Fine Arts Expansion Underway

According to GSC President William K. Simmons, an architect has been hired to begin designs for a Fine Arts and Music Building on campus. The Board of Regents approved this at the October 2-3 meeting in Charleston.

Hoblitzel and Associates were hired as architects to aid in the design and development of this academic building at Glenville State College.

President Simmons

commented that by December there should be an idea of how the building will appear, what departments it will include, where it will be situated, and an estimation of building costs. The president also stated that once the building is completed it will help to accommodate the Fine Arts and Music Department and ultimately allow for the move of additional administrative personnel into the Administra-

tion Building.

The building should be completed approximately within three to five years, if plans proceed accordingly. "It takes this much time for any capital project," Simmons commented. "I feel this building will be a wonderful asset to our campus, the need for this building has been recognized, and it is something I have been interested in during my eight years as president."

Nicholson Will Serve WV Speech Association

Barbara Nicholson, Instructor of Speech, has been named the 1984-1985 President of the WV Speech Communication Association at the fall meeting at North Bend State Park. 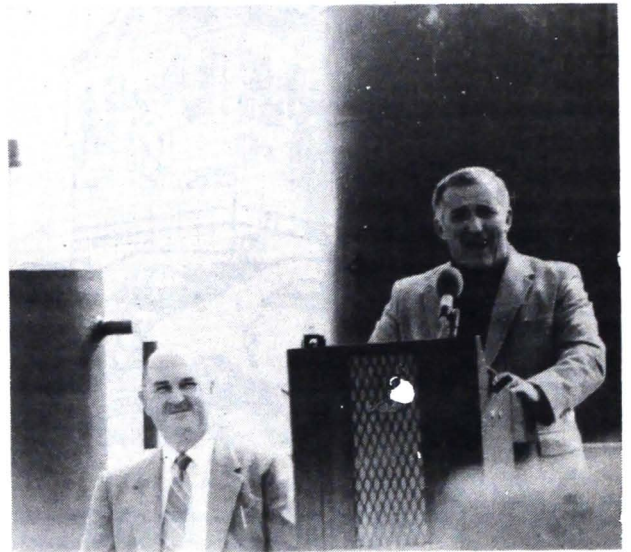

WVU Law Reps. Slate Local Visit

Representatives of the West Virginia University College of Law will be on the Glenville State College campus on Monday, October 29, 1:30-3:30 p.m. to meet with students interested in attending law school upon graduation from GSC. Students will have an opportunity to talk with representatives of the law school at an open meeting to be held in the Verona Maple Room, Pioneer Center.

The WVU College of Law was founded in 1878 and is nationally accredited by the American Bar Association of American Law Schools. The faculty are young and energetic providing diversity in expertise which allows the college to offer a student a variety of educational opportunities. The law school is gaining national recognition for its work in the area of energy law and labor law as it relates to the energy field. The

New Gas Well Is Dedicated

On October 10, 1984, Glenville State College dedicated its Gas Well Number 1. The dedication ceremonies began at the well site with remarks by GSC President William K. Simmons followed by remarks from Board of Regents President John Saunders, Chancellor Leon Ginsberg, and I.L. Morris, owner and operator of Waco Oil and Gas Co. Inc. Following the remarks, President Saunders "cut the ribbon" and Rick Zickefoose, geologist for Waco Oil and Gas Co. Inc., "blew the well." Later that evening at a banquet, President Simmons introduced several dignitaries, some of these including Delegate Robert Kidd, Delegate Bob Se

geant, Senator Larry Tucker, Senator Oshel Craig, former delegate Billy Burke, former speaker Lewis McManus, President John Saunders, Chancellor Leon Ginsberg, Board of Regents staff and members of the GSC Board of Advisors. Following the introduction of guests, Dr. Saunders presented Harry Heflin, former President of GSC, with an award from Governor Rockefeller proclaiming him to be a Distinguished citizen of West Virginia. It was also announced that President Simmons received this award. To conclude the day's activities, a 10-minute video showing the drilling of the well was presented.

GSC Parking Has "Lots" Of Problems

What you are reading is a rewrite of an article I had prepared on the problem of parking (or lack of) on campus. What I originally wrote chastised the administration for lack of organization, planning, etc. However, after looking into the situation further, I found the real cause of the problem — money (or lack of).

Also in my first draft were what I thought would be simple, easy solutions that would not involve paving more lots (which costs money), such as limiting the number of parking permits that were sold. However, even though there is a count of spaces available, there is constant shifting of traffic from lot to lot which cannot be controlled.

