### Dawkins Takes 10th Place. Harriers Sixth in WVIAC

The GSC crosscountry team wound up its season with a sixthplace finish in the West Virginia Conference championship meet.

Jay Dawkins was the top Pioneer finisher, coming in 10th place on the 5-mile course in a time of 30:03. Todd Raines was next, finishing 16th in 31:00. Jimmy Collins crossed the line at 29th, Shawn Shockey was 40th, and newcomer Walt Smith finished 41st.

The meet was won by Fairmont, a team which the Pioneers upset the last three years in a row in the conference meet. The Falcons will travel to Kenosha, Wisconsin, for the NAIA national meet on November 17.

"We were plagued by the three I's this year,' commented head coach Butch Hays, "illness, injury, and inexperience. "If we'd have had everyone healthy, we probably could have placed higher."

Fairmont scored only 30 points in winning the meet, followed by Davis and Elkins with 70, West Virginia State with 87, West Liberty with 88, WV Tech with 90, GSC with 138, and the Univ. of Charleston with 190.

West Liberty edged Tech 27-28 in the threemile women's invitational.

## Pioneers Fall to Concord 16-0

The GSC football squad dropped their third game of the season Saturday as Concord clinched at least a tie for the West Virginia Conference championship by shutting the Pioneers out 16-0.

All of the scoring took place in the first half. In the first quarter. Concord quarterback Mark Ryhanych connected with Frank Baker pass.

In the second quarter, Glenville quarterback Forrest Hall was sacked in the end zone for a safety. Ryhanych then threw another touchdown pass, this time to John Pate from eight yards out. The point after concluded the game's scoring.

The Pioneers were for a 37-yard touchdown held to just 65 yards total offense, while the defense gave up 268 yards. The loss dropped the Pioneers to 4-3 in the conference and 5-3 overall. Their last game will be at 1:30 next Saturday when they will host WV Tech. Tech is 2-4-1 in the conference and 3-4-1 overall after battling to a tie with WV State Saturday.

Glenville State's volleyball squad brought its season to a close last Friday in the West Virginia Conference championship tournament held at Concord College.



#### **Book Reviewed** Reagan

"Star to Guide Us" (Presidential Publishers, Wheeling, Illinois, 1982) written by Calhoun County native Don McGlothlin is a book which reflects upon the challenges which President Ronald Reagan has faced and overcome since his election to office in 1980. McGlothlin states that the book "attempts to picture the various stages of Ronald Reagan's development through an account of his life accompanied by a brief view of the American scene that went hand in hand with each stage." The book follows Reagan's life from his birth on February 6, 1911, in Tampico, Illinois, to his present status as the country's leader. James Kelly wrote in the March 29, 1982. issue of Time: "Only a proven anti-Communist like Richard Nixon could have opened the door to Mainland China in the early 1970s without causing divisive national debate. Similarly, the argument goes, only a President as strong on national defense as Reagan could bargain with the Kremlin on nuclear arms in the early 1980s. That, indeed, may be the idea whose time has come." The book can be summed up by this statement.

McGlothlin recently returned to the Mountain State as a guest lecturer at the Black Walnut Festival in Spencer, and he also visited the GSC campus where he attended in 1934.

There is still time! For any citizen of Gilmer County who wishes to participate in the blood screening program set for Saturday, November 10, there is still time to register. Registration will be accepted by the Gilmer County Health Department until closing time on Friday at 3:30 p.m. Call 462-7351 and ask for an appointment in one of the following time periods: 8:30 - 9:30, 9:30 - 10:30, 10:30 - 11:30 a.m. The site of the blood screening program is the Gilmer County Health Center, located on Mineral Road in Glenville.

Sponsored by the Gilmer County Health Department, Glenville Women's Club, and Glenville Rotary Club, the blood screening program is being conducted as a means of providing 34 separate blood analysis at a low cost to the individual. Fee for the blood analysis is \$13.00, payable at the time of the test.

Laboratory work for the blood screening program will be performed by Roche Biomedical Laboratories in Fairmont. Each person who participates in the blood screening program will receive one copy of the report and one copy will be sent to a doctor of the individual's choice. For any individual who does not have a doctor to receive the report, Dr. James M. Kyle, Gilmer County Health Officer, will provide an interpretation of the various elements of the blood analysis.

According to Dr. Kyle, the blood test is described as a fasting test, and anyone planning to have his blood tested should eat no breakfast on Saturday morning, nor should he eat anything after midnight Friday. Coffee, tea, orange juice, cookies and doughnuts will be provided for all participants after they have been tested.
