neutral point factor job evaluation system. The Job Comparability Committee will act as liaison to report progress of the Pay Equity Project to employees in given areas.

The Job Comparability Committee has 26 members representing seven regions in West Virginia. Mr. Luzader

represents the North Central West Virginia sector.

The Pay Equity Project is a result of a 1984 legislative act to establish a standard rate of payment for all state employees. When placed into effect, the Project will create 1500 job classifications

# Alcoholism Affects All

As college students, most of us tend to enjoy ourselves every Thursday night at the Campus Pub. For those of us who don't enjoy ourselves, we know those who do enjoy themselves. Nevertheless, we never really stop and think about the fact that the time spent at the Pub, or the Derrick for that matter, can lead to the disease alcoholism.

Alcoholism isn't a disease that happens to older people or it isn't a disease that happens to people on other college campuses. According to Debbie Huff, a case worker therapist at Summit Center for Human Development in Glenville, 'a lot of GSC college students do not fit the criteria needed to be an alcoholic, however, these students might later on fit the criteria to be an alcoholic because the patterns picked up from social drinking can lead to alcohol abuse.'

Alcohol abuse not only harms the individual's body mentally and physically, it can harm those who do not drink. According to Captain Jerry Helmick, of the GSC Campus Police, '99% of the problems in the dormitory, such as vandalism, are alcohol-related.' The City Hall of Glenville released statistics on the number of arrests for public intoxication in 1984, and they show some alarming facts. For example, in 1984 seven people between the ages of 18-25 were arrested, and six were arrested between the ages of 26-30 for public intoxication. Interestingly enough, 28 people were arrested for public intoxication between the ages of 30 and up. During the entire year of 1984, four of these arrests were females and the rest were males. Thus, alcoholism or alcohol abuse does cause problems to those not involved, as well as the person who is abusing alcohol.

If you or someone you know is concerned about the patterns of drinking, help can be found. The Summit Center for Human Development, located on Mineral Road in Glenville, offers alcohol counseling and can be reached at the number 462-5716. Remember that a casual drink could lead to what the Surgeon General of the United States confirms as our nation's number one illness/health problem, directly and indirectly alcohol addiction.

Head Coach Tim Carney and the Pioneer golf team are hoping to pick up on their outstanding play from the fall season and continue it into the upcoming spring season.

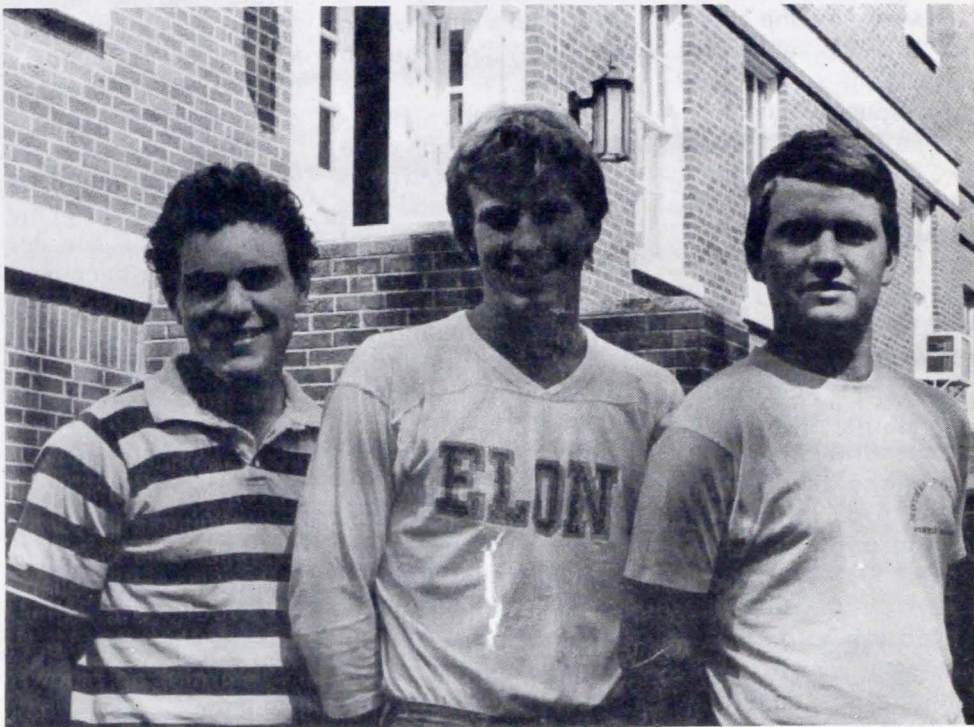

Returning from last year's squad are junior Charlie Moss and sophomore Tim Bennett. Newcomers are sophomores Mike Dynda, Bill Forrest, and Larry Beall,

and freshman Danny Wassick.

