Glenville State College Theatre's beckoning of spring is the current production of the 1937 Pulitzer Prize winner *YOU CAN'T TAKE IT WITH YOU*. This play was written by the collaborating team of Moss Hart and George S. Kaufman.

YOU CAN'T TAKE IT WITH YOU is a madcap comedy centering around the eccentricities of the Sycamore family. The family is headed by the grandfather, Grandpa's daughter Penny - a playwright- and her husband Paul - an inventor - have two daughters- Essie and Alice. Essie is a ballerina married to Ed, a musician. Alice is engaged to the boss's son. The family is served by the black

domestic team of Donald and Rheba.

Of course, the Sycamores and Alice's beau's family get together - disastrously. But, of course, there is a happy ending. Before that, however, there are many colorful visitors to the household including a mad Russian, a countess, a drunken actress - even the G Men.

Performance dates are Thursday, Friday, and Saturday, February 23, 24, 25 at 8 p.m. in the Glenville State College Auditorium. The play is directed by Mrs. Linda McKown, director of theatre at GSC.

Plans were finalized for our annual Founders Day Weekend, March 24-26.

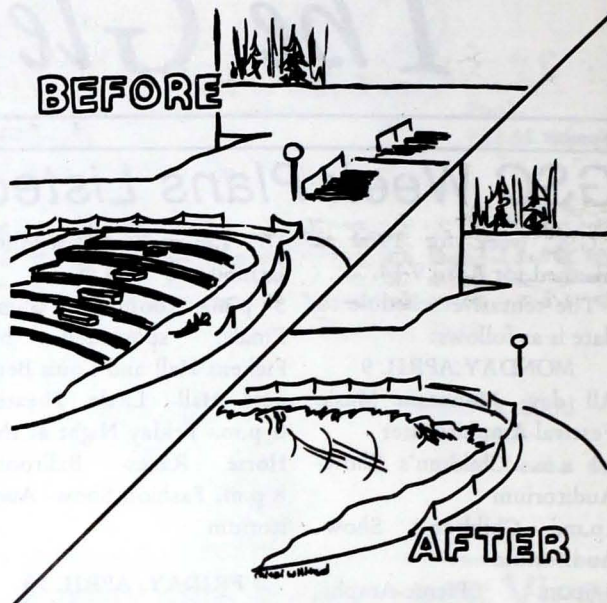

Amphitheatre To Relocate

Thinking of these warm weather days brings to mind the large number of students that congregate in the amphitheatre during leisure time, between classes, etc.

The amphitheatre serves many purposes for the Glenville State College community. Concerts and other programs are held there, classes meet there occasionally, and, above all, it serves as a welcome haven for students needing a break or ones just wishing to socialize in a pleasant climate for a while.

Sometime over the course of the next two years, the current amphitheatre will be replaced as part of a two-phase project to alleviate a water drainage problem in the library area. The new structure will most likely be similar to the old one, only smaller.

Another point which comes to mind when looking at the amphitheatre is the absence of the steps which used to cut through the middle of the hillside above the amphitheatre. These steps were a great place to rest and socialize. They were probably eliminated to make room for construction which has yet to occur. Couldn't we have held on to these steps a little longer?

On the positive side, however, we will be able to keep our 20-year old friend a little longer, and when it is relocated, there will still be a place to congregate.

While most of the world has been concentrating on the Winter Olympics in Sarajevo, Glenville sports fans have been embroiled in the world of intercollegiate basketball.

The GSC women's squad finished its regular season in third place in the West Virginia Conference with an overall record of 16-7 (15-4 in the conference). The ladies' season ended on a sour note, despite stellar performances from seniors, Sonja Bailey and Bunny Taylor, in a decisive stampede past West Virginia State, 99-71. Student assistant coach, Mark Kozlowski, has been indefinitely suspended from his coaching assignments by the commissioner of the WVIAC because of an altercation with a referee in which he was involved after the women's heartbreaking loss to West Virginia Tech last week.

Fans of the always-strong Lady Pioneers hope that the shake-up will not affect the performance of the squad in this week's conference tournament at Buckhannon, however. The ladies were to have played against Salem last night (Tuesday) in first-round action. The tournament will continue throughout the week, with the consolation and finals being played at 1 p.m. and 3 p.m., respectively, on Saturday.

The GSC men's team, led by stalwart Clay Young, finished up its home season last week and has only two games remaining before the conference tournament begins February 28 at the Charleston Civic Center. The Pioneers, currently fourth place in the WVIAC, have had an outstanding season under first-year head coach, Gary Nottingham. Nottingham has turned a squad which finished with an 8-20 record last season, into an exciting winner, as the GSC Bleacher Bums will be quick to affirm. The Pioneers' record is now 16-9 overall and 14-7 in the conference. The fact that has thrilled so many Pioneer fans, though, is that the men have gone 11-2 at home. Part of the reason for the Pioneers' success may well be the enthusiastic, sometimes frenetic, support by their fans.

Whatever the causes, though, the Pioneers have indeed turned around and are practically sure to offer fans better than the first-round loss suffered at last year's tournament. So let's support both the Pioneer squads as they face foes in the final battles for conference supremacy.

Vincent Signs Recruits

Glenville State College head football coach, Frank Vincent, has recently announced the signing of three recruits for the 1984 season.

