Dodge Sponsors Contest

The Dodge division of Chrysler Corporation is sponsoring a nationwide marketing competition offering full-time graduate students an opportunity to share \$10,000 in scholarships for promoting the 1985 Dodge Daytona.

"The Dodge National Collegiate Marketing Competition is designed to further higher education by bringing the classroom closer to the real world of marketing," said John Damoose, General Marketing Manager-Dodge.

The competition is open to full-time graduate students in participating accredited college or university graduate schools in the United States......The students need not be students of marketing.

From these evaluations and reports, a panel of America's top advertising and marketing professionals will choose the winning promotions.

Every member of the 20 finalist teams will receive a Certificate of Merit from Dodge Marketing.

Ladies Go 1-1 In Tourney

The Lady Pioneers opened their season last weekend in the Pitt-Johnstown Invitational Tournament, and came away with a 1-1 record to start the year.

In Friday night's firstround action, the Ladies fell to Allegheny College of Pennsylvania 85-79 in overtime.

Allegheny outscored GSC 41-23 in the second half to counter the Lady Pioneers' 50-32 halftime lead. A missed GSC free throw in the closing moments of regulation time sent the game into overtime with the score tied at 73.

In the overtime period, Kimi Ignace scored six of her team's 12 points to provide Allegheny's winning margin. Glenville co-captains Maria Lothes and Kim Maynard were sidelined during overtime as both fouled out during regulation.

Tina Burkhamer scored 18 points to pace the Ladies, followed by Janice Hensley with 16, Lothes with 15, and Maynard with 10. Rounding out the scoring, Cathy Starcher and Rhonda Hicks each had nine points, while Kathy Knapp hit one field goal for two points.

For the game, GSC was 31 of 53 from the floor for a 58% shooting average, while hauling in 34 rebounds. Allegheny shot 45% from the floor and had 57 rebounds.

In Saturday night's consolation game, the Lady Pioneers evened their record at 1-1 by defeating St. Francis (PA) 72-58.

Maria Lothes was nine of 14 from the floor and nine of 11 from the line in pouring in 27 points to lead the Ladies. Lothes also grabbed 10 rebounds and earned a spot on the alltournament team with a total of 42 points in the two nights of action.

Tina Burkhamer added 23 points to help the GSC cause, while gathering eight rebounds and two assists. Kim Maynard scored eight points, Janice Hensley and Rhonda rlicks each had six, and Cathy Starcher sank two free throws for two points to round out the scoring.

Head Coach Tim Carney commented that he felt good about his team's first two games. "We rebounded and shot our free throws real well in the second game," Carney said. "When our inexperienced veterans - our juniors and seniors who haven't seen much playing time until now get some experience, we'll get better." The Pioneers dropped their first two games of the season, but bounced back in their third contest to go 1-2 in the first week of the 1984-85 campaign.

In the season opener against West Virginia State, GSC outscored its opponent 47-35 in the second half, but it wasn't enough as State pulled off a 75-74 victory.

Richard Moore, who missed a last-second desperation shot in heavy traffic in an attempt to win the game, led the Pioneers with 19 points. Steve Linville, Rudy Watts and Kenneth Taylor each added 13 points, while Matthew Bullett had nine, Ken Prettyman had four and Steve Morris had three.

Taylor led the team in rebounds, hauling in 13, while Linville and Watts pulled in 10 apiece.

Glenville was 25 of 61 from the floor for 41% and 24 of 40 from the line for 60% for the game.

In the preliminary round of the Battler Tournament at Alderson-Broaddus College, all five GSC starters scored in double figures, but the Pioneers fell to undefeated Rio Grande (Ohio) 84-80.

Richard Moore tallied 23 points to again lead all Glenville scorers, while Steve Linville added 15, Rudy Watts 13, Matthew Bullet 12, and Kenneth Taylor 11. Steve Morris scored six points to round out the Pioneer scoring attack.

Linville and Watts each grabbed nine rebounds, while Moore and Morris had four steals apiece.

Rio Grande led 43-36 at the half, but GSC came back midway through the second period. Behind 55-44, Linville scored 13 of the next 15 Pioneer points, and later a basket by Moore put Glenville on top 74-73. The Redmen retaliated, however, and finished the game with eight free throws in the closing minutes to nail down the win.

For the game, the Pioneers shot 34 of 51 for 59% from the floor and 12 of 14 for 86% from the free throw line.

In Saturday night's consolation game, the Pioneers finally got into the win column with a 66-54 victory over Alderson-Broaddus.

After holding a onepoint, 30-29 lead at the half, GSC went on a 12point scoring binge while keeping its opponent from hitting a single shot between the 18:00 and 13:00 marks in the second half. A-B then pulled within five, but good Glenville foul shooting sealed the win.

Rudy Watts led the Pioneers with 25 points, followed by Steve Linville with 13, Matthew Bullett with 12, and Rich Moore with 10. John Harris' four points and Steve Morris' two finished up the scoring. Linville also had 12 rebounds to his credit.

Head Coach Gary Nottingham stated he was fairly pleased with his team's effort for the week, noting that his starters are all scoring in double figures. In addition, his front line players are averaging eight to nine rebounds per game. The coach also noted that the teams which have beaten his squad have yet to lose a game.

"We played real good basketball against Rio Grande, and they're one of the toughest teams in the country," Nottingham commented. "It's a real credit to this team that they could get ready for a consolation game (vs. A-B). We needed that win, and they went out and got it. We're playing well as a team, and that's what we have to do...we're not going to win on individual talent with our schedule."

The display represents various techniques of watercolor painting and will be shown from Dec. 4-14.





III-Advised Diet Plan Hazardous to Health

With Christmas just around the corner, many people seem to be on diets to get themselves in shape for the holidays. Diets can be successful if properly supervised. Occasionally, a dieter will tend to use a fad diet to shed those extra pounds, which can lead to more serious problems. One of which is Anorexia Nervosa.

Anorexia Nervosa is a psychosymatic disorder typified by self starvation. It reaches 1% of the female population and 10% of all college women across the nation are at a risk. The word anorexia is the medical term for loss of appetite and the word nervosa implies a psychological problem. Anorexa is ten times more frequent in females than males and occurs in the adolescent population and age groups in the twenties and thirties.

There is no single cause of the disease and each' victim of this disorder experiences it for different reasons. The main reasons are usually leaving home, either for college or getting married, mental depression, peer and social pressure and drug usage. The effects are usually a stop in menstruation, yellowy, scaly skin, self starvation, life threatening exhaustion, bulimia (gorging then vomiting), insomnia, perfectionism, physically over active, denial feeling and low body temperature.

The treatment of anorexia nervosa is very difficult. Once the physical symptoms are in control, the psychological treatment is a battle hard to defeat. The best treatment though is early identification of the disorder. Anorexia nervosa is a disease which can occur in any of our friends, our family or even ourself. If you know or suspect anyone of having anorexia nervosa, you should urge them immediately to seek professional help. The most important thing is to remember to like yourself just as you are!

Stalnaker's Speech Presented in Contest

Through forensics, Tammy Stalnaker has brought notoriety to Glenville State College. Miss Stalnaker represented GSC in Lincoln, Nebraska, at the Interstate Oratorical Contest.

The first U.S. oratory intercollegiate contest was held in 1874. At this competition, the Interstate Oratorical Association was established. Like other organizations, structural changes have occurred through the years. Today there is a single division with each state to be represented by the top two orators selected at various state contests. This association has great influence on public speaking throughout the nation.
