## GSC Receives Petroleum Funding

Governor Jay Rockefeller and Glenville State College President William K. Simmons accepted contributions totaling \$20,000 to enhance the college's petroleum engineering technology program. Dennis Xander, Chairman of the Board of Independent Oil & Gas Association of West Virginia (IOGA) and Terry L. Iden, president of IOGA, made the presentation in behalf of IOGA and its member companies.

"Glenville State College is pleased to embark on this program which marks a partnership between industry and higher education," stated President Simmons. "Glenville State College expresses its appreciation to IOGA, Eastern American Energy Corporation, I.L. Morris West Service, Inc., and Trio Petroleum Corporation for their generous contributions which make this joint effort possible."

"As Governor, I want to commend the Independent Oil and Gas Association and its members for their efforts in this educational endeavor," Governor Rockefeller said. "By helping to expand the petroleum engineering curriculum at Glenville State College, you are broadening our technological base in West Virginia."

Glenville State College is implementing the new two-year program which is designed to prepare students for employment in the oil and gas industry. Those completing the program will learn techniques utilized to discover, recover and produce natural gas with emphasis on practices employed in the Appalachian fields.

Xander pointed out that because of the growth in the oil and gas industry in West Virginia, well-trained persons are needed by companies that will be developing these important natural resources. "Everyone working in the industry does not need to be an engineer," he states, "but it is important that a sufficient number of persons are available who know the basics of petroleum technology. Properly trained personnel result in greater safety on the job." Xander continued, "This new program will also make it possible for companies needing qualified personnel to them locally."

"The value and growth of the oil and gas industry in West Virginia becomes clear," explained Iden, "when you note that revenues to the state from B&O taxes have increased from \$3.8 million in fiscal year

1973 to \$35.9 million in 1983. Also, drilling permits issued over that same period rose from 1,078 to 3,323. This tremendous growth created the need for such a program, and IOGA is extremely pleased to participate in this partnership between industry and higher education."

"I am proud to participate in this joint effort which will better prepare our young people for jobs in this vital area," the governor concluded.

The two main figures in the melee, head coach Tim Carney and assistant coach Mark Kozlowski, were suspended for the rest of the season. This undoubtedly ended the regular season on a sour note and contributed greatly to the Lady Pioneers' subsequent early exit from the West Virginia Conference Tournament.

Maybe the suspension was the best remedy to the situation, but many people, myself included, believe otherwise. A more thorough investigation may well have shown that the two coaches particularly Carney, were acting only in self-defense to action initiated by the referee in the heat of the moment. Whatever the case, I'm sure that some bitter feelings still exist over the entire development.

In any situation, GSC should support its people as much as possible, because we can't afford to lose them.

## Ladies Upset In Tourney

The Glenville State College Lady Pioneers waltzed past the Salem Lady Tigers in WVIAC tournament action last week, but were handed an early ticket home in a surprise loss to the Bluefield State Lady Blues.

In the game versus Salem College on February 21, senior, Bunny Taylor popped in 22 points to lead the way for the Lady Pioneers as they emerged victorious, 89-56. Following Taylor in scoring were Sonja Bailey with 18, Jewell Rankin, Kim Maynard, and Tina Burkhamer with 10 each, Maria Lothes with seven, Janice Hensley and Marsha Shrader with four each, and Cathy Starcher and Kathy Knopp with two each. Lothes led in rebounding with seven and Taylor completed seven assists and grabbed nine steals.

## Dorm Closings Announced

Dr. A.T. Billips, Vice President for Student Services, recently released the check-out procedures for students leaving the dormitories for spring break. The residence halls will be closed on Friday, March 9 at 5 p.m. and will re-open on Sunday, March 18 at 12 noon. Lunch (noon meal) will be the last meal served on Friday, March 9. Dinner (evening meal) will be the first meal served on Sunday, March 18.

At halftime of the contest, the GSC ladies held an unbelievable 53-19 lead over Salem. The Lady Pioneers shot 56% from the floor and 77% from the free throw line.

On February 23, the GSC women were handed a disappointing second-round loss by Bluefield, 72-58. The GSC ladies outscored the Lady Blues, 35-34, in the second stanza, but had been behind by 15 in the first half.

Rankin led the way for GSC with 18, followed by Taylor and Lothes with nine each, Maynard with seven, Burkhamer with six, Bailey with five, and Hensley with four. Maynard led in rebounding with eight, Taylor passed off nine assists and grabbed three steals.

