Rockefeller Visits Campus

Senator Jay Rockefeller last Wednesday deplored the Reagan Administration's efforts to cut student aid and education funding and pledged to "battle the Administration hard."

"We are not about to balance the budget on the backs of young West Virginians who want a college education," Rockefeller told a group of Glenville State College administrators, faculty members, and students.

"I firmly believe that reductions in financial aid and other vital funds for colleges such as

Glenville State would be a foolish way to try to save money," the Senator said. "In a state like West Virginia, we know all too well how much we need to invest in younger people for the sake of our future."

"The 'payback' of investing in a young person's college education is producing a capable, industrious leader who will strengthen West Virginia's economy and help meet its pressing human needs," Rockefeller said.

The Senator also expressed opposition to

the Administration's cutbacks in college and university-based research and development programs. Our coal, timber, and agricultural communities depend to a large degree on the quality of technological research being undertaken, Rockefeller said. "The federal government has a responsibility — in conjunction with the private sector — to tap the talents and brains of younger people and academic institutions to carry out that research," he said.

President Updates Future of Glenville

With only a few weeks left in the Spring semester, many may be curious about what is ahead for Glenville State College. First of all, both terms of summer school will be held at Glenville this summer. The fact that there were no budget reductions this year enables the college to hold both terms with an ample amount of money.

President Simmons also commented on what is in store for Glenville in the future. "If things go well, within

three to four years we should be using the Fine Arts Building, which will be a real addition to Glenville State College." The Board of Regents is dealing with architects and are in the process of waiting for a purchase order to design the building. The president also informed us that a second gas well for Glenville State College is being proposed and it is hopeful that the well will be drilled before late fall in order to benefit

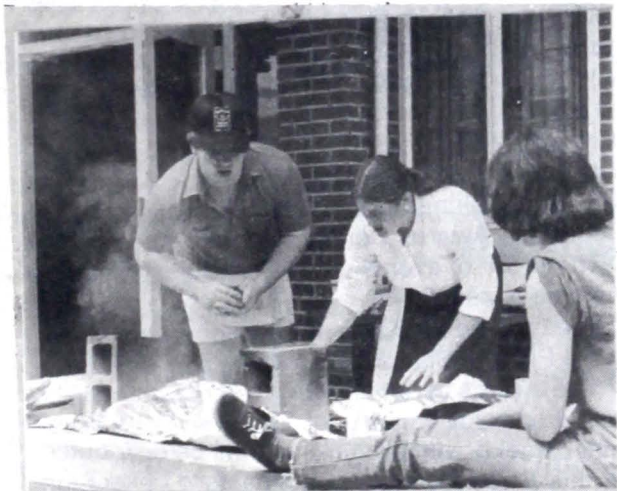

Linksters Take 3rd In GSC Invite, Place Sixth At Pembroke State U.

The GSC golf team posted a third place finish in their own invitational held March 29 at the Oxbow Country Club in Belpre, Ohio. Scott Carney took low score honors for the Pioneers with a score of 73 over the 18-hole course. John Forrest followed with a round of 76, and Mike Dynda fired a hole-in-one on the 130 yard, par three 13th hole on his way to a 79 for the round. Next for Glenville was Danny Wassick with his score of 80, and Jeff Bennett and John Oplinger each had rounds of 84. Alternates Larry Beall and Billy Forrest each shot an even 80.

The squad traveled to Lumberton, North Carolina on April 1 and 2 to compete in the Pembroke State University Invitational tourna-

ment. The Pioneers found themselves in tenth place after the first day's action with a team score of 316. Carney was in fourth place individually with a round of 73.

In the tournament's final round, the squad pulled up into sixth place in the 12-team field. Carney finished third overall with a two day total of 145. John Forrest was next with a

score of 153, John Oplinger fired a 158 total, Mike Dynda shot a 163, and Jeff Bennett followed with a 173 score. The two day team total was 792.

