## BenefitsAre Topic Of Meeting

Continued progress cited include obtaining toward achieving addi- full funding for the tional benefits for employees and campus constituencies was the main point of concern of the April 5 meeting of the West Virginia Board of Regents, and higher education officials are already looking ahead to the 1985 Legislative session.

President William K. Simmons, acting Chancellor of the BOR, stated that there are still things that the Board wishes to accomplish for employees, and desires "to maintain the momentum and rapport we established with members of the Legislature during this past session."

Dr. Simmons also remarked on other future goals, one of which is to restructure the faculty improvement fee into a faculty and staff development fee. This would allow for both new training and continuing education funds for all public higher eduction employees. Other goals
recently enacted faculty salary schedule which will allow colleges to attract and retain quality faculty; seeking increased funding for research to compliment college and university commitment to teaching; and seeking the creation of a medical student tuition surcharge and loan program to offset escalating medical education costs and to assure continued access to medical education by all West Virginians.

Dr. Simmons also indicated that higher education officials were generally quite pleased with legislation enacted during the past session which benefitted employees, specifically citing the 7.5 percent salary increase, the option to purchase additional group life and accidental death insurance, and a faculty salary schedule, all of which will become effective July 1.

## "THE TIME ELEMENT IN SCRIPTURE"

How many problems dained a preacher and an would be solved, how many apostle" (I Tim. 2:6,7). seeming contradictions in Scripture explained, if we were more careful to note the time element, emphasized so strongly in th Word of God.

In Romans 5:12 we learn that sin entered the human race by Adam. Then later "the law entered" (Ver. 20). But still later the Apostle But still later the Apostle Paul arose to say: "But now, the righteousness of God
without the law is without the law is mani fested" (Rom. 3:21),
Early in man's history blood sacrifices were required for acceptance with God (See Gen. 4:4; Heb 11:4); later circumcision and the law (Gen. 17:14 Ex. 19:5), and still later repentance and water baptism (Mk. 1:4; Acts $2: 38$ ) But not until Paul do we learn of salvation by grace through faith alone, on the basis of Christ's finished, all-sufficient work of redemption.
This is
This is why the apostle refers in Galatians $3: 23$ to "the faith which should afterward be revealed." This is why he declares that our Lord "gave Himself a ransom for all, to be manifested in due time," and adds: "whereunto $I$ am or-

It is only as we recognize the time element in Scripture that we see the difference between "the kingdom of heaven", and "the Body of Christ," between "the of Christ, between "the gospel of the kingdom and the gospel of the grace of God," between the "dispensation of law" and the "dispensation of the grace of God."
A comparison of Romans 3:21 and 26 shows how this time element is emphasized in Scripture. After discussing the function of the law in Verses 19 and 20, the Apostle Paul declares:

BUT NOW the right eousness of God without the law is manifested
Then, in Verse 26 he states that it is God's purpose:
"To declare, I say, AT THIS TIME, His [Christ's] righteousness; that He [God] might be just and the Justifier of him that be lieveth in Jesus.
There you have God's terms of salvation for today. The sinner who places his trust in Jesus Christ who paid the penalty for our sins, is justified before the bar of God. Glorious message!
