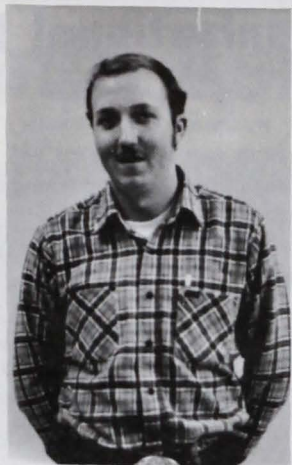

Hickman Is New ITV Coordinator

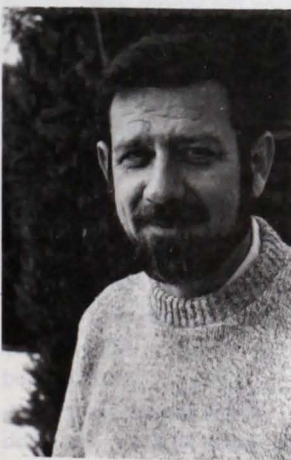
An offering of six courses to a gross enrollment of 228 students is being coordinated this semester by Mr. Joe Hickman, GSC's new Instructional Television (ITV) Coordinator. Mr. Hickman was named to this position at the beginning of the semester, and will be working in cooperation with Dr. Bruce Flack, the ITV chairman for the Board of Regents, in selecting courses to be taught and instructors to teach the clas-

ses.

Mr. Hickman cited many advantages to using television as an instructional medium, including the fact that the growing influence of audio-visual materials and telecommunications will greatly broaden tv instruction in the future. He also noted that video tapes will soon be used extensively.

Another great advantage in ITV instruction is the fact that it is a nationwide program. Three of four stations offering instructional television in the area are available to viewers in GSC's service area, giving people the opportunity to bring some of the nation's most prominent educators into local homes and classrooms.

Instructional television has been very successful in West Virginia, according to Mr. Hickman. Last semester, 2000 students were enrolled in ITV courses statewide.

Forensic Team Takes First Place Trophy

The GSC forensics team competed in the 34th Annual Ruth A. Wilcox Forensics Tournament at Marietta College last weekend.

In their best showing this year, the team won first place over 27 schools who participated.

GSC was first place with 160 points and their closest competitor was Ohio University with 146 points.

This is the first time in the 34-year history of the tournament that a school without a debate team has won. Second- and third place Ohio University and Wayne State each had debate teams.

One of the winningest teams at GSC, the forensics team will compete in a National tournament for the fifth year in a row.

Events that the team finaled in were Informative, persuasive, and impromptu speaking and prose interpretation.

The forensic team is to be commended for a job well done.

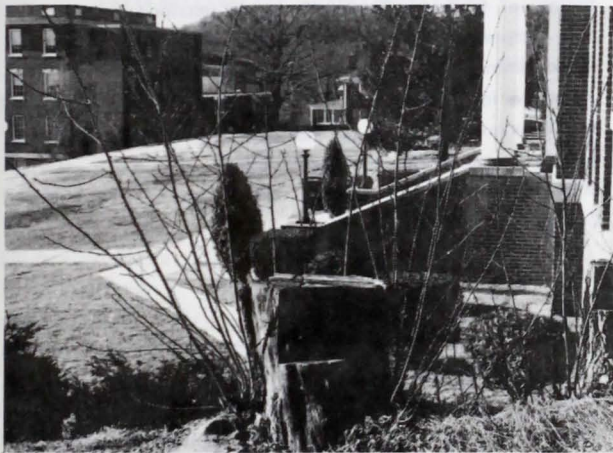
Students Ask, 'Winter or Spring ?'

The minute we all finally became accustomed to trudging through the snow and slipping on the ice, it all disappears and we're struck with a heat wave (43 degrees!).

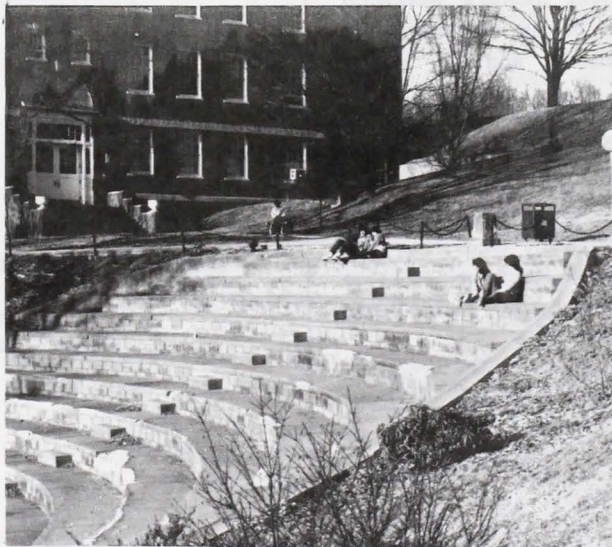

Workshop Slated

On Wednesday, February 22, GSC will be hosting a West Virginia Local Government Training Institute Workshop, "Handling DUI Cases", from 9:45 a.m. to 3:45 p.m. in the Vandalia Room.