Another solution I came up with would be to prohibit freshmen from bringing cars on campus, or limiting it in some way. According to administrative sources, this is not the answer either.

If Glenville State College would advertise that freshmen are not allowed to bring automobiles on campus, it is likely that prospective students would look elsewhere, perhaps Fairmont or WVU for their education — schools that do not discriminate against freshmen. Said Dean Alfred T. Billips, "It wouldn't be fair to make second class citizens of lower class students." It would also not be fair, nor possible, to limit only those freshmen that live in the dorms — we cannot forget the freshmen commuters.

There are plans, however, to free the campus from "dead storage" — those automobiles that do not move from Sunday night to Friday afternoon. (These cars are owned by dorm residents who travel only on weekends.) What is being proposed is paving lots at the Pioneer Stadium for dorm residents to park their cars during the week, perhaps free of charge. This would open up the lots in front of the Administration Building and beside Pickens Hall. This would solve 99% of the parking problem alone. (The 1% would remain by those who would refuse to park that far away!)

The only permanent solution would be to pave more lots. But again, we must realize that money is not available for such construction. The lots that will be open behind the library will help tremendously. (Dean Billips has estimated the work to be completed before Thanksgiving.) Another remedy would be to encourage commuters to car pool as much as possible.

The problem is one almost all colleges and universities must face. The solutions they choose must suit the individual institution. Glenville suffers being a small college in a small town in a financially weak state. "The administration" is aware of the problem but is limited in what it can do to alleviate the situation.

My advice — leave early, be patient, curse quietly.

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Pioneers Downed By Salem 7-3

The GSC football team hosted West Virginia conference leader Salem College Saturday night and very nearly came away with an upset win.

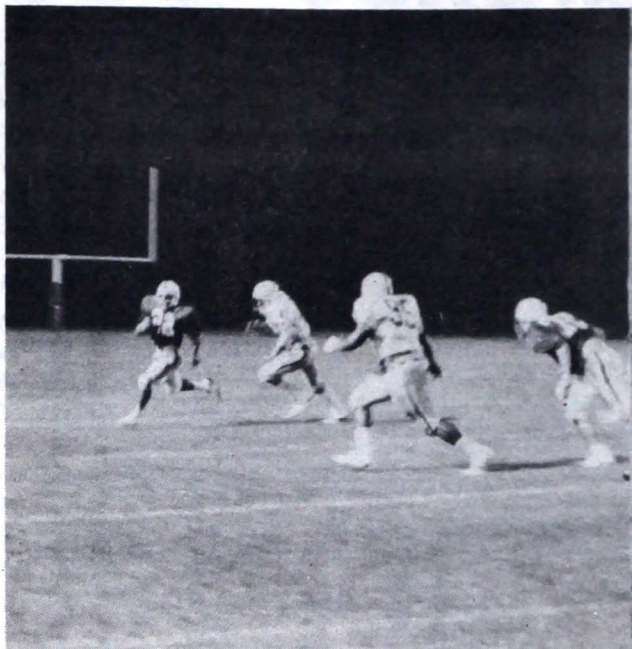
A field goal by Mark Szklennik in the first quarter put the Pioneers on top for most of the game. The 3-0 lead held until the last minute of the game, when Salem's Rodney Pitts scored on a six-yard run.

Salem's defense held the GSC ground attack to only 76 yards, while the Pioneers gathered 123 yards in the air. Byron Brooks ran for 49 yards in 28 attempts. Forrest Hall completed eight of 14 passes for 83 yards, all in the first half. Alan Fiddler completed the game, going three for seven for 40 yards.

Overall, Salem collected 247 yards to GSC's 199.

With 1:02 remaining on the clock, Salem scored the winning touchdown on Pitt's run. The score capped off a drive of 81 yards on nine plays during the 2½ minute span.

The loss dropped the Pioneers' overall record to 3-2 and 2-2 in conference play. GSC will travel to Buckhannon to battle with West Virginia Wesleyan next Saturday.