Eric Penick, a 6'2", 204-pound tailback-safety from Gallipolis, OH, chose Glenville over 25 other schools. He was selected as a first team All-State performer twice during his career at North Gallia High School. Penick rushed for 1801 yards on 228 carries during his senior season for a 7.9 yard average per carry. He

scored 25 touchdowns and 160 points and closed out his high school career with 4858 yards on 624 carries Vincent says, "We are looking for Eric to be a great one. He comes from a winning, solid program and the fact that he chose us over so many schools really says a lot for our program."

The Pioneers also signed Rick Cantrell, a 6'3", 200-pound tight-end-defensive end from West Palm Beach, FL, and Danny George, a 6'2", 190-pound linebacker from Harrisville, WV.

There will be a GSC Week Committee meeting Tuesday, February 28 at 12:30 p.m. in the Little Theatre.

Men Win Two

The GSC men's basketball squad scored two victories at home last week to raise the overall record to 16-9, while the conference record settled at 14-7.

On February 14, the Pioneers slipped past Bluefield State, 86-80. Though the Big Blues were ahead of the Pioneers by one at the half, Glenville came back in the second half to capture the win, led by Clay Young and Rich Moore with 21 points each. Also scoring for the Pioneers were Matthew Bullett with 13, Steve Linville with 11, Rudy Watts with eight, and Steve Morris and Kenneth Taylor with six each. Young, among the national leaders in rebounding percentage in the NAIA, pulled down nine caroms to lead the Pioneers. For the game, the Pioneers shot 53.4% from the floor and 80% from the free throw line.

February 18 brought a victory over conference foes, Fairmont State, 71-69. Down by six at half, the GSC men battled back in the second 20 minutes to provide GSC fans with a thrilling win.

Senior captain, Clay Young, playing in his last home contest as a GSC Pioneer, led the squad with 17 points and eight rebounds. Following Young in scoring were Morris with 15, Watts with 13, Moore with 12, Taylor with 10, and Linville and Bullett with two each.

The men shot 57.1% from the floor and 68.4% at the free throw line for the contest.

The Pioneers have two contests remaining in regular season action. They travel to Salem tonight (Wednesday) and to Concord on Saturday before preparing for the conference tournament which begins February 28 at the Charleston Civic Center.

Ladies Finish Third

The GSC Lady Pioneers went 2-1 in action last week to complete the regular season with a 16-7 overall record and a 15-4 conference mark, good for a third place conference finish.

On Monday, February 13, the ladies faced visiting Concord College and walked away with an 82-61 victory. The GSC women, comfortably ahead throughout the game, were led by Bunny Taylor with 18 points, followed by Jewell Rankin with 16, Tina Burkhamer with 12, Kim Maynard with eight, Maria Lothes and Kathy Knapp with six each, and Sonja Bailey Cathy Starcher, Myrtle Conley, and Janice Hensley all with four. Lothes led the team in rebounding with seven and Taylor completed six assists and grabbed seven steals.

One of the ladies' most disappointing games of the season came on Thursday, February 16, as they fell to West Virginia Tech, 67-64. Rankin led the GSC women in scoring for the highly emotional, seesaw game with 16. She was followed in scoring by Taylor with 14, Bailey with 10, Maynard with nine, Lothes with eight, Hensley with five, and Burkhamer with two. Rankin and Maynard each pulled down 10

rebounds for the GSC women.

Determined not to fall again, the Lady Pioneers ran away from the State Lady Yellow Jackets on the following evening, 99-71. State, behind by a mere two points at times, was blown away by the GSC ladies in the second stanza, as the senior guard tandem of Bailey and Taylor made outstanding showings in their last regular season game for the Lady Pioneers. Reserve Jill Burkhammer also played in her last home contest in the blue and white of GSC.

Bailey led the GSC women in scoring with 25 markers, followed by Taylor with 20, Maynard with 18, Tina Burkhamer with 12, Lothes with 10, Hensley with six, Rankin with four, and Starcher and Marsha Shrader with two each. Rankin pulled down eight rebounds to lead GSC on the boards. Taylor passed off 10 assists and grabbed four steals, while Bailey completed six assists and snagged two steals.

The ladies were to have squared off against Salem College yesterday (Tuesday) in the first round of the conference tournament.

Symptoms Discussed

This is the season for sleigh riding and skiing, but it's also the season for colds and sore throats.

Ms. Cherie Colavecchio, L.P.N. at the Kyle Clinic outlined symptoms on what to do if these symptoms are present:

If you have a runny nose, fever of 99 - 100 degrees, muscle/joint aches and pains, fatigue, red throat or blisters in the back of throat and mouth, you probably have a viral upper respiratory infection.

If you have a sore throat in the morning only, fever of 99 - 100 degrees, dark circles under your eyes, runny nose and eyes, sneezing, clear mucous, or symptoms worsen when you are outside, you probably have an allergy.

If you have a headache, high fever, no runny nose, or white patches in your

throat, you probably have a bacterial upper respiratory infection.

Regardless of the symptoms, you should: 1) Triple fluid intake; 2) Take aspirin; 3) Get plenty of rest; 4) Use cold drinks, salt water gargle, or drug store product to relieve your sore throat; 5) Consider yourself contagious until fever, cough, sneezing, and congestion are gone; 6) Take an antihistamine/decongestant if needed to relieve congestion; 7) Take cough syrup if needed to relieve uncontrollable coughing.

If the following symptoms persist you should see a doctor: fever over 103 degrees, have a fever which does not go below 101 degrees, even when taking aspirin or Tylenol, have ear pain, pearly yellow or green mucous, or if you have white or yellowish blisters in your throat.

James Attends Fest

Mr. John James, Associate Professor of Education, attended the Ohio State University Children's Literature Festival February 10 and 11.