The workshop will examine the West Virginia law dealing with the intoxicated driver and how it can be adequately enforced. Special attention will be paid to problems in prosecuting DUI cases and scientific evidence necessary and new field sobriety tests will be addressed.

The program will be under the direction of Charles B. Howard, J.D., a former Kanawha County Magistrate who is currently assistant prosecuting attorney of Monongalia County. Assisting Howard in the program will be Sgt. Herbert Richardson, a certified DUI instructor with the W.Va. Department of Public Safety, and Trooper David Clay, a chemist with the Department of Public Safety.

A registration fee of \$20 is required for the class, which is open to the public and is typically attended by many state law enforcement officials. According to Dr. Irvin D. Talbott, Director of the workshop, the response thus far has been tremendous.

Next month's workshop will be on the subject of homicide and sex crimes.

Men Win One, Lose One

The GSC men's hoop squad split their contest last week with a victory over conference foe, Fairmont State, and a conference loss to Shepherd College. After these contests, the Pioneers' record settled at 10-8 overall and 8-6 in the WVIAC.

On Wednesday night, the Pioneers travelled to the Feaster Center in Fairmont and emerged with a slim 70-68 victory margin. Senior Clay Young led the Pioneers to victory with a phenomenal performance. Young personally accounted for 35 points, half the GSC squad's total output, and 21 rebounds of the team's total 37. Following Young in scoring were Rich Moore with 11, Steve Linville with nine, Matthew Bullett and Kenneth Taylor with six each, and Steve Morris with three. Linville

also pulled down eight rebounds for the Pioneers and passed off four assists. GSC shot 50% in field goal percentage and 65% from the free throw line.

Fairmont was led by Mike Ellis with 25 points and Tim Murphy with 16.

On Saturday night, the Pioneers again took to the road and returned home with a loss at the hands of the Shepherd College Rams, 89-79.

Four Pioneers scored in double figures with Moore leading the way with 23, followed by Young with 19, Linville with 14, and Taylor with 10. Also scoring for GSC were Rudy Watts with eight, Bullett with four, and Morris with three. Young and Taylor led GSC on the boards with 21 and 20 cars, respectively, while Moore passed off five assists

and snagged three steals. GSC outrebounded Shepherd 64-61.

At halftime, GSC was down by 16, at 49-33, but the Pioneers outscored the Rams 46-40 in the second stanza. In the final 5:38 of the contest, the Pioneers outpointed Shepherd, 20-7, but it was too little, too late as the final buzzer sounded with the score reading 89-79 against the GSC squad.

Shepherd was led by Antoine Makle with 26 points and Mark Palmer with 25.

The Pioneer squad travelled to Phillipi to take on Alderson-Broadbudds on Tuesday night, but results were unavailable at press time. The Pioneers play at home tonight (Wednesday) versus Davis and Elkins and Tech visits Glenville on Saturday.

Lady Pioneers Fall

In women's intercollegiate basketball action last week, the GSC Lady Pioneers captured a victory over the Salem College Tigers on Monday to up their conference record to a perfect 9-0 mark. Thursday, January 26 and Saturday, January 28, however, brought contests on the road for the GSC squad against two spoilers, Fairmont State and the University of Charleston. The GSC ladies were defeated in both contests, causing their record to drop to 9-2 in the conference and 10-5 overall.

At Salem, the GSC women came out on top with a victory margin of 70-49, after trailing 34-32 at halftime. In the second half, however, the ladies outscored the Salem squad, 38-15. It was 8:52 into the second stanza before the Lady Tigers scored their first field goal and they did not hit another field goal until there was only 4:05 left in the contest.

Senior Bunny Taylor led the GSC women with 17 points, followed by Kim Maynard with 13, Jewell Rankin with 10, Maria Lothes with nine, Tina Burkhamer with eight, Sonja Bailey and Marsha Shrader with four each, Janice Hensley and Jill Burkhamer with two each, and Cathy Starcher with one. Maynard led the squad with 12 rebounds and Taylor passed off eight assists and grabbed six steals.

Glenville shot only 35% from the floor, but popped in 59% of their free throws for the game.

On Thursday, Taylor led the Lady Pioneers against the Lady Falcons of Fairmont, but the Fairmont squad emerged the victor by a score of 72-57. Taylor notched 16 markers in the contest, followed by Bailey, Tina Burkhamer, Rankin, and Lothes with eight each; Hensley with five; and Maynard with four. Maynard led in rebounding with 17. GSC outrebounded the Fairmont team 55-42. Percentage-wise, GSC shot only 30% from the floor and completed 64.3% from the free throw line.

Fairmont was led by Vicki Huffman with 24 points and Kamela Meikle with 19.

At the Eddie King Gymnasium in Charleston, the Lady Pioneers fell to perennial conference powerhouse, the University of Charleston Lady Golden Eagles by a score of 86-74.

Charleston was led by Denise Wentz with 22 points and Alvena Allen with 18.

The women play West Liberty away on Friday and Wheeling away on Saturday.