The linksters competed in the Marietta College Invitational on April 5 and 6, then went to the Southern Regional on April 9 and 10. Details and scores from these matches were not available at press time.

the meet.

In Charleston's Yellowjacket Invitational, held April 6 at Laidley Field, the team racked up 28 points on route to a sixth place finish. Individual results of the meet were not available.

After an open week on the schedule, the team will travel to the University of California, Pennsylvania, to compete in that school's invitational next Saturday, April 20. A trip to Indiana University of Pennsylvania will be next for the thinclads, in a meet scheduled for April 27.

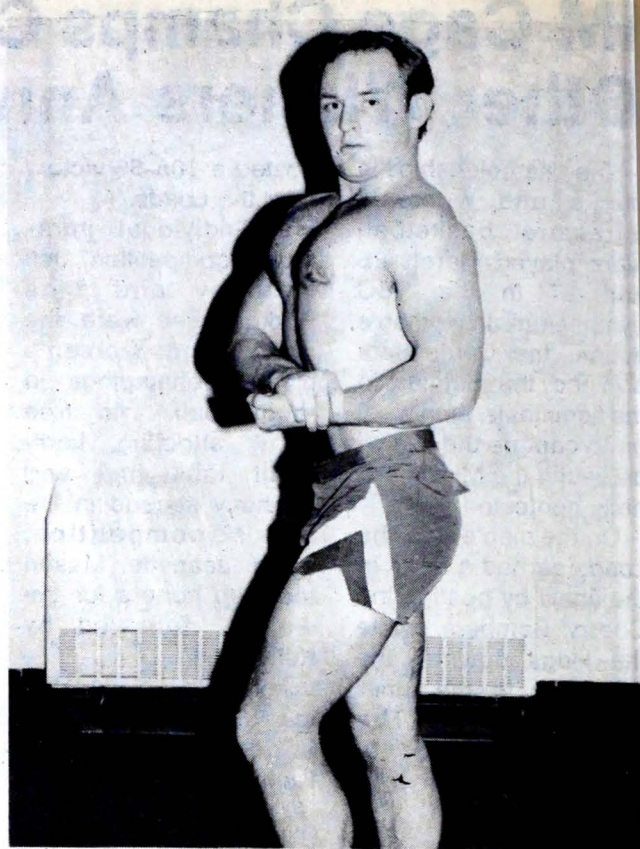

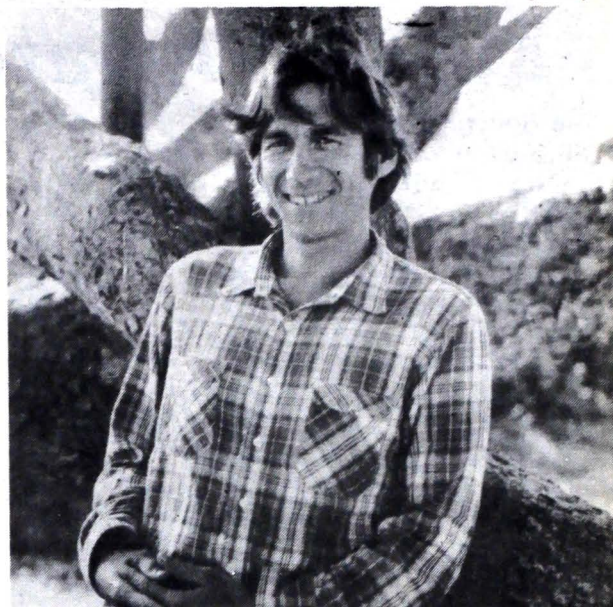

Activist Visits GSC

Nuclear activist Harvey Wasserman will appear at 8 p.m., April 25 on the Glenville State College campus. Wasserman is one of the leading authorities in the field of nuclear energy and the effects of radiation on modern civilizations. In his recently published book, **Killing Our Own**, Wasserman discusses the long term effects of radiation through the use of X-rays and medical treatment. The book comes across as an exhausting and mind-boggling expose. Industry cover-up is the core of his novel, concentrating mainly on atomic reactors, nuclear production and fall-out from the atomic bomb.