Based on their fall performance, Coach Carney sees the three seniors, Bennett, and Dynda as his top five to begin the season. The coach was very pleased by the squad's play during the fall, and believes they have a shot at a very good spring. "We've got the most depth we've had for a long time," he commented. "We're very strong throughout our lineup, and that's a big plus."

After competing at James Madison Friday and Saturday, the team will host the Glenville State Invitational at the Oxbow Club in Beverly, Ohio.

## Pioneer Stats Released, Watts Leads In Scoring

Rudy Watts posted a total of 440 points on the year for an average of 15.2 per game to lead the Pioneer basketball team in scoring for the 1984-85 season. Following Watts with 414 points and a 14.8 average was senior Richard Moore. Moore finished his GSC career with a four-year total of 1,352 points, which moved him into 12th place on the Pioneers' all-time scoring list.

Steve Linville hauled in a total of 194 rebounds on the season in averaging 7.2 per game, followed by Kenneth Taylor with 181 for a 6.2 average. Taylor was third on the team in scoring, averaging 12.8 markers per game, while Linville was fifth with an even 10 points per game. Matthew Bullett hit for an 11.5 average, and Steve

Morris scored 7.1 points a game.

In assists, Richard Moore led the pack with a total of 103 on the season. Morris was second with 74, and Bullett dished out 72.

Bullett led the squad in steals with 41, while Moore and Morris each had 37, Taylor had 29, Linville had 27, and Watts had 26.

In other stats, Morris connected on 36 of 71 attempts from the three-point range, and hit on 43 of 52 free throws for a percentage of .827. Watts led the team in shooting, as he connected on 58 percent of his field goal attempts, while Taylor blocked 25 shots and Bullett 24 to lead in that category.

As a team, Glenville hit for .526 from the floor and .699 from the line, averaging 73.7 points

per game.

The Pioneers finished the season with a 12-17 overall and 8-13 conference record, and took seventh place in the conference tournament. Richard Moore was named to all-conference second team, while Taylor, Watts, and Bullett made honorable mention.

There will be no intramural basketball games on Thursday, March 14, due to the high school regional tournament game between Spencer and Gilmer County high schools being held in the GSC gymnasium. Thursday night's games will be rescheduled for next week.

The MDA Variety Show is scheduled for Wednesday, March 13 at 8 p.m.

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# Concert Royal Performance Reviewed

When we hear the words "classical music," many of us think of grand operas and large orchestras. Seldom do we consider small ensembles. However, the six talented members of the Concert Royal provided those who attended last Thursday's concert with an enjoyable introduction to Baroque music performed by a small ensemble.

The 'BACHanalia' celebrates the 300th anniversary of the births of three composers of the Baroque period—Johann Sebastian Bach

(1685-1750), George Frederic Handel (1685-1759), and Domenico Scarlatti (1685-1756). As a part of the celebration, the instruments used in the concert were replicas of those that were used during the Baroque period. The audience heard the sounds as Bach, Handel, and Scarlatti might have heard them.

According to James Richman, Artistic Director, some selections in the program are not all well known but are equal in quality to the more

popular pieces by the three composers. Not only was the quality of the selections good, but the quality of the performance was good as well. There was an obvious rapport between the musicians that increased the effectiveness of their combined talents. Equally impressive were the solo performances by several of the instrumentalists and the soprano, Julianne Baird. Altogether, the Concert Royal presented a pleasant, enjoyable evening for its audience.

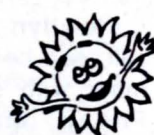

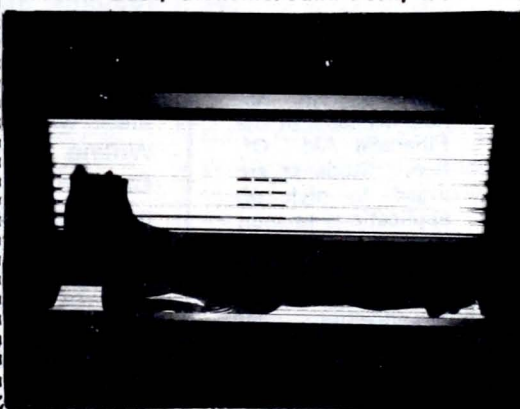
