English Exam Date Given

The English Proficiency Examination will be given in Room 312AB, Monday, October 1, 1984, at 6:00 p.m. Students who have completed 58 semester hours, or will have completed this number by the end of the semester, and who have not achieved an over-all average of 2.0 (C) or better in English 101 and 102, should come to the Language Division Office and register to take the test. Anyone who was enrolled at GSC prior to the fall semester 1977 must include his English 202 grade in deciding whether he has achieved the required "C" average. If a student has made a "D" or "F" in English 101 or 102, then rather than take the examination, he may repeat the course(s) one time only to achieve a "C" average or better. Students who are enrolled in certain two-year programs and pre-professional programs do not have to meet requirements that include this test.

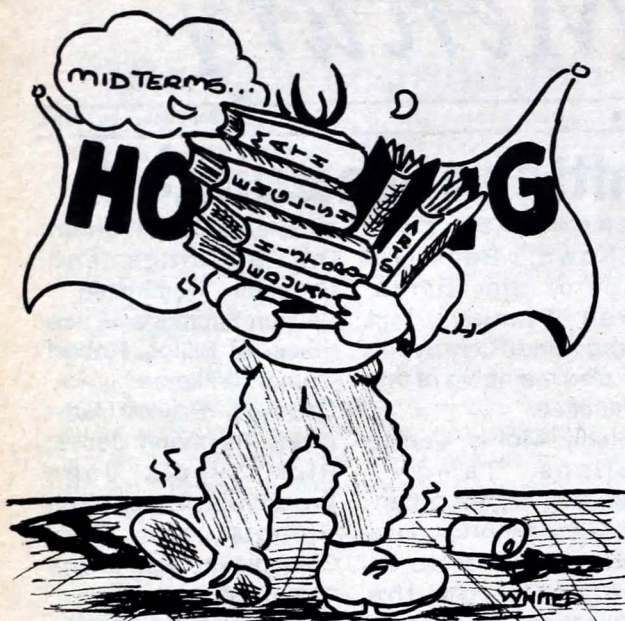

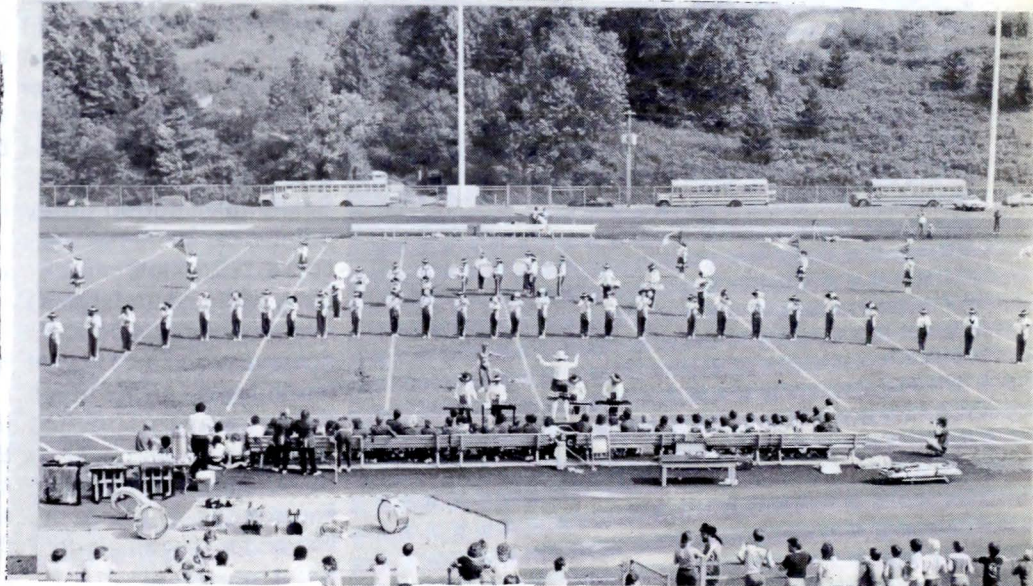

Goes For The Gold

Antonik Leads Harriers

The Glenville State College cross country team, paced by sophomore David Antonik's strong individual showing, finished third in its own invitational meet last Friday. Frostburg (Md.) won the meet with a low team total of 28 points. Morehead (Ky.) had 44, and GSC scored 69 points. West Virginia State College brought up the rear with 109 points.

Antonik, the Pioneers' captain, captured the individual trophy by running the 5.5 mile course in 28:47. His nearest competitor was 34 seconds back.

GSC's second through fifth finishers were Jay Dawkins, Todd Raines, Jimmy Collins, and Jesse Skiles. Dawkins placed ninth in 30:23, Raines was 16th in 31:40, Collins was 21st in 32:58, and Skiles placed 22nd in 33:35. Also, Shawn Shockey

placed 32nd in 35:44 and Barry Crutchfield placed 33rd in 37:00.

An additional team competing in the meet was a GSC alumni team, coached by Dr. Jim Hilgenberg, Jr. The alumni team scored 91 points, unofficially. Billy Belcher finished in 31:23, Pat Godfrey ran 31:36, Joey Herron in 31:40, Steve Keenan in 31:53, and Lee Haddox in 35:09. Also competing were Asenso Kuffuor, Chris Keister, and Lloyd Willis.

