at halftime as Glenville began to make their threat. Outscoring the Toppers 17-8 in the beginning of the final half pulled the Pioneers within two points at 44-42. GSC held close for a few minutes until 50-48. At this point Liberty ran off ten unanswered points as the momentum shifted midway through the period.

Four three pointers were made by Glenville in the closing minutes, Morris striking on two of them with freshman Dwayne Davis and Matthew Bullett hitting on the other two.

Pacing Glenville once again were Young and Moore with 21 and 19 points respectively. The Pioneers shot 58% from the floor.

Fouls and turnovers once again were two problems for the cagers. West Liberty went to the charity line 32 times while GSC had only six trips. Glenville also turned the ball over 15 times.

A trip to West Virginia Tech for a game on Monday is the only away game scheduled for the Pioneers. Wednesday evening will see the cagers play host to Wheeling with another home game slated for Saturday evening versus Salem

Mr. Joseph Hickman was quest speaker to the Kappa Delta Pi Education society. His topic was planning graduate studies. During his discussion, he made some very constructive suggestions describing how an individual can begin to plan for graduate studies.

One of his comments referred to the fact that being accepted into a master's program can be time-consuming due to long waiting lists and slow applicant processing. Thus, an individual needs to begin contemplating the future no later than the junior year of undergraduate studies. He stated that it was necessary to first contact the institution or institutions preferred, to establish contacts for discussion on program requirements and the approach to use in fulfilling them. If a student can not decide which school to choose, visit the GSC Placement Office. They have information on various institutions that may help. Secondly, after the decision has been made, an individual must apply for the Graduate Record Exam (GRE); a prerequisite for all graduate programs. The results of the GRE are sometimes used as an applicant screener but in most instances, it is just an admittance requirement. Thirdly, if graduate studies is a

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
