The Family Entertainment Night Movie will be held on April 19 and will feature "20,000 Leagues Under the Sea."

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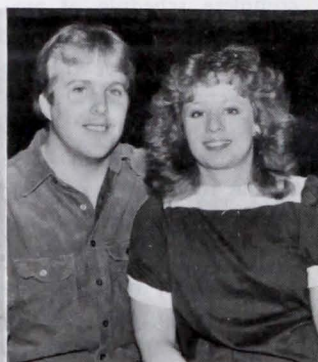

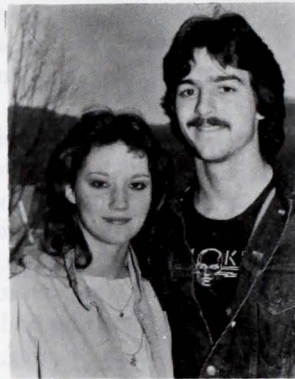

## Tracksters Finish Fourth

The Glenville State College men's track squad, under the direction of Jerry Milliken, competed at Laidley Field Saturday in the West Virginia State Invitational and finished fourth in the nine-team field. Cedarville won the meet, followed in scoring by West Virginia State, Central State, Glenville, Rio Grande, Walsh, Marietta, Morehead State, and West Liberty.

Individually for the Pioneer thinclads, Lloyd Willis finished second in the triple jump with a jump of 45 feet five inches; Mark

Aldridge finished third in the pole vault with a personal best of 12 feet; Moochie Brown finished second in the discus, third in the shot put, and fourth in the javelin; Trent King finished third in the high jump and fifth in the javelin; Gary Brissey finished fifth in the high hurdles; and Daryl Brill finished sixth in the 400 open.

The Pioneer 400-meter relay and 1600-meter relay teams both finished fourth.

The GSC squad will compete today (Wednesday) at Rio Grande, Ohio.

## Clay Young Selected For Various Honors

Clay Young, Glenville's 6'5" center, has received honorable mention on the 1984 NAIA All-American squad.

The senior co-captain led the Pioneers in scoring with a 20.6 average and his 11.2 rebounding average placed him 15th in the nation. He was also selected to the All-WVIAC first team this year.

Glenville's head coach, Gary Nottingham, stated "Clay certainly deserved this honor, if not something higher." Nottingham also went on to say that, "Young has to be considered one of the top inside players in the country." Young closed his career with 1508 career points which placed him 10th on

Glenville State's all-time scoring list. His total is the highest among players who only played three years. His total of 820 career rebounds placed him seventh on the all-time GSC rebounding list. This also was the highest among players of only three years.

Young has a career shooting percentage of 53.1 and 9.8 rebounding average. He ended his career at GSC with an 18.0 scoring average in 84 games.

Young was also honored as a member of the South squad in the second annual Pony North-South All-Star game Saturday at Buckhannon. He scored 14 points in the contest.

## Intramural Play Continues

In semi-final action of the men's intramural basketball tournaments on Monday night, the Loads and the Hogs emerged as victors of their respective contests.

In the first game of the evening, the Loads slipped past GQ by a score of 82-78. Billy Hamilton and Chuck Lambert led the Loads in scoring with 29 and 24, respectively, while L.J. Jorden and K.C. Creel

contributed 32 and 21 each for GQ.

The second game of the evening saw the Hogs defeat the Brew Crew by a score of 83-69. Greg Gency and Rod Abrams led the Hogs in scoring with totals of 23 and 20, respectively. Mike Payne scored 38 for the Brew Crew.

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# Elderhostel Scholarships Available

Elderhostel scholarships are still available and may be picked up in the Office of Student Services. There are 22 \$150 scholarships available for relatives or acquaintances of GSC students. Eligibility requires that applicants must be 60 years of age or over or those whose participating spouse or companion qualifies may be included.

Elderhostel combines the best tradition of educating and hosteling. It is for elder citizens on the move in terms of travel and in a sense of reaching out to new experiences.

This summer's Elderhostel programs include Tough Times for Kids, An Analysis of Golf Skills, A Look at Japanese Life and Culture, From Behind the Great Wall: China, Yesterday and Today, Freelance Writing,

Appalachian Folk Culture, Basic Computer Literacy, International Cuisine, and many more programs that promise to be fun and interesting. Except for the week of July 8-14 which is \$190, resident participants pay \$180 per week tuition which includes lecture materials, accommodations, and three balanced meals daily. A \$30 deposit is required. Except for the week of July 8-14, commuter participants pay \$50 per week tuition which includes lunch, transportation, and lecture materials. A \$15 deposit is required. Any GSC student may sign up for a scholarship for an over-60 acquaintance. The student or participant pays \$15 and Glenville State College will pay the other \$15 of the deposit fee. ### PAUL TELLS OTHERS ABOUT HIS GOSPEL

It is true that NOW there is but one gospel and God's anathema is pronounced upon any who would presume to proclaim any other (Gal. 1:8,9), but those who suppose that Paul proclaimed the same good news which the twelve before him had proclaimed, should carefully read Galatians 2:1-9.

The twelve had been proclaiming our Lord's kingdom rights in "the gospel of the kingdom". The kingdom having been rejected, however, God raised up Paul to proclaim "the gospel of the grace of God" (Acts 20:24). In Galatians 1:11,12, this apostle declares:

"But I certify you, brethren, that the gospel which was preached of me is not after man, for I neither received it of man, neither was I taught it, but by the revelation of Jesus Christ."

This is only one of many passages in which he declares that he was commissioned to proclaim a special message by the glorified Lord Himself (Eph. 3:1-4;

Rom. 16:25; etc.).

Now in Galatians 2:2, the apostle states: "I went up BY REVELATION [God sent him] and communicated unto them [the apostles and elders at Jerusalem] that gospel which I preach among the Gentiles...." But was he not merely checking to make sure that he and they were preaching the same good news? No, for he goes on to say: "But [I went] privately to them which were of reputation, lest by any means I should run, or had run, in vain."

Verses 7 and 9 then go on to tell how "they saw" and "perceived" the grace that had been given to Paul, so that they publicly and officially gave him "the right hands of fellowship," acknowledging him as the apostle of grace, sent to the world with a message of grace:

"Being justified freely by His grace through the redemption that is in Christ Jesus" (Rom. 3:24).
