Dr. Simmons Returns To GSC

Glenville State College is a very unique college in the state of West Virginia, due to the fact that its president also served as the Interim Chancellor of the WV Board of Regents. Not many colleges have this distinction and not many have such a successful president as GSC's Dr. William K. Simmons.

President Simmons traveled between October, 1983 and June, 1984

to serve as the Interim Chancellor of the Board of Regents in Charleston and as GSC's president. President Simmons described his chancellorship as "an interesting experience." He went on to say that he "learned a great deal about higher education, budgets, and it was an invaluable experience." Tom D. Miller of *The Herald-Dispatch*, Huntington, in the Sunday, August 22, 1984 issue

wrote in his article about President Simmons' chancellorship: "But Simmons moved into the role with ease and handled a difficult 1984 legislative session with distinction. It earned him high marks from legislative leaders and others involved in the deliberations of higher education issues."

Not only did President Simmons handle his job of chancellor successfully, he also helped


On Tuesday, September

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'84 Pioneers Have Something To Prove

With most of the members of last year's WVIAC runners-up returning for the 1984 campaign, GSC football promises to be even more exciting than last year.

The Pioneers, ranked fifth in the conference in a pre-season coaches' poll, will be opening their season on September 8 at Waynesburg, Pa., under the leadership of acting head coach Randy Hunt.

Hunt, who is filling in for head coach Frank Vincent, says that the team feels "they have something to prove," after having been dropped three places in the ratings.

Heading the list of returning starters is All-American Byron Brooks. Brooks ran for 944 yards last season, and is GSC's all-time rushing leader with 2,635 career yards.

All-WVIAC returnees are center Larry Loughner, defensive backs Mark Hash and Mike Payne, and second team all-conference nose guard Mike Chadwick.



Harriers' New Boss Optimistic

A new coach and some "exciting" freshmen should give GSC cross-country fans something to cheer about this Fall.

The Pioneers are riding a string of three consecutive WVIAC titles under the reigns of former coach Jim Hilgenberg, and new mentor Butch Hays has set his sights for another crown.

The reason for the new coach's optimism is perhaps the team's combination of youth and experience. Returning from last year's squad are sophmores Dave Antonik from New Martinsville and Shawn Shockey from Parkersburg South. New members Barry Crutchfield and Jesse Skiles should also add a nice punch to the GSC lineup.

The old man of this year's team is Asenso Koufour of Ghana, Africa. Koufour was a Pioneer harrier a few years ago before transferring to Georgia State. He says he is very excited to be back in the blue and white.

Two incoming freshmen whom Coach Hays is very glad to have are Jay Dawkins and Jimmy Collins of Parkersburg South.

Dawkins earned All-State status last year by finishing fifth in the state cross-country meet in a time of 17:26. He also won the 3200 and finished fifth in the 1600 at last spring's state track meet.

"We've got a pretty competitive schedule and it should prepare us well for the conference meet," said Hays, citing State and Fairmont as the Pioneers' most dangerous potential spoilers. "We're young, but we'll come on. We'll be competitive at the end of the year."

Award Guidelines Listed



Referring again to Tom Miller's article, Miller comments, "Simmons found the enticing option of returning to the relative peaceful rural environment of Gilmer County where he is convinced he can be president as long as he wants far more appealing than a run for the permanent job as chancellor." Simmons commented, "I am pleased to back and while away, I rediscovered Glenville."

Glenville is a special place to President Simmons due to the fact

that he was once a student, his farm and family are here, and Glenville has qualities that are not found on other campuses.

To become reacquainted with the students of GSC, Simmons plans to attend football games, which he enjoys due to the enthusiasm of the band, students and team. He also plans to be open with the students and invites them in his office to talk or discuss issues, when he isn't busy. The president also plans to attend the Student Congress meetings when the opportunity arises.

Nevertheless, President Simmons is back to Glenville to fill his role as president. 
neer Cheerleaders won first place in the fight song, and cheer categories, as well as a spirit stick. The squad was also chosen as the best all-around girls squad at the camp.




Dr. John Joldersma has been employed in the Division of Education to instruct the reading courses in early childhood education.






Mr. Bassett

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