Active in civil rights, anti-war, anti-nuclear and pro-energy movements since 1973, Wasserman has lectured and spoken at over 200 college campuses and has appeared on radio and television talk shows.

Wasserman will present a fast-moving multi-media program that will inform those concerned with their or their children's health in the future. As a special feature, he will present a short film entitled "Two Victims From Three Mile Island."

The lecture will take place in the Glenville State College auditorium located in the Administration Building. There is no charge and the public is invited.

Building Name Changed

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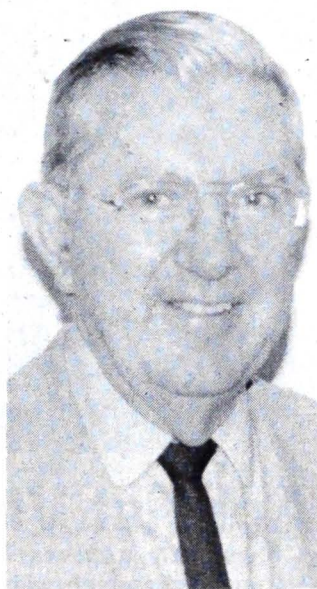
Alumni Award Day Winners Chosen

Students Conduct Research Activities

Two Glenville State students under the direction of Mr. Jim Meads are conducting research activities in the vicinity of Spruce Knob, the point of highest elevation in West Virginia. Martin Arbaugh and Scott Demers are studying the effects on the cave environment of a trash dump located at the mouth of Stillhouse Cave.

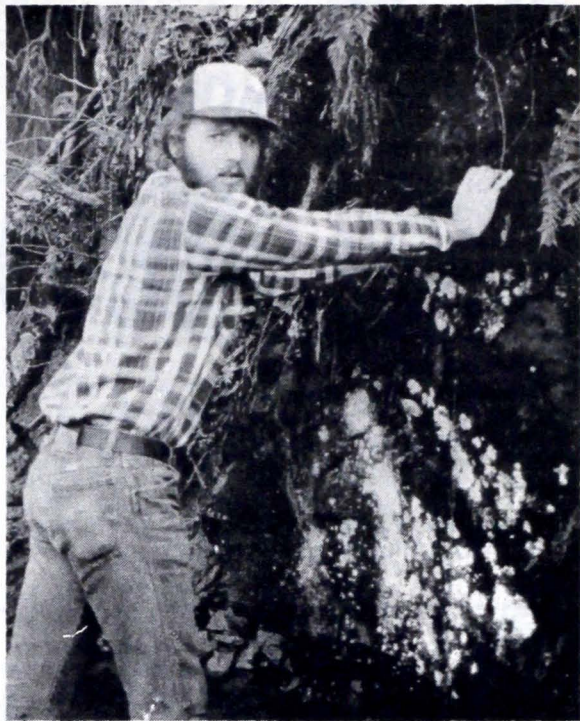
Stillhouse Cave, named for the white lightning device which operated in the cave in 1881, is located near the famous Sinks Gandy. This cave, consisting of passages leading to

several large rooms, is the home for a wide variety of animal life. There is a stream that enters the cave near its mouth and travels through the cave on its subterranean journey.

On the weekend of March 9-10, the biologists camped on Spruce Knob and collected a wide variety of data on Stillhouse Cave. The students analyzed water and soil samples for chemical composition. They performed at several locations in and outside of the cave tests for bacterial contamination. Animal populations were studied including rodents, invertebrates,

bats, and amphibians. The research team also collected specific measurements in regard to the extent of the trash deposition.

Through this study the students hope to determine the impact that man's indiscriminate dumping of garbage has upon the delicate environment of a cave system. If the results indicate that the cave and the life within are being adversely affected by this trash dump, then hopefully plans may be established to clean this area and correct those damages created by man.