The ladies completed 46% from the floor and 59% from the free throw line for the contest.

## Men Lose Two; Ready For Tourney

The Glenville State College Pioneers ended the regular season of play last week with two losses to Salem and Concord to finish with an overall record of 16-11 and 14-9 in the conference. The conference record was good enough to supply the Pioneers with a fourth place finish in the WVIAC.

On February 22, the GSC men travelled to Salem and fell to the Tigers, 88-85. Glenville held a seven-point lead over the Salem squad at the half, but Salem came back strong in the second stanza and the game ended in a 76-76 deadlock. The Tigers outscored GSC in the overtime period, 12-9, to emerge with the victory.

Freshmen Rudy Watts was Glenville's high

scorer, contributing 21 points to the Pioneers' final tally. Following Watts in scoring were Rich Moore with 15, Clay Young with 14, Kenneth Taylor and Steve Morris with 10 each, Steve Linville with eight, and Matthew Bullett with seven. Young led the Pioneers in rebounding with 12 boards. Moore passed off an outstanding 11 assists and also grabbed two steals.

GSC shot 57.4% from the floor for the game and 66.7% from the free throw line.

On February 25, the Pioneers took to the road and lost soundly to the Concord Mountain Lions, 104-82. The Pioneers trailed the entire game, being back by 15 at halftime.

GSC was led in

scoring by Young, with 26 in his last regular season game for the Pioneers. He was followed in the scoring column by Linville and Watts with 14 each, Moore with 10, Taylor with nine, Bullett with five, and Morris with four. Linville led GSC in rebounding, pulling down 12, while Young grabbed 11. Moore again made a fine showing by passing off for 10 assists.

The Pioneers out-rebounded Concord, 54-38. GSC's shooting percentage from the floor was 45.0 and from the charity stripe, it was 47.1.

GSC was scheduled for WVIAC tournament action on Tuesday night against number 13 finishers, West Virginia State.

The GSC Lady Pioneers' stay at Buckhannon for the WVIAC tournament was a mere two games last week, surprisingly short for the talented squad. The ladies, who were playing without either of their regular coaches, were upset on Thursday by Bluefield State. After last week's MERCURY went to press, it was discovered that Coach Tim Carney would be suspended from the tournament, along with student assistant coach, Mark Kozlowski, by a GSC administrative panel because of the altercation after the GSC-WV Tech ladies' game. Thus, the Glenville women were operating under the obvious handicap of playing without a coach familiar to every aspect of their game, as were Carney and Kozlowski. Much appreciation should be given to Whitey Adolfsen and Jerry Milliken of the physical education department and Pam Minigh and Judy Niday Batten, former Lady Pioneers, who aided the squad in the tournament action.

Nonetheless, the ladies are to be congratulated for their fine season. Special congratulations go out to Bunny Taylor and Sonja Bailey for the experience and leadership they used to guide the team throughout their senior seasons. Congratulations also to Taylor on her breaking of Pam Minigh's all-time scoring record for GSC. Taylor surpassed Minigh's old record of 1440 total points by five in the losing battle against Bluefield. Taylor was also selected for All-Tournament honors, making her the third person in the WVIAC history to be selected for All-Tourney honors for four consecutive seasons. She joins former GSC roundballer, Pam Minigh, and Fairmont State star, Vickie Huffman, as recipients of this honor.

The GSC men ended their season with a fourth place finish in the WVIAC. The men were to play number 13 West Virginia State on Tuesday in the conference tournament at Charleston, but results of the game were unavailable at press time.

A tournament follow-up will be printed in next week's edition of THE MERCURY.

