New Programs Offered

Dr. Bruce Flack, Vice President of Academic Affairs, has announced the planning and implementation of four new programs of study. The new programs are Petroleum Engineering, Nursing, Food Service Management and Sports Management.

The Petroleum Engineering program was approved by the Board of Regents and the introductory class was started this fall. Dr. Flack hopes to have a full-time director of the program by March 1, but it is currently under the direction of Dr. Peterson. The two-year program has high concentration in science and math in the first year and moves into the

petroleum classes during the second year.

The Food Service Management course also began last semester and offers students training in the business aspect of food service. The program will be promoted more in the future and expanded accordingly.

A program in the developmental stage is the Nursing program. The four-year program will be divided between GSC and the Charleston Medical Center through West Virginia University. The program will offer a BSN in Nursing and will employ eight instructors; four on GSC campus and four at WVU. Dr. Flack says that

Ladies Tame Bobcats

In the only action seen by the Lady Pioneers' squad last week, the GSC women emerged victorious over the West Virginia Wesleyan Lady Bobcats on January 16. The Glenville ladies ran away from the Wesleyan team, 94-55, after maintaining only a slim 44-37 lead at halftime.

Glenville was led by a balanced scoring attack, with five players scoring in double figures. Senior Bunny Taylor led the squad with 18 points, 13 assists, seven rebounds, and five steals in a fine showing. Following Taylor in scoring were Maria Lothes and Sonja Bailey with 17 each, Tina Burkhamer with 16, Jewell Rankin with 14, Janice Hensley with four, Cathy Starcher with three, Jill Burkhammer and Kathy Knapp with two each, and Marsha Shrader with one. Regular starter Kim Maynard was shut out in the scoring column, but contributed five rebounds. Hensley was high rebounder, grabbing nine, while Lothes also pulled down five.

The Glenville squad played overtime in the sec-

ond half of the contest on both offense and defense, scoring 50 while holding the Lady Bobcats to just 15 markers. Both squads pulled down 44 rebounds.

For Wesleyan, Amy Felker led the way with 15 points and 10 rebounds.

Glenville shot 56% in field goal percentage and 63% from the free throw line.

The Lady Pioneers were in action Monday night against Salem, but results of the contest were unavailable at press time.

In further action this week, the ladies travel to Fairmont to take on the Lady Falcons on Thursday, January 26 and on Saturday, January 28, they take to the road again to battle perennial conference powerhouse, the University of Charleston Lady Golden Eagles.

The Glenville State College Cheerleaders will be selling raffle tickets for two afghans. Tickets are only \$1 and can be purchased from any GSC Cheerleader. The winning tickets will be drawn at the last home ballgame and the winner must be present to win.

Intramural Hoop Play Coinmences

The intramural program's basketball season is underway, beginning this week, with a few changes. The Intramural Council ruled by unanimous decision, in a meeting on January 19, that "any individual who has ever lettered on a varsity team shall not be eligible for play in that sport." The rule further states that "any individual who has participated on a varsity team as a player shall not be eligible to participate in that sport in that year." The intramural games will be played following NAIA rules with two 20 minute halves.

There are 17 men's squads lined up for competition and five women's teams. Each roster is limited to 15 players, with a maximum of 10 players competing per game.

Tentative dates for play are: January 25, 7:30 and 8:30 p.m. (men); January 26, 7:30 and 8:30 (men); January 30, 7:30 (women); February 2, 7:30 and 8:30 (men); February 9, 7:30 and 8:30 (men); February 13, 9:30 (women); February 15, 7:30 and 8:30 (men); and February 16, 9:30 (men).

At the end of the season the top four teams will compete in a single elimination tournament.

More information will be forthcoming on schedules of play and follow-up results of action throughout the season.

Men Raise Mark To 9-7

In men's hoop action last week, the Glenville State College Pioneers won two games and lost one to raise their overall record to 9-7. On Monday, January 16, the Pioneers lost to Rio Grande College, 80-61, in Rio Grande, Ohio. The Pioneers, down by 13 at half, 40-27, were led in scoring by Kenneth Taylor with 19. Following Taylor in scoring were Rich Moore with 14, Clay Young with 12, Steve Linville with eight, Matthew Bullett with six, and Rudy Watts with two. Young pulled down a game-high 10 rebounds, followed by Linville with nine.

The Pioneers, plagued by 23 turnovers, shot only 48% from the floor and hit 65% of their shots from the free throw line. Rio Grande shot 55% from the floor and a near-perfect 92% from the free throw line.

The Pioneers took to the road again three days later, but this time, Lady Luck rode with them as they defeated Davis and Elkins, 56-41, at Elkins. Young led the GSC squad in the scoring column with 16, followed by Moore with 11, Taylor with 10, Watts with eight, Linville with seven, and Bullett and Steve Morris with two each in the low-scoring outing. Young also snagged six steals for the Pioneers.

The Pioneers finished the game with a 49.1% average from the floor and a 66.6%

mark from the free throw line

Finally, in action at home on Saturday, the Pioneers walked away from the Concord Mountain Lions with a convincing 92-77 victory.

Young again led GSC in scoring with 26 markers, followed by Moore and Taylor with 16 each, Linville with 14, Morris with nine, Watts with seven, and Bullett with four. Young also led the way in rebounding, grabbing 16.

David Darnell led the way for Concord scoring a game high 34 points.

At halftime, GSC held a convincing 41-27 lead, but Concord fought back with a 50-point output in the second half as compared to the Pioneers' 51. The Pioneers maintained control of the game throughout, though, and forced the Mountain Lions to commit numerous fouls in the waning minutes of the game.

GSC shot 62.1% from the floor and 63.1% from the free throw line for the contest.

The next contest for the Pioneers is tonight (Wednesday) versus Fairmont State at Fairmont. The Pioneers also stay on the road for contests on January 28 and 31 against Shepherd and Alderson-Broadbudds respectively.
