Budget Cuts Affect GSC

President Reagan's proposed 1986-87 budget will affect one-third of the students receiving federal financial aid at Glenville State College if Congress approves drastic cuts in student aid programs. August Kafer, director of financial aid at Glenville, believes that the situation is a "lay and wait type of affair," hoping that what is proposed will not be approved.

Reports indicate that the most drastic reductions will be associated with the Guaranteed Student Loan program. President Reagan has proposed a borrowing limit of \$32,500 which students may not exceed. This cap is being established in order to lower the eligibility rate of students. The cut into the GSL program will affect few Glenville

Nursing Program Underway

Along with the return of the nursing program to Glenville State College comes a new nursing facility which is located on the first floor of the Science Hall. The facilities will help the nursing students at GSC, providing them hands-on experience in the nursing program.

The program, which is under the direction of Mrs. Onnalee Johnson, was brought back into the GSC curriculum in the fall of 1984 after a great deal of interest was shown regarding its restoration. Mrs. Johnson is the program's only instructor at the present time, although later in the program several nurses will come from the West Virginia University

School of Nursing to teach various nursing classes.

The facility, which is set up like an actual hospital room, contains three beds and ample space for the treatment of "patients" (mannequins used in the program) by the students in the program. The room has everything a hospital would have and will provide the future nurses with individualized training.

The first students will be admitted to the nursing program within the next few weeks, according to Dr. John Chisler, and enrollment into the program will be limited to 24 students who have fulfilled the program's admission requirements.

There will be an important meeting for all students who plan to student teach during the Fall Semester 1985 in 101 Clark Hall on Monday, February 25, 1985, at 3:15 p.m.

Applications for financial aid are now available at the Financial Aid Office. Students are urged to pick up applications as soon as possible.

Ladies Finish At 14-8 Start Tourney Today

The Lady Pioneers swing into tournament action today with a 1:00 tipoff against Concord College in the first round of the West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference Women's Basketball Tournament.

The Ladies finished the regular season with a 14-8 record, going 12-6 in WVIAC contests. In their final week of play, the squad dropped two games and won one against three of the conference's top five teams.

Last Tuesday's game at Davis & Elkins saw the Ladies winding up on the losing end of a 61-55 score. Glenville led by one with 2:29 remaining in the game, but missed some key free throws in the stretch. Tina Burkhamer led all GSC scorers with 16 points, followed by Janice Hensley with 12 and Maria Lothes with 10.

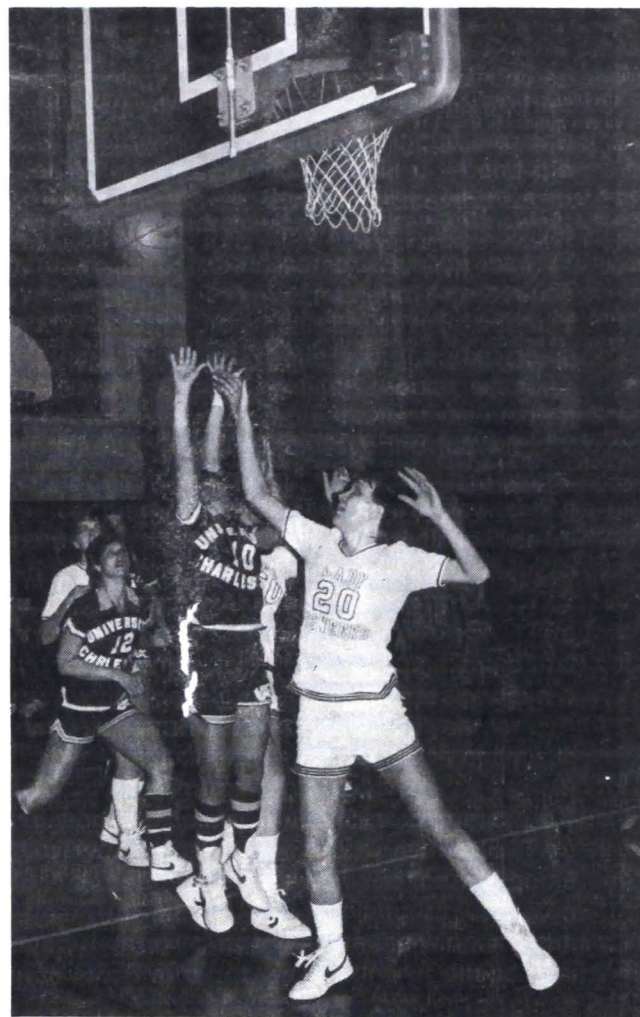
Hensley also gathered 11 rebounds in the game, while Kim Maynard hauled in eight.

