Hunt Is Selected To Phys. Ed Post

The GSC department of Physical Education, Health, and Safety announced last week that Randy R. Hunt, Assistant Professor of Physical Education has been named chairman of that division. Having served as assistant football coach and strength coach since 1981, Hunt will succeed interim chairman Tim Carney.

Hunt, a native of Clay County, is a 1975 graduate of GSC, having majored in physical education, health, and safety education 1-12. While attending GSC, he was a three-year football letterman and played on the national runner-up during his senior year. He completed a master's degree from West Virginia University in 1976 in the field of sports science, and was director of the WVU Children's Gym-

nastics program during that time. He is presently completing a doctorate degree in sports management and administration from WVU. Hunt's teaching and coaching experience came from Central Preston High

School, where he served as head wrestling coach and assistant football coach. During three years at Central Preston, his wrestling teams amassed a record of 32-13-1.

Glenville To Offer New Course

Glenville State College will be offering a newly-developed course which all lifeguards will eventually be required to have mastered.

"Lifeguard Training" becomes the second major course in water safety developed by the American Red Cross. It is the result of over four years of national study and research to upgrade water safety standards.

Dr. John Hymes, associate professor of history at Glenville State College, is only one of four West Virginians currently certified to teach the ARC lifesaving course.

"This new course begins the training to teach people to be a qualified lifeguard," said Hymes. The old ARC advanced Life Saving course still being offered by the Red Cross teaches the tech-

The compliance team, headquartered in Philadelphia, Pa., will determine whether Glenville's academic programs, services and facilities are accessible and usable by handicapped

From The Wesley Foundation

Welcome back to campus!! By now, it probably seems like it's been weeks since you've come back. I hope that the vacation was relaxing and restful.

Several times during this semester, a student will drop in and ask the question: "What's the purpose of the Wesley Foundation? Why is it here on campus?"

The Wesley Foundation exists for Christian ministry. In its most basic terms, it means the effort to be the mind, the hands, the eyes, the ears, the likeness of Jesus of Nazareth. At the time Jesus lived, there was a great deal of confusion and disagreement, and at times conflict concerning Jesus' ministry. Christian ministry today is frequently surrounded by the same feelings.

My own conviction is that Christian ministry in the spirit of Jesus of Nazareth is primarily focused toward the poor, the outcast, the troubled. It is also strongly directed toward a sense of community, where labels of 'rich and poor,' 'male and female,' 'black and white,' 'Greek and non-Greek' are not considerations...and people can be together with mutual dignity, respect, and friendship. It is not a setting for the display of personal righteousness, self-pride, or arrogance. In its simplest terms, all are welcome.

My hope and wish is that the whole campus community feels free to participate in the Wesley Foundation's ministry. Some possibilities this semester are: 1) the main room, where except for scheduled meetings, persons may talk, study, listen to music from 10 a.m. - 10 p.m. daily, 2) the chapel is available at the same time for prayer, reflection, and reading, 3) the Outer Limits...open to all youth of Gilmer County, GSC students are welcome, there are video games, ping-pong, pool table, TV lounge, snacks, hours are Monday-Thursday from 12 noon - 10 p.m., Friday and Saturday from 12 noon - midnight, and Sunday from 2-10 p.m., 4) two Bible study opportunities: Sunday morning at 9:30 a.m. in the main room and Thursday evening at 8:30 p.m. in the chapel, 5) Counseling about troubling situations or relationships is available. Just give a call or stop by the Foundation and a time can be set.

A notebook is in the main room of the building for any messages. If you leave your name and a way to get in touch, I will do so as quickly as possible.

Pioneers Go 2-1 In Early Play

On January 4 and 5, the GSC men's hoop squad, under the direction of head coach Gary Nottingham, competed in the Joe Manchin Classic at Salem College. The GSC men emerged from the annual tournament with one win, one loss, and a third-place finish in the four-team competition.

In the first game of the tournament, the Pioneers fell by a score of 89-78 to Point Park, Pennsylvania. Rich Moore was high-point man for Glenville with 26 points, followed by Clay Young with 17. Other Pioneers scoring in the opening game were Kenneth Taylor with 12, Steve Morris with 10, Steve Linville with seven, and Rudy Watts with six. Young led the Pioneers in rebounds with 13.

