
Phi Beta Lambda will also receive an additional page in the yearbook for successfully sponsoring Ms. Parsons.

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Pioneers Drop Two, Fall To 1-4

The Pioneers dropped to 1-4 on the season last week with a 76-70 loss to West Virginia Tech and a 73-68 defeat by Salem. Tuesday night's contest against Tech saw GSC trailing 42-38 at the half. Glenville shot 62% from the floor in the first half, but hit only one of five free throws for 20%.

In the second half, the Pioneers hit 55% of their foul shots, but fell to just 32% from the floor. For the game, Tech outgunned GSC 47% to 45% in field goals, and 56% to 43% from the line.

Kenneth Taylor pumped in 21 points to lead the Pioneers, followed by Rich Moore with 15 and Steve Linville with 12. Matt Bullet added nine points, Rudy Watts had eight, and Steve Morris scored five to finish the scoring. Taylor also had

14 rebounds to his credit while Linville had 12.

Saturday night, the Pioneers travelled to Salem, and came away 1-4 and 0-3 in West Virginia Conference action.


Glenville held a two-point, 30-28, lead at halftime, but the Tigers hit on 60% of their field goals and 73% of their free throw attempts to outscore Glenville 45-38 in the second half in establishing their 73-68 margin of victory.

Both teams finished the game hitting 50% from the floor, while GSC went seven of eight for 87% at the line and Salem was 14 of 18 for 77%.

Rudy Watts had 23 points to lead the Pioneers, while Steve Linville had 14 and Rich

Moore had 13. Steve Morris hit two three-point field goals and one two-point shot for eight points, Matt Bullet had six, and Kenneth Taylor had four to round out the scoring.

The Pioneers face tough opposition this week in the forms of 12-0 Rio Grande (Ohio) and 6-0 West Virginia Wesleyan. Rio Grande is ranked in the top 20 nationally, while Wesleyan is currently leading the WVC and is in the country's top 10. Head coach Gary Nottingham feels that a win in one of these two games could be the key to his team's turning its season around. The coach commented that, "We still have the capacity to have a good year if we beat Rio Grande or Wesleyan."

Ladies 4-2 On Season

The Lady Pioneers continued their winning ways last week and upped their record to 4-2 with wins over West Virginia Wesleyan, WV Tech, and Garrett Community College (Maryland) before losing to Potomac State in the championship game of that school's invitational tournament last weekend.

The ladies got off to a slow start Thursday night against Tech, shooting only 22% from the floor to Tech's 41% and trailing 33-19 at halftime. Glenville turned things around in the second half, though, outscoring the Lady Golden Bears 39-20 to build the winning margin of 58-53.

Janice Hensley had 21

points to lead all Lady Pioneer scorers, followed by Maria Lothes with 14 and Tina Burkhamer with 11. Other scorers were Kim Maynard with six, Marsha Shrader with four, and Cathy Starcher with two points.

For the game, GSC hit 21 of 65 field goals for 32% while Tech matched that percentage, going 24 of 75 from the floor. Glenville nailed 16 out of 22 free throws for 72%.

Details of the Wesleyan, Garrett, and Potomac State games were not available at press time. The ladies hosted Salem Monday night and will meet Alderson-Broaddus Thursday in a 7:00 home contest.

Payne Defensive Player Of The Year

Mike Payne, Glenville State College junior defensive back, was named West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference Defensive Player of the Year last week.

Payne led the WVIAC in both punt and kickoff returns this season and was a unanimous all-conference choice. He ran back a total of 11



kickoffs for 284 yards, an average of 25.8 yards per return, while returning 11 punts for 88 years. Payne also had 70 tackles and 7 interceptions for 42 yards on the year.

Pioneer head football coach Frank Vincent said of Payne, "In my opinion, Mike is the best athlete in the West Virginia Conference, and any All-American team without him wouldn't be an All-American team." The coach went on to note that this could be the first time that the school has had back-to-back years of All-American selections (GSC running back Byron Brooks was selected in 1983).

"Mike," Vincent continued, "is dedicated, strong, and an extremely cooperative young man. He's one of the hardest working football players I've ever coached."

The coach then pointed out that he has made the proper contacts in the National Football League and the United States Football League so that Mike, Byron, and some of our other players can have a chance to play professional football." Vincent concluded by saying, "This (selection) is a compliment not only to Mike Payne, but to the football staff, Glenville State College, and the entire college community."

Besides Payne, six other Pioneers earned all-conference status. Named to the offensive squad were Byron Brooks and Ron Gutshall, while Payne, Rocky Metheny, and Mike Chadwick copped defensive honors. Dave Darst was named to the second team, and Rodney Abrams earned honorable mention.


If a team forfeits a game, then it will forfeit its \$5, and an additional \$5 must be paid before

The project began on December 10 with expected completion within 90 days. The contractors will be using a rubber membrane roofing surface which can be used in extremely cold weather. The reroofing project includes seven smaller roofs over the auditorium practice rooms, corridors and entries

New Building Plans Underway

Two architecturalplanning firms have been hired by Glenville State College to begin preliminary studies on the proposed new multipurpose/fine arts facility.

Hoblitzell, Daley & McIntyre of Charleston with H2L2 of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, have met with college officials and have reviewed possible building sites and building requirements.

The firms have been hired to prepare preliminary facility renderings, cost estimates and site selection recommendations by January. The architects' preliminary design and cost estimates will be sent to the Board of Regents for approval and inclusion in a bonding package to be submitted to the legislature during the 1985 session.

"We are optimistic that, providing the regents submit a substantial package, our request will be approved this session," said Robert K. Gainer, vicepresident for administration. "If however, the package is less than we expect it to be, the request could possibly be delayed another year."

The proposed \$6.5 million facility will house the fine arts and business academic programs along with the media center. The present plans call for the building to have 56,000 total square feet with 36,000 square feet of net assignable space.


"What we have asked in terms of space desired and building contents may be

changed if the cost is prohibitive," said Gainer. "What is presently being planned by the architects is the ideal building that we would like, but that may have to be pared-down somewhat."

The architects have also met with prospective occupants of the new facility to learn firsthand of the necessary specialized contents. Ideally, the facility would contain specific rooms for sculpture, ceramics, printmaking, photography laboratories, art studios, acoustical rehearsal rooms for choral and instrumental, electronic piano labs, a recording studio, listening and instrument repair studios, individual practice studios, a theatre, and business education laboratories along with general purpose instructional classrooms and faculty offices.

The Mineral Road property owned by the College is not among the possible building site considerations because of a lack of transportation available for students to that location.

"The architects have carefully examined property adjacent to the main campus," Gainer explained, referring to High Street, Linn Street, Court Street and College Street all as possible locations