In the last home contest for seniors Maynard, Lothes, and Cathy Starcher last Thursday, the Ladies took on the University of Charleston and fell by a score of 73-63. After battling to a tie at the half, GSC simply couldn't put things together in the second half as the Lady Golden Eagles collected the victory. Burkhamer was once again atop the scoring list with 21 markers, while Hensley and Lothes were the only other Lady Pioneers in double figures with 18 and 13 points, respectively.

Things turned around for the team on Saturday, however, when they travelled to Fairmont State College and came away with a 70-68

victory. Maria Lothes had 14 points for the Ladies, including the tying field goal and the winning free throws in the final seconds of the game. Hensley had 22 points and 14 rebounds to lead the squad's attack in the final game of the regular season. Burkhamer was next on the scoring list with 17 points, and Kim Maynard hit for 15 while collecting 11 rebounds in one of her best performances of the season.

Head Coach Tim Carney commented that "This has really been a pretty good year for us," and that he is optimistic about his team's chances in the WVIAC Tournament. The winner of today's game with Concord will go on to face the winner of the Wheeling College vs. W.Va. Wesleyan game tomorrow at 3:00 p.m. in second-round action.

Pioneers In Final Week, Prepare For Tournament

The Pioneers are into their last week of regular season action, and are currently carrying a 10-14 overall slate into their final three games, preparing for next week's West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference Men's Basketball Tournament.

The squad was 2-1 last week, posting wins over Wheeling College and Concord before falling to Fairmont State last Saturday.

Against Wheeling last Monday, GSC went 21 of 42 from the floor for an even 50% to defeat the Cardinals by a score of 50-47. Kenneth Taylor and Richard Moore paced the Pioneers with 14 points apiece. Taylor

also grabbed eight rebounds, while Moore collected seven caroms and dished out six assists. Rudy Watts was the only other Pioneer in double figures, scoring 13 points.

Wednesday night Concord College was the opposition, and the visiting Mountain Lions fell to a 67-65 GSC victory. The Pioneers led by four at the half, then held on for the two-point win over the conference's then fifth-place team. Taylor once again led the scoring attack, pumping in 18 while snatching six rebounds. Matt Bullett was next with 16 points, while Steve Morris hit two three-point goals and finished with 10 markers.

The winning streak finally ended at three for Glenville, as Saturday's rematch with Fairmont saw the Pioneers on the short end of an 86-62 score. The Falcons continued to play very well, as they have in their past few games, and simply outplayed GSC throughout. Rich Moore had 16 points to head the Pioneers' scoring list, followed by Morris with 14, Watts with 13, and Taylor with eight.

Dear Editor,

We, the undersigned, are concerned about the starvation and famine in the sub-Sahara countries of Africa.

Besides, the many personal and organizational efforts to raise funds and secure resources for this emergency involving literally millions of lives, we feel there ought to be a similar effort from the United States government.

students, but will really hurt the higher costing institutions.

Kafer says the cut into the Pell Grants will have the most severe impact on Glenville students. The grants are federal related financial awards assigned to the most qualified students, based on income, by the financial aid director at most institutions. Under the new program, students will be required to pay for at least 40 percent or \$800 of the total cost of their education each year. A new limit will be established for the Pell Grants as well, declaring students ineligible for the awards if the total income of parents or students exceeds \$25,000.

The Supplemental Education Opportunity Grant is in danger of being totally abolished, and if this occurs, it will hurt many students, the financial aid director warned.

According to Kafer, Glenville received \$78,000 in SEOG funds for the 1985 fiscal year. If the SEOG program is terminated, the lost funds will be replaced in the form of additional work study money, but Kafer fears that the increase in work study

will only be a fraction of what is actually necessary to offset the loss.

The National Direct Student Loan program will remain stable, providing graduates who participated in this type of federal aid repay their loans. Kafer noted that Glenville's payback rate is good and well below the national average in loan defaults.

Kafer estimated that 90 percent of the student enrollment receive some form of financial assistance, with 30 percent participating in federal aid programs.

"I'm optimistic that many of these proposed cuts will not be acted upon by Congress," he said. "We are lucky that Glenville is not one of the higher costing institutions to attend," predicting that Glenville may attract several students from other private and large public institutions. "They are going to get hit the hardest."
