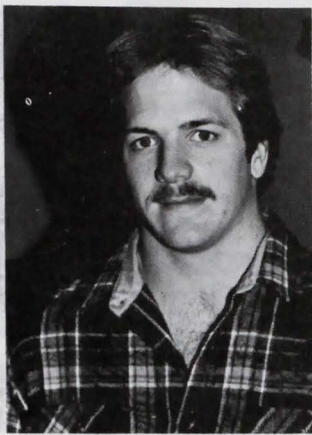

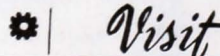

GSC Defeats Conference Foes

The Glenville State College men's hoop team took a two-game sweep over conference foes last week to raise its record to 14-9 overall and 12-7 in the WVIAC.

On Tuesday, February 7, the West Virginia State Yellow Jackets travelled to Glenville to suffer an 82-76 loss at the hands of the Pioneers. Clay Young led the GSC squad in scoring with 22 points. Following Young in scoring were Rich Moore with 19, Kenneth Taylor with 15, Rudy Watts with 12, Steve Linville with 10, and Matthew Bullett with four. Linville led the way on the boards for the Pioneers with 11 rebounds.

In the first half, State, led by James Washington with 24 points, held a two-point lead over the GSC team at 38-36. The Pioneers ran out ahead

of the Yellow Jackets in the second half, though, by a score of 46-38 to provide GSC with its winning margin.

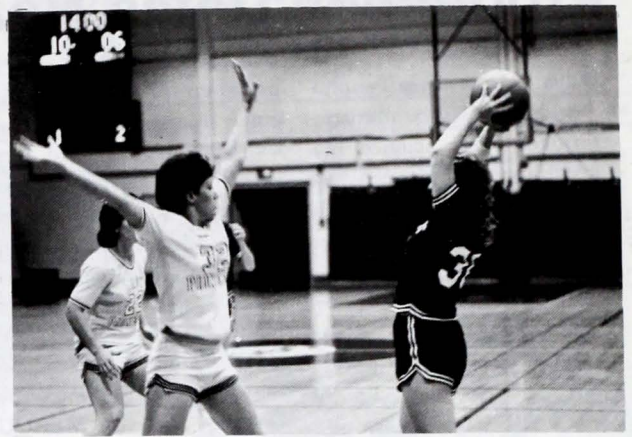
In game totals, the Pioneers shot 51.6% from the floor and 69.6% from the free throw line. The Pioneers outrebounded the Yellow Jackets 42-32.

On Thursday, February 9, the Pioneers travelled to the Rex Pyles Arena in Phillipi to take on the Alderson-Broadus Battlers and came home with a slim 85-83 victory. The Pioneers, up by eight at the half, 45-37, barely held on in a nip-and-tuck battle as A-B fought back with a 46-40 showing in the second half.

Young again led the Pioneers, scoring 25 points and grabbing 14 rebounds. Young was followed in scoring by

Taylor with 17, Moore with 16, Steve Morris with nine, Watts and Linville with eight each, and Bullett with two. Glenville, plagued by 22 turnovers, was outrebounded by A-B, 41-39, but outshot the Battlers. Percentage-wise, GSC shot 66% from the floor and 69.2% from the free throw line, while A-B connected on 40% from the floor and 63.6% from the free throw line. A-B was led by John Wilkins with 23 points and 12 rebounds.

In action this week, the men played at home last night (Tuesday) versus Bluefield State. Results were unavailable at press time. The men also take on the Fairmont Falcons on Saturday night.

FSC Spoils Week For Ladies

In women's conference action last week, the Glenville State College Lady Pioneers ran away from the West Virginia Wesleyan Lady Bobcats and lost a heartbreaker to the Fairmont State Lady Falcons to make the squad's overall record 14-6, with a 13-3 conference mark.

On Monday, February 6, the Tim Carney-coached Lady Pioneers waltzed past Wesleyan, 95-74, at home. First-year player, Jewell Rankin, led the GSC squad in scoring with 19 markers. Following Rankin in scoring were Bunny Taylor with 17, Kim Maynard with 15, Sonja Bailey with 12, Tina Burkhamer with 10, Maria Lothes with seven, Kathy Knapp with five, Janice Hensley with four, and Cathy Starcher, Myrtle Conley, and Jill Burkhammer with two each. Taylor and Lothes grabbed seven rebounds each and Taylor passed off for 12 assists and snagged five steals. The GSC ladies outrebounded Wesleyan, 47-40.

Wesleyan, led by Amy Felker with 22 points, shot 43.2% from the floor and 66.7% from the charity stripe, while the Glenville women completed 56.8% from the floor and 55% from the free throw line.

On Saturday, February 11, conference foe, Fairmont, came to town and slipped past the Lady Pioneers, 73-70, in an emo-

tion-charged battle for supremacy. The Lady Falcons, up by six at the half, 36-30, were battled every inch of the way and were outscored by three, 40-37, in the second stanza, but the Lady Pioneers still came out with the loss.

The Glenville squad was led by Taylor with 24 points, followed by Bailey with 15, Maynard with 12, Burkhamer with eight, Lothes with seven, and Rankin and Hensley with two each. Maynard pulled down 15 rebounds and Taylor and Bailey completed 13 and six assists, respectively.

The Glenville women, who were outrebounded, 43-40, held Fairmont star, Vicki Huffman, to just seven points, but Tammy Klinkoski and Vickie Bostic picked up the slack, scoring 23 and 16 points, respectively.

The Glenville ladies shot 43.1% from the floor and 66.7% from the free throw line, while Fairmont connected on 53.3% from the floor and 47.4% from the charity stripe.

In the last week of action before the conference tournament at Buckhannon February 21-25, the ladies face three more conference battles, all at home. On Monday, the ladies took on Concord (results were unavailable). Thursday night brings the West Virginia Tech women to town and Friday will bring the West Virginia State squad.
