\$4 Million Appropriated For Fine Arts Facility

A \$4 million fine arts facility for Glenville State College is included in the Board of Regents 1985-86 capital projects bonding request that will be presented to the legislature, college officials have announced.

Previously, Glenville State had been given authority to plan a \$6.5 million facility which would include business education, media center services as well as fine arts.

"We are very pleased to be included in the Regents new projects request," said President William K. Simmons. "Glenville has been in need of a fine arts facility for several years. This will assist in our recruiting efforts in the areas of art, music, and drama."

Hoblitzell, Daley & McIntyre of Charleston and H2L2 of Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, are the engineering/architectural planners for the facility. The two firms have made several campus visits, the most recent being January 11, to meet with college officials and prospective building occupants.

À decision regarding the building site and facility rendering is expected in February. Several campus locations are presently under consideration.

Simmons warned that the funding of the fine arts project yet remains to be approved by the legislature.

"The \$73 million bonding proposal the Regents will submit to the legislature must be approved by the legislature before the Regents will have the authority to sell the bonds," said Simmons. "There is conceivably a chance that our facility will not be approved by the legislature, but I am optimistic that approval will come. We have worked very hard on this project."

come. We have worked very hard on this project." The Regents also approved a second \$200,000 natural gas well for Glenville State. The well will be cash funded by on-hand Regents revenue after the new fiscal 1985-86 year begins. A site location along with other specifications has not been determined.

"Getting the necessary paperwork in order for this well will be easier than for the first well," said Simmons. "Things should move along at a quicker pace. We do not anticipate drilling to begin before next summer."

Nevertheless, the temperature or the wind chill factors do not seem to influence the authorities at GSC to cancel classes. Gilmer County Schools cancelled school most of last week, as well as many of the other county school systems in West Virginia. Many state colleges even cancelled classes due to the extreme temperatures. Parkersburg Community College, a branch of GSC, even cancelled classes. Yet GSC has never cancelled classes due to extreme weather or temperatures in the three years I have been a student.

I feel that the Administration should consider the fact that when the temperature is below 0 degrees and the wind chill factor is even lower, it is extremely hard for students as well as faculty members to make it to campus. Granted, the majority of students live on campus and are not very far from their classes, but the cold weather can cause colds, influenza, and in some cases pneumonia. Also, the commuters and off-campus students have to travel on hazardous roads to attend classes.

I guess for now many students will miss classes because of the weather and many will bundle up and journey out into the cold subjecting themselves to illnesses. Come on GSC - have some sympathy for us on those cold days.

Pioneers Come Back For Victory, Prepare For Big Home Stand

The Pioneers worked their way back into the win column last Thursday with a 76-71 victory over the Senators of Davis and Elkins College. The game marked the first win for GSC since their January 2 victory over Point Park.

Glenville held a slim 32-31 lead at halftime, but fell behind 60-56 in the second half. They battled back, however, to post their fourth victory of the sea-son. Head coach Gary Nottingham was especially pleased with his team's coming from behind for the win. "We were down again," commented the coach, "and we found a way to come back and -that's what we need to do if we want to turn our season around."

Nottingham cited poor defense as the main reason for the Pioneers' losing record so far. According to the coach, GSC is currently leading the West Virginia Conference and is eleventh in the nation in field goal percentage. They are sec-ond in WVC rebounding, fifth in assists, and fourth in free throw percentage, yet they are next to last in the conference standings with a 1-7 WVC record.

Against D&E, Rudy Watts led the Pioneers in scoring with 18 points, followed by Rich Moore and Matthew Bullett with 16 each. Kenneth Taylor pumped in 11 points, Steve Linville had eight, Steve Morris five, and Ken Prettyman scored two points to round out the GSC scoring attack. Glen-ville hit 30 of 56 shots from the floor for a field goal percentage of 53.5 while go-ing 15 of 25 for 60% from the free throw line. The squad will meet the

Fairmont State College Falcons tonight to lead off a, four game home stand which Nottingham hopes will turn his team's season around. At press time, Fairmont had posted a 6-3 conference and 9-5 overall record, having won five of their last six games. Satur-day night will see the Pioneers playing host to Shepherd College while Waynes-burg (Pa.) College comes to Glenville January 28 and the rematch with D&E will be January 30 in the GSC gymnasium.