In the consolation game of the tournament, however, the Pioneers ran away from Houghton College of

New York, 79-59. Young led the way for Glenville with 24 points and 12 rebounds. Linville scored 14 markers, followed by Watts with 10, Taylor with nine, Moore and Morris with eight each, and Matthew Bullett with six. Moore led the squad with eight assists.

The Pioneers shot 64.3% from the floor and 71.4% from the free throw line.

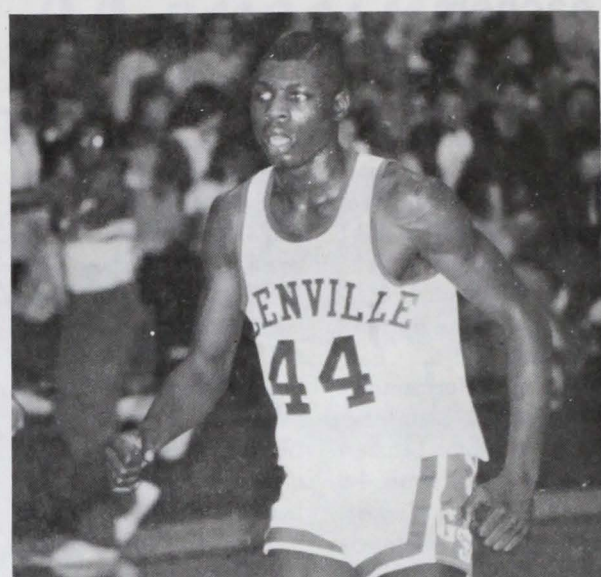
On January 7, the Pioneers competed in the Greenbrier Basketball Classic at Greenbrier West High School in Charmco against Bluefield State College. The GSC squad slipped past the Big Blues, 69-65. Moore scored 19 points in the contest to lead GSC, followed by Morris with 13, Linville with 12, Taylor with 11, Young with 10, and Watts and Bullett with two each. Young pulled down 16 rebounds for the Pioneers, while Morris passed our four assists.

Cagers Continue To Roll

In college basketball action since the beginning of this semester, the Glenville State College Pioneers have gone 2-1. On January 10, West Virginia Wesleyan stormed past Glenville 93-69 at the GSC gymnasium. In scoring, Rich Moore led the Pioneer men with 21 points, followed by Clay Young with 11; Steve Linville with 10; Kenneth Taylor with eight; Rudy Watts, Steve Morris, and Matthew Bullett with five each; and Chris Graham with four. Taylor and Young led the squad with seven rebounds each. Glenville shot 44.6% from the floor and 61.5% from the free throw line.

Wesleyan was led by Darryl Odom with 18 points and Andrew Tunstall with 17. Glenville was outscored 44-36.

Two days later, the University of Charleston Golden Eagles visited Glenville and travelled home the victims of a one-point defeat, 63-62. Young topped the scoring for the Pioneers with 19 in the nip-and-tuck game which found the score dead-locked at 28 at half-time. The Pioneers

outscored the Golden Eagles 35-34 in the second half to come out on top.

Following Young in scoring were Moore with 14, Morris with nine, Watts with eight, Taylor with six, Bullett with four, and Linville with three. Taylor and Young each grabbed 10 rebounds for the Pioneers.

On January 13, the Pioneer squad defeated the West Liberty Hilltoppers, 67-63, to raise its record to 7-6 overall and 5-5 in the conference. In the West Liberty game, senior captain Clay Young popped in 30 points to lead the Pioneers, followed by Moore with 12, Taylor with 10, Bullett with seven, Morris with six, and Linville with two. Young also led the squad in rebounds with 14.

For game totals, the Pioneers shot 61.4% from the floor and 68.7% from the free throw line.

The Pioneers were in action Monday night against Rio Grande, but results were unavailable at press time. The next home game will be Saturday, January 21 at 7:30 versus the Concord Mountain Lions.

