LADIES UP MARK TO 9-3

The Lady Pioneers im-proved their mark to 9-3 on the season by winning two

of three key conference match-ups last week. The GSC gymnasium was the site of the Ladies' only loss of the week where they fell to Wheeling College by a score of 74-64 last Tuesday night. The two teams went into the game locked in a tie for second place in the West Virginia Conference standings.

Despite the final score, several GSC players turned in good performances. Kim Maynard paced the Ladies with 17 points and 12 rebounds. Tina Burkhamer also netted 17 points, while Janice Hensley scored 14 and pulled in a team high 16 caroms. Rhonda Hicks was also in double figures with 12 points, and Cathy Starcher provided a defen-sive spark with 5 steals. Thursday night's home

clash with Fairmont State College saw the Lady Pio-neers climbing back into the win column as they defeated the Lady Falcons 68-58 in the two teams' first meeting of the year.

Tina Burkhamer was once again the top GSC scorer as she burned the nets for 24 points. Janice Hensley tallied 19 points and as many rebounds, as she continued to play very well for the Ladies. Head coach Tim Carney was also pleased with the play of senior co-captain Kim Maynard, who scored 17 against

Fairmont. Coach Carney took his show on the road Saturday night as the squad travelled across the state to battle Shepherd College. The coach commented that that he was "pretty concerned" going into the game, but his team put his fears to rest as the Ladies came away

with a 75-69 victory.

Janice Hensley headed the list of four GSC scorers in double figures by pumping in 22 points. Following Hensley closely with 21 markers was Maria Lothes who hit five of six free throws in the final two minutes of the game to seal the win. Tina Burk-hamer had 19 points and Kim Maynard had 11 in the win. Cathy Starcher was the only other Lady Pioneer to score as she added two points to the team's total. Glenville had 38 rebounds to Shepherd's 34, led by Lothes with 12 and Hensley with 10. Maynard also handed out five assists.

The Ladies took their 7-2 conference record to Alderson-Broaddus Monday evening and will take on West Virginia State tonight in a 5:30 p.m. home contest.

Fitness Class Offered

An Adult Fitness Program will be offered at the Health and Physical Education Building on the Glenville State College Campus. The class will begin Feb. 12, and will be held every Tuesday and Thursday night from 7:00 to 8:00. The emphasis of the program will be on improving an individual's overall physical fitness level through stretching, mild strength training, and aerobics. The program will be individualized with each person exercising at his/her own pace and is designed so that adults from 25 to 70 may participate

without fear of health risks. Heart rates and blood pressures will be taken periodi-cally during each fitness session. Equipment and facilities which will be used in the program include exercise bicycles, rowing machines, light dumbells, exercise mats, walkways, swimming pool, and heart rate and blood pressure monitoring equipment. The Pioneers built an impressive three-game winning streak last week by winning their first two games of a four-game home stand. Last Wednesday

saw fourth-place Fairmont State bringing a six-game winning streak into Glenville, only to have it ruined by a 74-67 Pioneer victory.

Glenville controlled the entire first half of the game, and held a 35-26 lead at halftime. Fairmont battled back in the second period. however, and cut the GSC lead to only two points at 66-64 with just two minutes remaining to play. Elvin Addison hit two three-point goals in the stretch for Fairmont, as both teams fought for the lead in the closing minutes. A missed Fairmont free throw gave Glenville a 68-65 lead with 39 seconds on the clock, but the Falcons had drawn to within one when Richard Moore converted both ends of a one-and-one situation at the foul line to build the Pioneer lead to 70-67. Moore hit two more free throws to put the game almost out of reach, and Matthew Bullett's dunk at the buzzer provided the final margain of victory.

For the game, Rudy Watts hit 10 of 13 shots from the floor and a perfect six-for-six at the line to lead the Pioneers with 26 points. Following Watts were Steve Morris with 17 and Rich Moore with 15. Glenville had its lowest shooting percentage of the season, hitting on 22 of 45 attempts for 48%.

Shepherd College was the next on the list for the Pioneers, and the Rams lost their 13th game of the season as GSC posted an 85-81 win in Saturday night's contest.

Five Pioneers hit double figures in the game, led by Rich Moore with 21 points. Matthew Bullett had one of his best games of the season in scoring 17 points, fol-lowed by Steve Morris and Rudy Watts with 15 each and Steve Linville with 10.

Watts also led the GSC board work, hauling in 14 rebounds while Linville grabbed 10.

Outstanding field goal percentages was once again the key for the Pioneers as they connected on 26 of 40 shots for 65% from the floor. Head coach Gary Nottingham was very pleased with the turnaround his team made defensively last week in holding Fairmont to only 32% and Shepherd to 44% from the field. "We're gaining confidence and showing more consistency," the coach said, praising each member of his squad for their im-

proved efforts. Waynesburg College (Pa.) took on the Pioneers Monday night (results were not available at press time). Waynesburg came into the game at 9-3 and boasting a record of being the 13th winningest small college in the nation over the past five years. Glenville's next game will be at 7:30 tonight against Davis & Elkins.

Classes at extension sites and at Glenville's Parkersburg Center, locations which do not have resident students, have already been cancelled several times this semester because of bad weather.
