### **Summer School To Be Offered**

Glenville State College will be offering two four-and-a-half week long summer terms this year which will run from June 10 to July 10 and July 11 to August 9. Although a schedule of classes is not yet available, a number of classes similar to that of last year will be available. Schedules should be available by spring break. New to the summer programs will be pre-registration

which will occur in late April.

Fees will also be similar to those charged last year with in-state students paying \$69 per three credit hour course and out-of-state students paying \$249 per three credit hour course. ## GSC To Hold Science Program

Science experiences for 4th and 5th grade students will be provided on the Glenville State College Campus Tuesday, March 5. Participants will meet in Room 107, Science Hall on four consecutive Tuesdays from 6:15 p.m. to 8:00 p.m. Pre-service teachers enrolled in the Glenville State College elementary education program will provide the instruction; all presenters are currently enrolled in Science 321-Science in the Public Schools under the direction of Dr. Joe Evans.

The students will explore the properties of water in a formal classroom setting. Topics such as evaporation and cloud forma-

tions, water pollution and purification, and density and ocean currents will be investigated. All sessions will utilize the activity-based moded of instruction.

## Suicide Has Warning Signs

"No one cares!" "I wish I were dead!" While these words are many times used as a way of getting attention, they are often overlooked but may indicate a more serious problem. WARNING: If they do not get the proper attention drastic results may occur.

Death by suicide has skyrocketed among 15-24 year olds causing teenage suicide to raise to epidemic proportions in this country. There are approximately 500,000 teenage suicide attempts a year, with about 5,000 young people succeeding.

Being away from home in the pressured environment of college, we must be aware of these potential warning signs: 1) preoccupation with themes of death or expressed suicidal thoughts 2) giving away prized possessions 3) sudden changes in sleeping or eating habits 4) withdrawl from friends and family 5) changes in school performance including cutting classes, dropping out of activities, lowered grades 6) personality changes like apathy of appearance and health, nervousness, outburst of anger 7) use of drugs - alcohol 8) recent suicide of friends or relatives 9) previous suicide attempts.

If you or anyone you know has shown any of these warning signs, GET HELP!!

To get proper professional help in this area contact the Summit Center for Human Development located at the lower level of the Medical Center on Mineral Road. The Center is open Monday through Friday from 8:30 - 4:30 and is staffed with qualified therapists who are trained in crisis intervention stressing confidentiality. The number to call is 462-5721 and after hours (toll free) 1-800-352-3869.

Remember: Problems can be solved and there are people who are willing to help. Death is not the solution.

## Ladies Take Fourth Place In Conference. Hensley, Burkhamer Make All-Tourney

The GSC Lady Pioneers wrapped up a fantastic season last week by taking fourth place in the West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference tournament. The Ladies entered the Wheeling Civic Center with a 14-8 overall and 12-6 conference record, and came out 16-10 and 14-8 on the year.

#### GSC 72, Concord 47

The Ladies' first victory in the tournament came Wednesday against Concord Col-Glenville took immediate control of the game and never let go as they chalked up a 72-47 win over the Lady Mountain Lions.

Janice Hensley led the squad in scoring with 23 points and in rebounding with 10. Burkhamer poured in 19 points in the win, and Kim Maynard had 15 markers and nine caroms. Rhonda Hicks also hit double figures with 10 points. The Lady Pioneers shot 51% from the floor and 72% from the line, and hauled in a team total of 37 rebounds.

#### GSC 62, Wheeling 55

Thursday afternoon saw a major upset in tournament action, as the Lady Pioneers scored a 62-55 victory over heavily-favored Wheeling College.

Tina Burkhamer's 19 points paced the GSC scoring attack, while Hensley nailed 15 and had 15 rebounds, and Maynard hit for 13 and eight rebounds. Glenville was 24 of 50 from the floor for 48% and grabbed 46 rebounds to Wheeling's 36.

UC 67, GSC 60

In Friday night's semifinal action, the Ladies were finally knocked out of action by a powerful University of Charleston squad. Glenville got off to a slow start and couldn't catch up as UC went on to post the 67-60 victory.

The Ladies were once again led by Burkhamer, who hit eight of 20 field goal attempts and all four of her free throws in scoring 20 points. Kim Maynard was the only other GSC player in double figures with 15. The team hit only 39% of its field goal attempts and was out rebounded 46-43.