## Sharps Wins Banner Contest

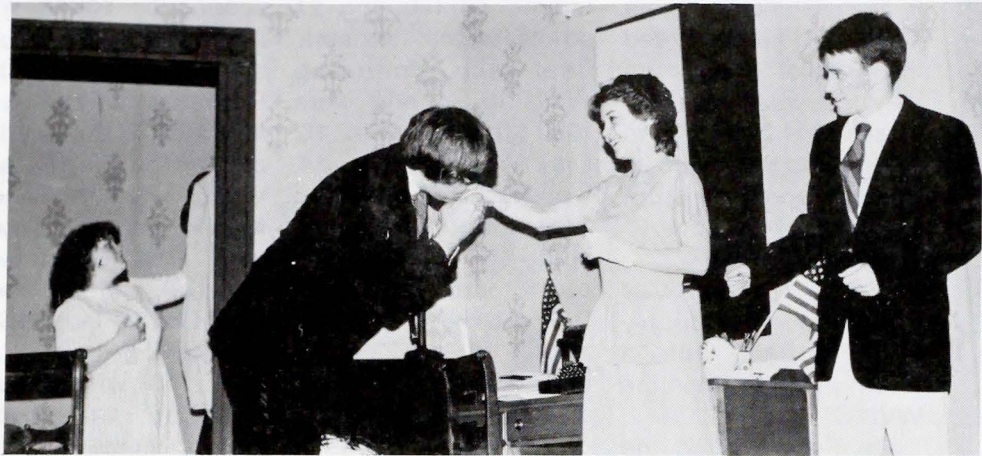
Diane Sharps, GSC junior physical education major, was the first place winner in the banner contest held by the WVIAC at the women's tournament held in Buckhannon last week. For her

# Theatre Production Praised From All Angles

Once again, director Linda McKown has succeeded in bringing Broadway to Glenville with her adaptation of Moss Hart's and George S. Kaufman's play, *YOU CAN'T TAKE IT WITH YOU*.

The entire play was set in the home of Martin Vanderhof, played by Joe Stephens, who gave an outstanding performance. Cara Keenan's portrayal of Penelope, the lady of the house was one of quality.

Donald and Rheba, the butler and maid, were wonderfully underplayed by Lloyd Willis and Cassandra White.

Cast as Essie, the struggling ballet dancer, Lisa McHenry pirouetted her way into a possible best actress nomination. Opposite Essie was Ed, the musical conductor of the "family," played very well by Scott Kitchen in his debut role.

A prime example of good casting was that of Randy Harper as Henderson, the IRS man; Tim Pittman, as Mr. DePinna, played his role as an inventor of fireworks well, accompanied by Mike Dotson as Paul Sycamore.

Randy Lewis and Tammi Igo in the roles of Tony and Alice, the only characters with any sanity, gave believable portrayals of young people in love.

Bobbi Nicholson as Gay Wellington, the alcoholic actress, played her part very convincingly.

Boris Kolenkhov, the Russian ballet instructor, was outlandishly portrayed by Tim Mace who fit the role well.

Mitchell Moore and Anita Stephenson as Tony's parents, Mr. and Mrs. Kirby, were very believable and gave fine performances.

Tim Brown as the head "J Man" was very good. His counterparts, Jim and Mac, Steve Keenan and Fred Penturff were good in their minor roles, also.

Finishing off the cast was Lou Davidson in her last role on the GSC stage. Miss Davidson portrayed the role of Olga with a believable accent and the utmost of poise and grace.

The set crew and Dr. Beverly DeBord deserve their own round of applause for constructing the best set I have ever seen. The cast as a whole worked very well together and I noticed no major flaws. The only question I have is where in the world did that gaudy mustache on Kolenkhov come from?

Judging by the responses of the "post graduate" folks in front of me, the children next to us, and the ripples among the audience as a whole, *YOU CAN'T TAKE IT WITH YOU* was a notable success. Able to leap over tall (and deeply ingrained) life-style attitudes with the ease of insight and humor, the play was a "super storyteller."

Weaving the threads of the various characters and the situations together, the cast and crew worked smoothly, and struck an excellent pace. Linda McKown is to be praised for the overall 'direction.'

From the opening curtain, I could not help but admire the extra-ordinary set. In our plasticized and disposable culture, it stood authentically for the historic period it represented. Bouquets to Beverly DeBord for her fine work! Very soon I was immersed in the interplay of the characters. Indeed most of them did seem "eccentric"...demonstrating a marked deviation from the "usual" practices and norms and occupations. From the perspective of one who often reflects about values as the grounding out of which comes behavior and actions, I was struck by the forcefulness of the play's statement, choosing simplicity, and non-cooperation with the frenetic, materialistic orientation of the times. Grandpa's table grace had all the qualities of the Gospel's "lilies of the field" message.

The acting was uniformly strong and consistent. All of the characters were believable, and the players brought energy and conviction to their roles.

Perhaps most important, the production gave each of us who tend to be so glued to the television, the opportunity to participate in a live event. It's a little like taking part in a snow sculpture. The excitement is partially generated by the acknowledgment that "when it's over, it's over." Rapport with the audience is an important factor, and we were certainly treated to an engaging cast.