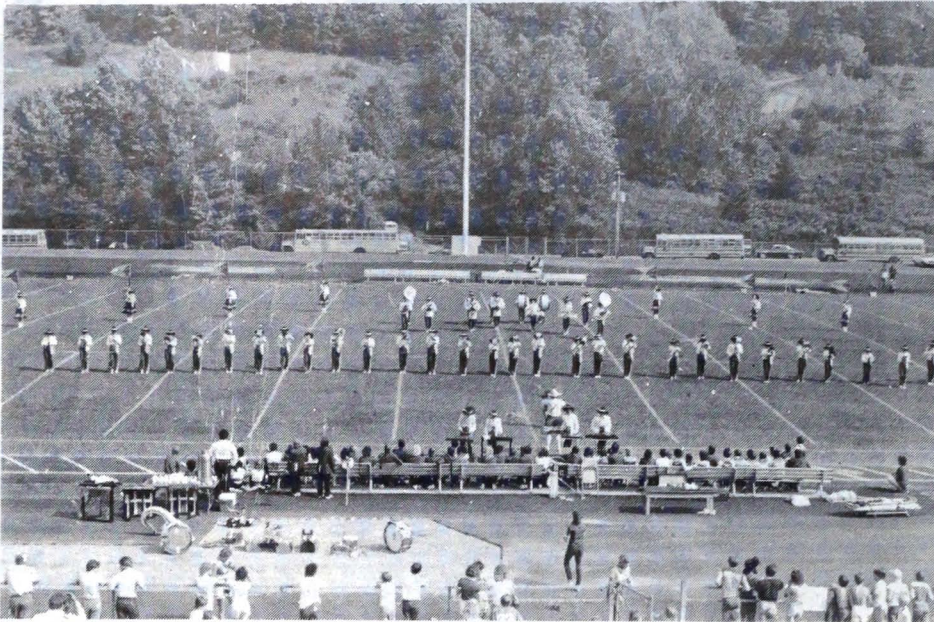
The Pioneers' season opener will be at home against West Virginia State College on November 27.

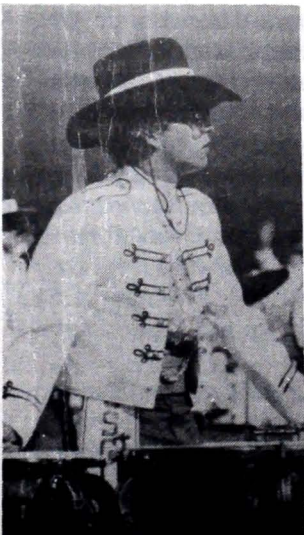

Theatre Dept. Plans N Y Trip

New York City will be the setting for an unusual off-campus program in theater being planned by Mrs. Linda McKown of the Theater Department for Jan. 3 to Jan. 8.

Known as a New York Theater Visit, the low-cost program is open to all students and faculty. Participants will view plays and musicals, half of them on Broadway, the other half in off-Broadway theaters, training ground for future Broadway actors, writers, and directors.

The students will attend an opening seminar with a nationally-known theater critic, and talk with cast members after performances about the plays and their production.

The cost of the New York program is being held to a minimum, according to Mrs. McKown, through group discounts at theater box offices and hotels. The group must have twelve students to qualify for the reduced rates. A group of 20 or more will receive additional discounts.

At the close of about

half the plays, the student visitors will meet one or more members of the production for informal discussion and questions about the plays and their production.

The group will be able to choose from among a number of daytime guided tours. These include backstage at the Metropolitan Opera House, Radio City Music Hall, and the New York Shakespeare Festival's Public Theater, founded by Joseph Papp. The group may also tour a theatrical costume house and collections centered on famous theater people and plays.

Arrangements for the New York outing are being made with the assistance of Campus/New York, a New York firm which provides low-cost, off-campus programs in the arts and business. During its trip the group will stay at the Century Paramount, a well-managed 600-room tourist hotel in the theater district. The hotel is within walking distance of all Broadway theaters and a few

blocks from subways and buses to off-Broadway theaters.

Students in all academic fields are invited to join the group. They will be free to pursue their own daytime interests and attend theater at night.

There will be a meeting of interested persons in the auditorium in order to get a list of those committed to making the trip. Please check with Mrs. McKown in the Language Division for date and time.

Mr. Fred Smith, a representative from the West Virginia School of Osteopathic Medicine will be on campus Oct. 30 for the purpose of answering questions concerning the school.

The representative will be in the Verona Mapel Room from 10:00 a.m. until 1:30 p.m. Students interested in talking with Mr. Smith during this time period should contact Dr. Mary Jo Pribble in the Science Hall for an appointment.

Former Professor Dies in Marietta

Former Glenville State College Professor, Dr. Ronald E. Good, 71, died Friday morning in Marietta Memorial Hospital. Dr. Good was a Professor of Education at GSC from 1968 to 1978. During his years at Glenville he served as supervisor of student teachers. Surviving are his wife, Ruth Greenlees, whom he married in 1944, two sons; and a grandson.

Services were conducted Monday at McClure-Schafer Funeral Home in Marietta, Ohio.

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