#### Fairmont 70, GSC 65

Fairmont State finally got past GSC after two earlier defeats by scoring a 70-65 victory over the Lady Pioneers in Saturday night's consolation game. The Lady Falcons simply outgunned Glenville in the second half in winning third place honors in the tournament.

Hensley and Burkhamer again topped the Ladies' scoring list as each pumped in 23 points in the losing effort. Maynard had 12 markers, Maria Lothes had five, and Cathy Starcher added two to the final total.

Burkhamer and Hensley were each named to the All-Tournament team, and Lothes was a co-winner of the tournament's Sportsmanship award. Head coach Tim Carney was extremely pleased with his team's performance in the tournament as well as throughout the entire The coach season. commented that the leadership of seniors Maynard, Lothes, and Starcher were key elements of the squad's success and that he felt that the Lady Pioneers have enjoyed an excellent season.

## Pioneers To Face Salem In Tournament

The Pioneers take their 11-6 overall and 8-13 West Virginia Conference record into tournament action tonight as they take on Salem College in the first round of the WVIAC tournament. Glenville finished their regular season last week with Monday and Saturday losses to Salem and the University of Charleston and a Thursday night victory against Alderson-Broaddus in the season's home finale.

The Salem Tigers gained their third win of

the season over the Pioneers last Monday by staving off a GSC comeback to post a 88-83 victory. Kenneth Taylor poured in 28 points and Rudy Watts had 21 to pace the scoring attack. Richard Moore added 12 and Steve Morris and Matt Bullett had eight each in the loss. The Pioneers continued to shoot well, going 34 of 59 from the floor for a 57% accuracy, but Salem hit 60% of their field goal attempts. shooting for 65% in the first half.

An enthusiastic Glenville crowd watched on Thursday night as seniors Tim Moore and Rich Moore performed in their final home games in the blue and white. The Pioneers sent their seniors off with a big 75-57 victory over A-B. Watts topped the GSC scoring list with 20 points, followed by Morris and Bullett with 14 apiece and Rich Moore with 12. Watts also collected 14 rebounds in the game, and Taylor and Steve Linville each handed out five assists.

The season's final game was Saturday night against UC in Charleston's Eddie King The Golden Gvm. Eagles jumped out to a 55-37 lead then coasted to a 111-85 victory over the Pioneers. Taylor scored 37 points and grabbed 10 rebounds to lead the squad, followed by Watts with 14 markers.

The winner of tonight's GSC-Salem game will go on to face the University of Charleston in quarterfinal action tomorrow at 9:00 p.m. Semifinal games will be held at 7:00 and 9:00 p.m. Friday and the final will be Saturday at 8:30 p.m.



## Weekley Attends Meeting

Vance Weekley, assistant professor of geography at Glenville State College, recently attended the Congressional Awards Gold Ceremony on Capitol Hill in Washington, D.C.

The Congressional Youth Awards recognize youth between the ages of 14-23 who have dedicated a total of 800 hours to volunteer public service, personal development and physical fitness. Youths must be between 14-16 to be eligible for the bronze award, 17-20 for the silver award, and 21-23 for the gold award.

Appointed by First District Congressman Alan Mollohan, Weekley serves as chairman of the Ritchie County Congressional Youth Awards Council.

At the Gold Ceremony held at the Cannon Building on February 6, 49 youths representing 10 states were honored with gold awards. Five recipients were from West 'Virginia's first congressional district.

### Chisler Returns From Convention



Those who take first aid are taught the proper way to carry out CPR. This class is unlike any other course offered to all Glenville students because it offers an opportunity to receive training which could be the difference in a life and death situation. So don't take CPR lightly... Someone's life may depend on it.

## **DeBord Completes Index**

Dr. Beverly DeBord, assistant professor of English and chairwoman of the Language Division at Glenville State College, has completed the preparation of a 20-year index of articles published in Victorian Poetry, a West Virginia University publication.

Featured in the Winter 1985 issue, the index makes it possible for users to identify every article published on a specific poem in Victorian Poetry since

1963

Aided by the use of a personal computer and 1984 Glenville State College graduate Jenny Lewis, Dr. DeBord completed the task in three years. The format of the index is annotated (indexed and cross-referenced) and includes over 800 articles from around the world.