Ladies Remain Unbeaten In WVC

The Tim Carney-coached Lady Pioneers basketball squad raised its West Virginia Conference record to 7-0, while its overall record settled at 8-3, with two victories and one loss over the past two weeks.

On January 10, the Lady Pioneers battled Ohio foe, Muskingum College, to a 72-66 notch in the loss column. The non-conference opponents jumped out to a 38-28 half-time lead over the Lady Pioneers. Though the Lady Pioneers outscored the Muskingum team 38-34 in the second stanza, the visitors still came out on top. Junior Kim Maynard led the GSC team with 19 points and 20 rebounds. Sonja Bailey scored 10 points, as did Tina Burkhamer. The remainder of Glenville's scoring was accounted for by Janice Hensley with seven, Jewell Rankin with four, and Maria Lothes with two.

Two days later, on January 12, the GSC ladies' squad travelled south to Bluefield to take on the Lady Blues. The Lady Pioneers, behind at half-time, 36-30, were again led by Maynard with 18 points to a final victory margin of 77-75. Following Maynard

in scoring were Rankin with 16 markers, Lothes with 12, Taylor with eight, and Bailey with seven. Maynard and Lothes each pulled down 10 rebounds for GSC.

Pam Lucado and Lynne Kelly led the Lady Blues with 23 and 22 points, respectively.

The Lady Pioneers shot only 39.7% in field goal percentage, but shot a fine 73.1% from the free throw line.

Finally, this past weekend, the Lady Pioneers took on the Lady Battlers of Alderson-Broadus on GSC's home court and emerged from the conference scuffle with a 90-80 victory.

The GSC women took a five-point lead into the locker room at half-time by outpointing A-B, 41-36. In second half action, the ladies outscored the visitors again by five points, 49-44.

The scoring was well-distributed, with eight GSC women scoring, and with six of the ladies notching double figure scores. Hensley led the GSC squad with 19, followed by Rankin with 18, Burkhamer with 13, Maynard and Taylor each with 12, Lothes with 10, Bailey with four, and Myrtle Conley putting in

two. Maynard led the squad in rebounds by hauling down 11.

The Lady Battlers were led in scoring by Pam Smith with a phenomenal 45 points and Stephanie Blaser with 17.

The GSC ladies shot 56.2% from the floor and 57.1% from the foul line.

The Lady Pioneers travelled to Buckhannon to take on conference foe, West Virginia Wesleyan, on Monday, but results were unavailable at press time. The ladies' next contest will be on Monday, January 23 at 7 p.m. versus the Salem Lady Tigers at Salem. The Lady Pioneers defeated Salem earlier in the season at home.

All two-year and four-year seniors graduating in May must order a cap and gown by February 15, 1984. Orders may be placed in the Alumni Office of the Pioneer Center.

niques of mainly saving yourself and hopefully aiding another individual in the case of a water emergency. The lifeguard training course is geared to teach people to primarily save others and, as such, is a much more thorough water safety course.

The course will be offered beginning Monday evening, February 27 through the office of continuing education at Glenville State College. Prerequisites for the course require that an individual be a minimum of 16 years of age, possess a current advanced life saving certificate, and have strong swimming skills. First aid and CPR will be taught concurrently with the lifeguard-

ing course. Glenville State College is the only central West Virginia facility with qualified personnel to teach lifeguard training.

"Anyone who plans to lifeguard this summer or at any other time should take this new course," encouraged Hymes. "Although a grace period does now exist, we hope that lifeguard training will eventually be a mandatory course and provide a safer swimming atmosphere for people of West Virginia."

Gainer. "The compliance team upon completion of their visit, will indicate to us within 90 days the problems which they find to exist on our campus. From that point, the college will continue to improve its facilities for handicapped accessibility with compliance officers conducting periodic checks on our progress."

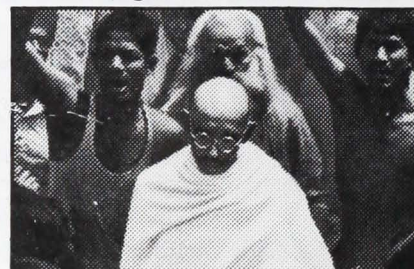