Butch Hays, coach of the Pioneer varsity squad, was pleased with his team's performance. He remarked, "We're still improving. This week's meet should show us more, since all of the conference schools should be there."

GSC will participate in the West Virginia State College Invitational on Friday, Sept. 28.

Pioneers Claim Homecoming Win Over WVSC Yellow Jackets, 35-14

Joe Mullan had three touchdowns and the Pioneer defense literally stifled West Virginia State's running game Saturday as GSC blew past the Yellowjackets 35-14 before a large homecoming crowd.

The game was the first of the season for Pioneer head coach Frank Vincent, who had been out of the first two games while recovering from a summer illness. Ken Davis of the **Parkersburg News** quoted the coach as saying: "I feel great. This is the best cure in the world, a big win."

Mullan put Glenville on the scoreboard first with 7:18 left in the first quarter, and Mark Szklennik added the point after to make the score 7-0. State struck back with just under two minutes left in the period, however, with a 21-yard touchdown pass from Rufus Hankerson to Michael Jones. The point after knotted the score at 7-7 where it stayed for the remainder of the first half.

The Pioneers took advantage of a short kickoff to open the second half from State's 38-yard line. Running eight of nine plays on the

ground, GSC scored again on a three yard run by Mullan. Szklennik's extra point ran the score to 14-7.

State tied things up once again as Hankerson, considered to be one of the WVIAC's top quarterbacks, went to the air for a four-play, 74 yard drive which ended with a 36-yard TD pass.

Joe Birk intercepted a Hankerson pass early in the fourth quarter to set up the score that would put the Pioneers ahead for good. Forrest Hall replaced Steve Grosse at quarterback and sparked the offense in a 20-yard, five-play drive which was culminated by yet another Mullan touchdown and Szklennik's third extra point.

The GSC defense totally dominated the rest of the game. Mike Payne intercepted Hankerson on State's next possession to set up a 6-yard TD run by Byron Brooks. The score came at the end of a march of ten plays and the point after made the score 28-14.

State was forced to cough up possession on downs after the kickoff, and the Pioneer offense chewed up yardage and time, capping off their

scoring with a 13-yard run by Ron Kimbrough. Szklennik's fifth PAT made the final score 35-14.

For the game, GSC had 319 yards on the ground, led by Brooks with 135 and Mullan with 56.

Hankerson collected 305 yards in the air, but the Pioneer defense held the Yellowjackets to minus 28 yards rushing in only 18 attempts.

The win boosted Glenville's record to 2-1 overall, 1-1 in conference play. The Pioneers will travel to West Liberty next Saturday.

Golfers Are Third

The GSC golf team shared third place with Indiana University of Pennsylvania's White Team in the Davis & Elkins Fall Invitational.

The Pioneers fired a total of 598 over the two rounds held Friday and Saturday at Canaan Valley.

Scott Carney led the team with a 72-73 -- 145, followed by John Oplinger with a 76-73 -- 149. Other GSC scorers were Jeff Bennett with a 152, Danny Wassick with a 154, and Bill Forrest with a 164.

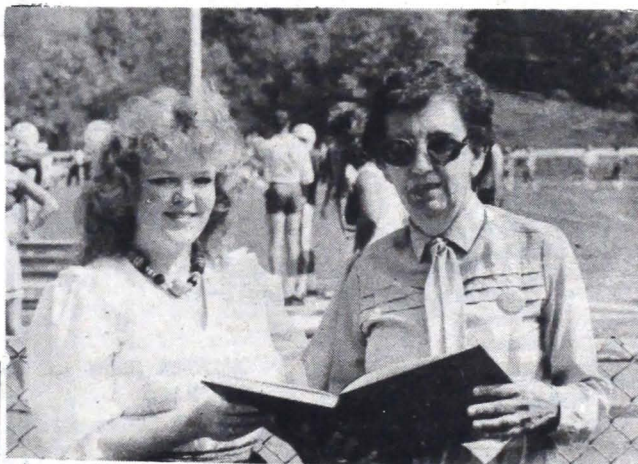

'Kyle Clinic Offers Services

We encourage all students to use our facilities when needed. Each student, freshman and returning student, needs a Health History Report on file at the clinic. If you do not have one, we encourage all students to get it as soon as possible. Information is available from the Kyle Clinic. The health history provides important information which enables us to better care for you.

The clinic office hours are Monday through Friday 9 a.m. - 4:30 p.m. Students will be seen on an appointment basis only. Every effort will be made to see the student on the day that you call. However, overcrowded days may force us to see the student on the following day. Emergencies will be handled at the time of occurrence.

Student fees cover routine medical expenses. Any optional care such as x-rays, blood tests, emergency care and such must be taken care of by you. Medication is the responsibility of the student.

Following are guidelines for you to follow in the event you need medical attention:

1. Call the clinic for an appointment. 462-5708
2. Check in at the medical office window of the Gilmer County Medical Center. Student ID's will be requested at the window. The Center is located one fourth of a mile on Mineral Road. The building is on the left hand side of the road before reaching the Pioneer Stadium.
3. Please come at appointed time to avoid a long waiting period.
4. If you cannot keep your appointment, please call to cancel so another student may be seen in your place.
5. After hour emergencies must be handled by your R.A. and House Director. An R.A. or House Director will contact us for these emergencies. HAVE A GOOD SEMESTER!
